SOVIET PRIMERS TELL FOLKS OF CONGRESS ACTS

No. 1 Tells of Finance of Soviet Union

SYNOPSIS.—The official report of the British trade union delegation to Soviet Russia described the workings of foreign trade, transportation, industry, finance and agriculture in the Soviet Union.

The visitor who had known this city before might, therefore, have expected to find some remnants of the wealthy and middle class, especially among the Mahomedan Tartar population...

The Delegation visited the Liberty Square, formerly a large garden. At one end of the square is a monument to the 26 Bakus who were murdered by the Mensheviks at Avat in Transcaspia.

Members of the Delegation were profoundly shocked to learn that the program of Red terror, which has become one of the principal historical features of the Soviet Government in Transcaucasia, is attributed to instructions given by certain officers of the Soviet Government...

The officials of Bibi Eibat oilfield and Bakku oilfields were a great lesson to the Delegation, not only as regards the possibilities under a scheme of nationalization, but as tending to disprove the theory that the Soviet Government is actually adopting a mercantile system.

Nevertheless the Soviet Government has no intention of exploiting the mining industry to the detriment of the future of the industry itself, but, on the contrary, has consented to a program of increasing capital expenditure, both in housing and industrial development, which is to be undertaken during the next five-year period.

PART II

Special Industries and Institutions

—Visit to Bakku Oilfields

The Delegation, while in Bakku, paid a visit to the oilfields and the refineries.

The main Bakku oilfields consist of two areas, the larger and older one being the Bibi Eibat oilfield, and the smaller and more recent fields known as Bibi Eibat No. 1 and No. 2.

Now, by means of nationalization, all the great projects for the oil industry, which have been planned and the concentration of the oil industry in one place, are practically completed.

It is necessary to have a power station, which formerly provided power for lighting the town and oilfields and for driving machinery, and those who found it more economical to pay the power charges than to use their own power, have expanded and its output increased. By this means elec-

Electric Power

Electric power is used all over the Bibi Eibat field, and the complete electrification of the Balachan fields is well advanced. Further extension of the power lines is in progress, and a new battery of six Babcock-Willcox boilers is under construction at the large station in the refinery town.

The general system now followed in working these oilfields is to treat them as one huge concern. Light railways to a total length of 150 kilometers have been constructed in the Balachan and Bibi Eibat oilfields with large central warehouses and stores from which all material for the fields is delivered.

The centralization of the industry has in a great measure enabled the experts to cope with the serious question of the flooding of the oil strata with water.

The whole scheme of centralization and electrification follows very much the same lines as those worked out by the experts of the Soviet Government during the war, but which was impossible of realization owing to the conflicting interests of private enterprise. It is now considered that the scheme is complete, but another 30 millions of roubles is required for total electrification.

During the last three years more energy has been expended on this great centralization scheme than on actually increasing production. The output of the Balachan fields has fallen to 157 million poods as compared with 468 million in 1913. In 1922 rose to 212 1/2 million poods, and in 1923 to 236 million poods, a net increase of 20 per cent is expected from this year.

Of the 32 refineries in the Bakku area, 14 of the largest and most up-to-date are working at full pressure. A considerable amount of capital expenditure has been effected in these refineries, and the output of crude oil has been increased in 1923, only 126,615,358 poods of crude oil were driven over the stills, a proportion of products received was as follows:

Exports

Export of products from Russia is considered to be illuminating pools of kerosene, two million poods of lubricants, one and a half million poods of gas oil and naphtha.

Shipping

Owing to the events during the war and the Revolution shipping on the Caspian Sea suffered very considerably. At the present time there are 12 oil tankers, with a capacity of 808,000 poods, 32 tank steamers, with a carrying capacity of 3,775,000 poods, and 14 schooners, with a carrying capacity of 207,000 poods.

Finance

At the time of the nationalization of the oilfields the total amount of cash in hand at Bakku was 59,000,000 gold roubles, and the amount of the new tax revenue of the industry had to borrow very heavily from the central authority. Now, however, the industry receives no subsidy from the State, and is able to supply itself with the means of its own output of revenue.

It is growing not from big profits, but from other incomes, from the royalties on the oil, from our banks, our trade. From the budget we are getting 100 million for schools, roads, hospitals, etc. There will be no more tax levied under the primer on the farm tax. Labor

It may be imagined, the intensive activity on the reconstruction has called for an increase in labor. Whereas in 1921 48,000 men were employed producing nearly 600 million poods, in 1922 the number of men employed was 52,000, and in 1923 58,000 men, but less than half that quantity.

Of these different nationalities, 79 per cent of the Russians are employed as industrial workers and 21 per cent as administrative positions. Most of the industrial workers are, therefore, Russians.

The work is done in a regular way, and in some cases a daily wage. The average monthly work per man is 21 1/2 days a month, or 176 hours, and the local rate of wages is 2500 rubles a month.

The working day for industrial workers consists of seven hours during the day and six hours at night, with a six-hour overtime day on Saturdays and the rest of the week.

Eight religious holidays of the Christian Church, which include two days at Christmas and two days at Easter. All workers on these days, regardless of faith or nationality, receive double pay.

Workers and employes are engaged through the Labor Exchange after notification and confirmation by the factory committee of both the worker and the employer.
