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FISH WITNESS BOASTS OF U.S. ATTACK ON UNIONS

National Cash Register Company Arbitrarily Cuts Wages of 6,000 Employees

Organize Anti-War Committees in the Shops!

UGUST 1st is international fighting day against imperialist war; A it is a day when the workers in all countries will rally their forces for struggle against unemployment, against wage cuts, against speedup in the factories, against the determined efforts of the capitalists to force starvation and destitution on the toiling masses, against the preparations which the imperialist powers are making for war on the workers' Soviet Republic, against the bloody suppression of the revolutionary national independence movements in the colonies, against the feverish preparations which the capitalist governments are now making to embroil the world in another imperialist war.

The Hoover administration in Washington is rapidly preparing to become a war administration. Hoover's chief concern since taking office has been preparation for war-war to win more colonies as sources of profit for American banks and corporations, war against the Soviet Union, war against the working class at home and in the

The London "Disarmament" Conference, concocted by Hoover and the "labor" premier of Great Britain, MacDonald, was a conference merely to fix the terms for the next war. Just as professional prize fighters, together with the managers and promoter, meet in advance of a fight, to determine the weights, the weighing in time, the size and weight of the gloves, etc., so did the representatives of the United States, England, France, Japan and Italy meet before the outbreak of the war which they are preparing to determine the number of battleships, cruisers, etc., the size of the guns, etc., which they intend to use in the imperialist blood-bath (most probably against the Soviet Union) now immediately before us.

The present special session of the Senate is called for the sole purpose of ratifying this infamous London war document. Under its terms the military expenditures of the United States government, already \$2,800,000,000 a year, will be increased by more than another \$1,000,000,000 to provide for more cruisers, more submarines, more

At the same time unemployment and wage cuts increase. And accompanying them goes hunger, evictions, poverty, starvation for increasing thousands of workers. No worker is secure. Workers who have held jobs for years in a factory suddenly and unexpectedly find themselves in the army of jobless. Old workers, more rapidly than ever before, are thrown on the scrap heap. Young workers and women, thrown out of jobs by the thousands in the radio and other such luxury industries, when given the jobs on which old workers have proven themselves "too slow," are driven at a speed that soon ruins their health and forces them also into the "too slow" category of workers who now number hundreds of thousands in the United States.

Masses of unemployed workers, constantly walking the streets in search of jobs, are used by the bosses as a club to beat down the conditions and wages of those still in the factories. The last big corporation to slash the wages of its slaves is the National Cash Register Co., piling its 10 per cent cut on top of the cuts already made by General Motors, U. S. Steel, and other huge American corporations, proving conclusively that contrary to the fake promises of "no cuts" paraded by the A. F. of L. strikebreakers, a general wage slashing campaign has started which will reach all workers in all industries before the next few weeks have passed.

With this economic offensive against the workers goes a poli-The breaking up of the arrest and three year prison sentences given to Foster, Amter, Minor, and Raymond in New York, the six menth sentences given to Fisher and others in "socialist" Milwaukee, the Powers-Carr case in Atlanta, the Imperial Valley cases in California, and many others occurring in all parts of the country about the same time, marked the first stages of the efforts of the government to aid the bosses in crushing the growing resistance of the workers to the attempts to systematically worsen their conditions. A second stage has been reached in the murder of Levy, Weizenberg, and Gonzalez, in the increased lynching terror against the Negroes, and now in the threats of the Fish Committee for special police to hunt down revolutionary workers, special anti-Communist laws, and new waves of deportations.

This offensive of the bosses is a single entity. Their preparations for war, for attacks against the Soviet Union, for the bloody crushing of the growing revolutionary tide in the colonies; their mass lay-offs, speed-up and wage cuts in the factories; their terroristic lynchings of Negroes; their beatings and sluggings of militant workers; and their threats of even sharper repressive measures, all go to make up the plan by which the big capitalists and their government hope to solve the present world capitalist crisis, daily being accentuated by the economic crisis.

The workers must answer. Their answer must be organization and militant struggle. Organization in the Communist Party and the Trade Union Unity League; organization in workers' defense corpsand revolutionary struggle to turn back this offensive of the bosses, their government and social fascist agents. The next nation-wide step in the developing counter-offensive of the workers will be in the demonstrations against imperialist war on August 1st.

