SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 24.-The operators' ultimatum of a five year aggreement containing a no strike clause (the provision that work shall not stop while negotiations are in progress and the further provision that the operators shall have the right to re-open the wage question at any time) has been followed in this district by renewal of propaganda by agents of the operators among the miners.

It is stated by miners and sympathetic businessmen that all the machinery which the coal barons have at their disposal here is being utilized to create sentiment for the terms of the operators' ultimatum. President Coolidge continues to support General Pershing who is bossing the alleged plebiscite commission overseeing the dispute between Chile and Peru concerning the Tacna-Arica dispute over the boundary between the two countries. Coolidge says he will back up

Pershing regardless of the withdrawal of Chilean representatives from the commission after charging unfairness in the plebiscite arrangements.

It became known thru political channels that Mussolini called into Rome a number of his foreign ambassadors to discuss with them the probable effect upon various nations in case he launches unprovoked attacks on Austria and Jugo-Slavia.

WHAT has the world to be thankful for on the day which is sup-posed to be set aside so that we can offer up incantations to the spook in the sky for manifold blessings we are supposed to enjoy? How can the world be thankful when:

. . . .

IN this country 158,000 miners are striking for the right to be recognized as human beings while the combined infamy of the mine barons, the government and the reactionary officials are leading them to destruction. Thousands upon thousands of children toil long hours amidst the most ghastly surroundings. Wage cuts are in effect in many industries and new ones are threatened, with the workers' standard of living constantly falling. The burden of taxation is being piled higher as the capitalist government lightens the debt of the Italian despot, Mussolini, and places it upon the shoulders of the working class of this country.

In Italy, where the workers suffer under the most savage tyranny, every day sees new excesses against all who dare challenge the dictator.

In France the instability of the government is proved by the rapid fall of cabinets and the continuous decline of French currency, while mercenary hordes of French soldiers try to scourge from the face of the earth the natives of Syria and Lebanon.

In England unemployment is increasing at an alarming rate and the permanent army of unemployed that has averaged two million since the war is now increasing every day.

British airplanes leer menacingly from the largest air base on earth, ready at a moment's notice to sweep down upon Turkey to defend British domination of Mosul oil, while the American Standard Oil concern withdraws from the Mosul group preparatory to fighting.

American warships traverse the Mediterrenean from Gibraltar to Alexandria, thence to Beirut and from there back toward Sidon, as a threat to British forces mobilized across the Lebanon border in Palestine.

In China the diplomats representing American, British, French and Japanese bankers, try to gain diplomatic victories preparatory to the complete subjugation of that nation. Each group strives to gain advantages for itself against the others, with the American House of Morgan in the lead.

In Egypt, Britain faces a s s crisis with the parliament meeting in defiance of an edict and deposing the premier selected by British interests.

In northwestern Africa, in Morocco, the Riffian soldiers fighting against French and Spanish despotism are taking advantage of the rainy season to prepare for the battles that will come with the opening of spring.

In the Philippine Islands the natives there suffer under the iron heel of Major General Leonard H. Wood, the agent of Wall Street, while representatives of the people of those islands come here to implore the despot to liberate them.

Thanksgiving in the capitalist world is a vacuous jest, a sardonic grimace at the suffering of the millions that groan in chains. There is only one place on the face of the earth where the masses can be thankful for their lot. That is in the Soviet Union, the one place in the world where the condition of the worker is constantly improving. The workers of all the world can be thankful for the Soviet Union because it is the outpost of the world revolution, a living inspiration to the struggling workers and peasants thruout the world to rise and destroy the capitalist despoiler of humanity.

But we do not offer thanksgiving to any god in the skies. The victories we gain and will gain in the future we owe only to our own strength, our power of organization, and to the invincible leadership of the world revolution; a leadership built up from the best elements of the working class from every country in the world-the Communist

Frank Corbishley, a brother of Henry Corbishley, leader of the progressives, is charged with the murder of a radical miner who was actually killed by a member of the ku klux klan. The indictment of Corbishley is an attempt to whitewash the kluxer,

Tho the indictments are based on the flimsiest evidence and would not stand up in a court that was not under the thumb of the coal operators, there is grave danger that the miners may be railroaded to prison and Frank Corbishley to the gallows unless a vigorous defense is conducted in their behalf.

