Charles M. Schwab, head of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, upon returning from his annual holiday in Europe, declares that the way to get rich is to decide on a definite business and then "put your heart and soul into it." Hearst publishes that dops, too.

Hundreds of thousands of railroad workers, many of them victims of the seven-day week, have found that the more they put their "hearts and souls" into the transportation business, under the "B. & O." plan for instance, the only result is more money for the railroad owners.