Under the slogans: "Organize and strike against wage cuts," "Not one cent for armaments; all funds for the unemployed," "social insurance for all unemployed, injured, sick and old workers," "Demand the release of the unemployed delegation"--the masses of workers in the shops, factories and mines must be mobilized on August 1st. Anti-War Committee should be set up in the factories now which should organize the workers in the shops to march in a body to the demonstrations which will take place after work in all cities on August 1st.

Two Hearts That Beat As One

This is a general survey of the developing

world economic crisis (b) Today, now that the world economic crisis is developing with annihilating effect, ruining whole strata of middle and small capitalists, impoverishing whole groups of the labor aristocracy and peasantry, and damning the million masses of the workers to starvation, the question arises everywhere: What are the causes of the crisis, where are its bases, how are they to be combated, how de-The most multifarious "crisis theories" are elaborated. Whole projects are proposed for the "alleviation," "prevention" or liquidation" of the crisis. The bourgeois oppositions rail at the bourgeois governments, which appear to have "failed to take the necessary measures" to prevent the crisis. The "democrats" throw the blame on the "republicans," the "republicans" on the "democrats," and all join against the Hoover group with its Federal Reserve Bank system, which has proved unable to "cope with the crisis." Indeed, there are some wise heads who observe the causes of the world economic crisis in the "intrigues of Bolshevism." I refer here to the well-known "industrialist" Rechberg, for instance, who has little resemblance to an industrialist as such, but rather resembles an "industrialist" among the literates and a "literate" among the industrialists. (Laughter.)

It is obvious that all these theories and projects have nothing to do with science. It must be admitted that the bourgeois scientists have collapsed utterly in the face of this crisis; and even more than this, they show themselves lacking in even that minimum of insight into life which their predecessors must be granted to have possessed. These gentlemen forget that the crisis cannot be estimated as an accidental phenomenon in the system of capitalist economics. These gentlemen forget that the economic crisis is the compulsory result of capitalism. These gentlemen forget that these crises came into the world simultaneously with the birth of capitalism. In the course of more than one hundred years periodical economic crises have occurred, returning every 12 to 10 to 8 years. During this period the bourgeois governments have tried every shade and variety of device, bourgeois brains of every degree of capacity have exerted their utmost efforts, all to solve the problem of "preventing" these crises. But they have one. and all suffered defeat for the reason that within the confines of capitalism economic crises can be neither prevented nor removed. Is it then a matter of surprise that the bourgeois brains of today again fail to find a solution? Is it any matter of wonder that the measures of the bourgeois governments are in actual fact accomplishing nothing toward an alleviation of the crisis, toward an improvement of the position of the million ics of bankruptcy, to fresh waves of unemployment, and to the absorption of the weaker capitalist associations by the stronger capi-

talist associations? The bases of the over-production crisis of economics and their cause lie in the system of capitalist economy itself. The basis of the crisis lies in the antagonism between the social nature of production and the capitalist form of appropriation of the products of this production. One expression of this fundamental contradiction of capitalism is the contradiction between the colossal growth of the possibilities of production, calculated on the winning of a maximum of capitalist profit, and the relative limitation of the solvent demand on the part of the masses of the workers, whose standard of living the capitalists are constantly endeavoring to press down to the utmost minimum limit. In order to gain the upper hand in competition, and to press out fresh profits, the capitalists are obliged to develop technics, to carry out rationalization, to increase the exploitation of the workers, to intensify the productive capacity of their undertakings to the uttermost. In order not to fall behind one another, all capitalists are forced to strike along one path or another of blind haste in the development of the possibilities of production. But the purchasing powers of the million masses of the workers and peasants, at bottom the chief buyers, remain at a low level in both home and foreign Hence the over-production crises. Hence the well-known consequences, repeating themselves more or less periodically, causing the goods to remain unsold, production to decline, unemployment to increase, wages to fall, and the contradiction between the level of production and the level of solvent demand to increase. An over-production crisis is the appearance of these contradictions in tempestuous and destructive forms. If capitalism were to adapt production, not to the achievement of a maximum of profit, but to the systematic improvement of the material situation of the masses of the people; if it were to apply the profits, not to the satisfaction of the desires of the parasite classes, not to the perfecting of the methods of exploitation, not to the export of capital, but to the systematic betterment of the material position of the workers and peasants, then there would be no crisis. But then capitalism would not be

An examination of the present crisis cannot however confine itself to these considerations. The present crisis is not a simple repetition of the old crises. It is growing and developing under new conditions, which must be made fully clear before a complete idea of the crisis

can be obtained. It is complicated and deenened by a series of special circumstances, and until clear light is thrown upon these there is no possibility of forming a real conception of the present economic crisis.

