TODAY, American worshippers of the league of nations join in celebration of the birthday of the late Woodrow Wilson. in celectation of the birthday of the late vious vision. The occasion is seized upon as an opportunity to spread more propaganda for the entry of the United States into the league. The New York Timos labels 1925 "A Wilson Year," and tries to divide the world "as between Lenin and Wilson." The

"Basic to the Wilson idea was an ultimate faith in the social orde which had been so sorely tried by the war."
