A single house is costing the Government about £800 inclusive of dram, age, land and roading, and a double or semi-detached house age, land at

The whole system of prison administration and the treatment of non-political prisoners in Soviet Russia is based on the latest theories of <u>criminal</u> psychology. The humanizing of prison life is a striking feature of Russian administration. The ordinary criminal is detained in prison not for the succession. ordinary criminal is detained in prison not for the purpo-unishment, but with the view to educating him to beco-seful citizen and worker.

This is perhaps one of the most remarkable changes in Russias and is apparently working with the most excellent results. The atmosphere of a Russian prison is now more that of a workshop of free workers than that of a house of detention or a jail.

Large workshops have been installed wherever space available, and in the older kind of prisons the large broad c ridors leading to the cells have been utilized for this purpose

ridors leading to the ceils have been utilized for diss purpose. Each prison is self-supporting as regards general requir-ments. A large kitchen, staffed by prisoners, prepares the food off pressure, doing the prison washing, the washing for rail-ways, Government offices and institutions, such as co-opera-ties and hospitals. All the prison furniture, clothes, boots, and other requirements are manufactured on the premises, and out-side unders for Government departments, etc., are fulfilled when

possible.

A prisoner on entering the prison is placed to work at his own trade. In the event of his not having learned one, he is allowed to choose to be a first of his not having learned one, he is allowed to choose to work at Trade Usion hours and wages. The wages are paid to him monthly in the form of a check which his family or relations can discount for each, or which he himself can discount for goods at the prison co-operative score.