What are these special circumstances? These special circumstances consist of the following characteristic facts:

1. The crisis has seized most acutely the chief land of capitalism, its citadel, the United States of America, which holds in its hands no less than one-half of the total production and of the total consumption of all the countries of the earth. It is easily comprehensible that this circumstance is bound to involve an enormous extension of the sphere of influence, an aggravation of the crisis, and the accumulation of extreme difficulties for world

2. In the course of the development of the economic crisis, the industrial crisis in the most important capitalist countries has not simply coincided with the agrarian crisis in the agricultural countries, but the two are interwoven, greatly intensifying the difficulties and determining beforehand the inevitability of a general retrogression in economic activity. It cannot be otherwise; the industrial crisis is bound to intensify the agrarian and the agrarian crisis the industrial, necessary leading to an aggravation of the economic crisis in its totality.

3. Capitalism today differs from the old capitalism in being monopolist capitalism, and this determines in advance the inevitability of the struggle of the capitalist associations for the maintenance of the high monopolist prices for goods in spite of over-production.

It need not be said that this circumstance, which renders the crisis especially tormenting to the masses of the people forming the main consumers of the goods, and reduces these to want and misery, necessarily leads to a prolongation of the crisis, and hampers its ab-4. The present economic crisis is develop-

ing on the basis of that general crisis of capitalism which originated during the period of the imperialist war, which undermined the pillars of capitalism and facilitated the bringing about of an economic crisis.

What does this mean? It means above all that the imperialist war and its consequences have accelerated the process of decay of canitalism and shaken its equilibrium, that today we live in the epoch of wars and revolutions, that capitalism no longer represents a uniform and comprehensive system of international economics, that side by side with the capitalist economic system there exists the socialist system, and that this is growing, maturing, opposing the capitalist system, exposing by the mere fact of its existence the rottenness of capitalism, and shaking its foundations. It means further that the imperialist war and the victory of the revolution in the Soviet Union have shaken the pillars of imperialism in the colonial and dependent countries, that the authority of imperialism is becoming very brittle in these countries, that it no longer possesses the power to pursue its customary methods in these countries.

It means further that during the war, and after the war, a young capitalism sprang up in the colonial and capitalist countries, and that this has competed successfully in the markets against the old capitalist countries, thereby intensifying and aggravating the struggle for the markets.

And it means, finally, that the war has bequeathed to the majority of the capitalist countries a disastrous legacy of chronic nonutilization of the producing capacity of the undertakings, of an army of unemployed which has become transformed from a reserve army into a standing army of unemployment, a factor which confronted capitalism with a multitude of difficulties even before the present crisis, and has been bound to complicate matters further during the crisis.

These are the circumstances deepening and aggravating the world economic crisis. It must be admitted that the present economic crisis is the most serious and profound of all the world economic crises hitherto experienced. 2. The Intensification of the Antagonisms of Capitalism.

They see that the comparative forces have shifted, and that the markets, the sources of raw materials, the spheres of influence, etc., must be redistributed. The most important of these an agonisms is the antagonism between the U.S. A. and England. It suffices to glance at any economic newspaper, at any document relating to the export of goods and capital, to receive convincing proof of this. The means used in this struggle are: tariff. policy, cheap goods, cheap credit, regrouping of forces and new military and political alliances, increased armaments, preparations for fresh imperialist wars, and finally, war. I have referred to the crisis which has seized upon every branch of industry. But there is one industry which is not affected by the crisis, and that is the war industry. This is growing steadily, in spite of the crisis. The bourgeois states are arming wildly, arming ever more and more. Why? Certainly not for amusement, but for war. And the imperialists need war, for it is the sole means of redistributing the world, and to re-divide the markets, the sources of raw materials, and the spheres of capitalist investment.

It is easily comprehensible that under these circumstances so-called pacifism is at its last gasp, that the League of Nations is rotting away while still alive, that the "disarmament proposals" vanish into the abyss, and the conference for the reduction of naval armaments is converted into a conference on the renewal and extension of the navies.