The Farrington machine has placed obstacles in the way of raising funds for the defense of those miners among the local unions in Illinois. This makes it ever so much more necessary for the workers thruout the country to contribute generously to the defense of the Zeigler miners who are among the best union men in the United States.

5,000 JAPANESE TEXTILE WORKERS STRIKE AGAINST LOW WAGES AND **CONDITIONS IN KAWASAKI MILLS**

TOKIO, Japan, Nov. 24 .- Five thousand Japanese textile workers walked out at the Kawasaki textile mills demanding higher wages and more consideration from the bosses. A number of strikers have been arrested following a demonstration in which they carried banners protesting against the inhuman conditions they are subjected to.

The textile workers of Japan are growing more restless and the government fears that the walkout of these five thousand Japanese workers may be followed by strikes in other textile mills.

The average Japanese worker is forced to work 12 to 16 hours a day, 7 days a week for a small wage in the cotton mills and there is but little organization to protect them from the bosses, who beat the workers if they do not work fast enough. amit

Places Orders in Europe.

Prior to his arrival in this country Gourvitch spent some time in Europe where he placed orders for the sum of about \$2,000,000, mostly in Germany and Belgium. Here, as in Europe, the trust "Chemugol" intends to purchase machines of the latest patents which have become an urgent necessity in building up the expanding chemical and glass industries in the Soviet Union. According to Gourvitch, the increasing internal demand puts before the "Chemugol," which is responsible for 50 per cent of the output of chemical products in Soviet Russia, the task of doubling its production within the next year.

The "Chemugol" controls the chemical, glass, and allied industries in the Ukraine and Southern Russia. The gross annual output of its factories amounts to \$37,500,000. . The value of the products placed by the "Chemugol" on the market is about \$25,000,-000. The program of production for the fiscal year 1925-1926 exceeds materially the pre-war output. This program provides for an output under technical conditions as they are at present. The "Chemugol" is taking immediate steps to increase its production by re-equipping along modern lines some of the existing factories and the building of a number of new works. It is in connection with this task that Gourvitch is now in this country.

Martynoff was noted for his betiality in Moscow during his term as chief of police and at the outbreak of the Russian revolution fearing that the

In Crimea he joined the forces of Denikin and was made the chief of police in Kiev. In Kiev, he did all that he possibly could to suppress any attempt on the part of the workers or peasants to join hands with their comrades that were fighting the Denikin forces. When Denekin was defeated, he fled

to Constantinople, where he organized a detective bureau and aided the reactionary Turkish government to weed out the revolutionary young Turks, who wanted to abolish the sultan and change the form of governent. But he did not serve his masters long in Constantinople as the young Turks overthrew the sultan and declared a republic.

He then fled to the haven of all white guardists, America, where members of the working class are barred from holding opinions contrary to those running Wall Street's branch office, the White House, and heartily embrace the oppressors of workers in other lands. BUCK TO LEAGUE OF NATIONS ON MOSUL

THE HAGUE, Nov. 24 .- The permanent court for international justice decided after hearing the report of a commission that had been appointed to investigate the dispute between England and Turkey over Mosul oil fields, that the decision of the league of nations council, that is to be made on the question of Mosul shall be final and binding. It also decided that the decision must gain a unanimous vote in the league council and that the votes of Turkey or England will not be considered in determining unanimity.

Turks Defy Court.

When the court was first instructed to discuss the issue, the Turks in an emphatic manner showed that they would not abide by the decision of the league of nations, which they claim is Britishcontrolled, or the Hague court, if the decision was detrimental to the Angora government and in favor of the British government.

England is insistent that Turkey relinquish her claims to Mosul, which she gained in the league of nations mandate for Irak, and thus allow her to exploit the oil fields over which the two powers are now fighting.

Passing the Buck.

The decision of the permanent court for international justice is a mere passing of the buck to the league of nations as it realizes that its decisions cannot be put into operation, due to Turkey's refusal to submit to any decision, and is an attempt to hide its weakness.