This means that the danger of war will grow more rapidly than before. Let the social democrats chatter of pacifism, of peace, of the peaceful development of capitalism, etc., the experience gained during the governmental reign of the social democrats in Germany and England proves this fascism to be a mere mask hiding fresh preparations for war.

Some Conclusions from the Chicago Convention

Mobilize For August First!

By BILL DUNNE.

HE National Convention of Unemployed L Chicago, July 5th, undoubtedly marked a big advance in our work among the unemployed masses, in the bringing forward of the T. U. U. L. as the leadership of the unemployed, developed directly out of their struggles, in changing the base of the Unemployed masses an integral part of the organization of the unorganized directly by the Trade Union Unity League and its affiliated industrial unions and leagues.

The convention was a decisive proof of the growing radicalization of the working class.

From March 6 to July 4 is four months. Had the preparations for the Chicago convention been on the same scale as for March 6, had there been the same intensity of agitation and organizational work during the four months intervening as there was for the six weeks preceding March 6, there can be little doubt that we would have come very close to having 10,000 delegates at the Chicago con-

One thousand three hundred and twenty delegates from 21 states, with substantial representation from such decisive industries as steel and metal, transportation, mining, food and building construction, were registered at the convention. The garment industry was well represented and agricultural workers sent a small but very militant delegation of eleven.

The weakness of the work among the unemployed generally, and especially in regard to the actual organization of Unemployed Councils, is shown by the fact that by far the greatest majority of the delegates were elected by unions, shop committees, industrial leagues, minorities in the old unions, local T. U. U. L. groups, workers fraternal and benefit societies, etc., and very few by Unemployed Councils. This means that the organization of the unemployed councils has made but a bare beginning.

The serious work of preparing the co...enwon was begun not more than two weeks before July 4-except in the Chicago districtand in most districts only a week before the convention. Under these circumstances the response of working class organizations represented by 1320 jobless worker delegates, most of whom encountered the greatest difficulties -financial, police interference, etc .- in getting to the convention, is truly remarkable-eloquent testimony to the extent of mass unemployment, to the growing influence of our Party and the T. U. U. L., to the rapid heightening of the militancy of the working class.

Wrong Conceptions Refuted. The tone of the convention, which was one of militant enthusiasm, and the manner in which its organization and general work were carried out, refutes in the most emphatic manner the opinion held even by some Party members i. e. that a gathering of unemployed workers must necessarily be somewhat loose, anarchistic and undisciplined. This was true of the old "bummery" conventions held under the influence of syndicalist elements and consisting mostly of migratory workers, but the class struggle now has reached a far higher stage, the influence of our Party is a power-

ful factor making for the recognition of the

carried through on schedule. The delegates were housed and fed in a manner that raised the morale of the convention. The industrial conference and the conferences of Negro, youth and women workers were organized and held as part of the convention itself in spite of poor technical preparation and a great shortage of

Weak Preparations-A Concrete Instance.

The amount of work accomplished by the convention-agitational, propagandistic and organizational-could and should have been spread over a three or four day period and petter results accomplished. This was one of the greatest shortcomings of the convention which resulted directly from the general lack of preparation everywhere by our Party

Three hundred and seven steel and metal workers registered at the convention. The steel and metal (including auto) conference. At the National Conference of the Metal Workers Industrial League in Youngstown, June 14-15, 127 delegates were present. At the Chicago convention therefore, there were about two and one-half times as many metal workers present as at the Metal Workers National Conference.

Proper Connection Not Made.

This shows that not only did we fail before the Youngstown conference to make the proper connection between the struggles of the unemployed and employed in the steel and metal industry (as in all other industries) but that up to Chicago we had continued this error. Otherwise we would never have permitted ourselves to be placed in a position of having only an hour or two to prepare and hold a conference of steel and metal workers of the mass

character that the Chicago conference was. Had we not underestimated the response of the steel and metal workers to our unemployment program (and this is a result of an underestimation of the extent of rationalization and the depth of the economic crisis in this industry) we would have been able to broaden the base of the Metal Workers Industrial League and stimulate the struggles in the industry far more than we did.

While the large steel and metal workers delegation denotes a big response to our program and activity in this decisive industry. the total absence of textile workers from the convention does not indicate rising employment or lack of the will to struggle among the textile workers. In no industry is employment more severe. The influence of our Party and the National Textile Workers Union, and the will of the workers to fight, has been

Woman and Child Labor in Textiles

By VERN SMITH.

IT goes unchallenged that bad money drives out good money. The cheapest money replaces the better until nothing but cheap money circulates.

Wages and payrolls work that way, too. Cheap wages destroy higher wages. It does not exactly work silently. The air is full of the indignant shouts of those better paid wor ers in northern textile mills, for example, who have neglected to organize themselves or

ment work important or, if it does, is unable to connect it with the general work and struggles in the industry.

Another Instance.

A similar instance is brought into the sharpest relief by the fact that there was not a single unemployed miner from the huge anthracite and bituminous coal fields of Pennsylvania present at the convention. West Virginia sent 19, and Southern Illinois 11 but from the state of Pennsylvania with its 275,000 miners there was not a single delegate.

This instance shows the almost complete neglect of unemployment work in this basic industry, by the Party district offices in Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania, by the T. U. U. L. and the National Miners Union. One would suppose that with close to 50 per cent unemployment in the anthracite, and as much as 75 per cent unemployment in many bituminous fields of this state, that at least one Pennsylvania miner would stray accidentally into the Chicago convention. One is almost tempted to think that what work was done among the tens of thousands of unemployed Pennsylvania miners was directed to keeping them away rather than getting delegates to the Chicago

Many other instances of almost total neglect or extremely formal and weak conduct of the unemployment work could be cited but these are sufficient to show that the radicalization of the working class rather than planned and sustained activity on our part was responsible for the mass character of the Chicago convention. This is true to such an extent that it now constitutes a real danger which we must eliminate from this moment on in carrying out the program adopted by the convention.

their southern fellow workers, when they find the average wage of \$22.05 a week in Massachusett. (before the wage cuts) conflicts with an average of \$14.55 (full time) in Alabama, and as the bosses do not raise the Alabama average to the N. H., they try to equalize just the other way. Then the South where they boast of "cheap wages," proceeds to cut again, and so it goes.

Likewise when the boss in either place finds, as 'n Alabama, that he can get women for an average of \$11.45 (full time), he immediately begins to scheme how he can use them instead of his \$14.55 men. Then the unemployed men are rehired again at the women's wage, but Southern Chivalry (nice name for the bosses' swindle game) demands that women be the weaker sex and her wage probably goes down to \$8. (All figures from the United States Department Government Bureau of Labor Statistics.)

"Keen On White Women."

"Southern Cotton Mills and Labor," by Myra Page, says: "Because of the practice of sex discrimination in the wages, mill employers are especially keen on having white women in the mills. In the cotton growing states in 1919 women composed 36% of total textile wage earning group." The percentage of all women in industry was 24.5%.

Of course it works the same with children. From the very beginning the textile industry has been a hot bed of child slavery. Every improvement in machinery means that another child can take the place of a man or a woman. Lately the increase in child slavery has been a little slower simply because there is an unlimited supply of the cheapest adult labor. But with increased competition the still cheaper children will be drawn in. The 1920 census shows a little over 6% children in the southern mills. There are laws against very young child labor in some states, which means very little.

So we have cheap southern labor cheapening northern labor's wages because both are unorganized. We have cheap women's labor replacing slightly higher paid men's labor. And we have a cheap child labor competing with, replacing both men's and women's labor,

The Census Bureau and Chester

CONDITIONS for the workers in Chester are worse today than they were last winter. Five hundred men stand in front of the Sun Shipyard each morning hoping to get a job. Thousands have been laid off at Ford, Baldwin and other smaller plants.

The Census Bureau gives the false number of 1.818 unemployed in Chester. Ford himself laid off a couple of thousand workers. And along with unemployment come wage cuts. At the Irving Woolen Mills on and after June 2nd a reduction of 10% will be made on all piece and time work rates and the mill threatens to close down unless this cut is accepted.

And Only 1,818!

Saturday evening Anna Burlak was the speaker at a mass meeting called to protest the Atlanta outrages against the Southern workingclass fighters. The workers were enthus astic and pledged themselves to support the International Labor Defence. In Wilmington there is a terrible unemployment situation. Every plant in the town has been laying off workers. Yet the census takers could only find 1,881 unemployed
