Boss' Mob Given Access to N. C. Jail to Lynch Negro Worker Detroit AFL Head

Workers Fight for Jobs

THE extent of unemployment in New York City, and the growing hunger of the workers for jobs, is being daily shown at the recently opened municipal free employment bureau on Lafayette Street.

The bureau has only been opened four days. Already over 10,000 workers have been registered, and these were only a small part of those who stood in line for hours daily. The lines have been forming in the middle of the night-at 2 and 3 a. m.-and there the workers have stood until 8 a. m. with the scant hopes that they might be one of the fortunate dozen to get a job.

Yesterday morning when the doors of the bureau were opened the stampede of the hungry workers was so great that one man was trampled on and had to be sent to the Bellevue Hospital. Others, also badly injured, refused to leave the line for fear that by leaving they

Yet in four days jobs have been handed out to only 210 workers. Many thousands have stood in line, over 10,000 have been registered, and only 210 have been given work (and one, of course, will get free meals for a day or two at the Bellevue Hospital)-this is the sum total of Tammany Hall's contribution to the "solution" of the unemployment

This the workers must reject. The Tammany politicians must be told that an employment bureau is useless unless it can provide the workers with jobs. They must be told that in the absence of jobs the workers demand unemployment insurance. Instead of going to the municipal bureau on Lafayette Street at 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning fighting with one another for jobs that do not exist, the workers must go there in mass and serve a categorical demand for the immediate granting of unemployment insurance.

In the present situation, with the daily deepening of the economic crisis, the unemployed workers can expect no jobs. The only way to improve their conditions is to organize and fight to force the capitalists and their political agents to pay a minimum of \$25 per week to every unemployed worker during the period of his unemploymentthis is provided for by the Workers' Social Insurance Bill.

Chicago Politicians Sidestepping

EIGHT Chicago politicians yesterday, according to press reports, and a few more today, have had an opportunity to appear before special "investigators" and explain their relations with the underworld gangsters for which Chicago has become famous. All this troublesome business (for the politicians) has been caused by the discovery of the account books of the North Side Moran gang following the murder of the gangster, Jack Zuta, who in turn is supposed to have been responsible for the murder of the Chicago Tribune reporter, and underworld

A few dozen politicians, judges, aldermen, police officials, etc., have been uncovered up until now. July a few pages of the record have been examined; three hundred more are still to be gone through. These pages, if they were really examined, would completely expose the Thompson machine in Chicago, and the leading republican and democratic politicians throughout the state.

But they will never be examined. A few minor politicians, or those on the outs with the machine, will be sacrificed. The "investigation" will then be stopped before it reaches any of the higher ups.

The Chicago workers must have no illusions about the round-up of gangsters following the murder of Jake Lingle, or on the present investigation. The capitalists and their political henchmen in Chicago and in all other cities brought the organized underworld gangs into

They have proven themselves useful many times in the sharp competitive battles waged between rival capitalist groups as the Chicago Tribune well knows from the experience it gained in the circulation war with the Hearst press.

They are useful many times to capitalist politicians when it beomes necessary to shoot up election booths in order to win an election from political rivals and especially to prevent the election of workers' candidates.

And they are especially helpful when it becomes necessary to beat up, black-jack or murder workers during strikes and demonstrations, as was shown in the murder of Weizenberg, or to aid the police during raids on workers' halls, as has been shown by many raids on the Communist Party headquarters in Chicago.

It was these needs of the capitalists which created the gangsters, and while they sometimes go "too far," making it inconvenient for the bosses, they will continue to exist and flourish with the full support of the capitalists, their political agents, and the leaders of the A. F. of L., who also have use for them in their fight against the "reds."

The present fight in Chicago is merely a fight between different gangs, involving the political supporters of each. The extermination of gangs and gang murders will only take place with the extermination of capitalism. All those against gangsterism must support the struggle of the Communist Party and vote Communist in November.

Finally, the second cause. man in the glass case?" This hero never went out without galoshes, a quilted lined coat, and umbrella, in hot or cold weather. "Excuse me, but why do you wear galoshes and a thick overcoat in July, in this heat?" Byelikov was asked. "To be prepared for everything," replied Byelikov, "Something may happen; perhaps there will be a sudden frost, and what then?" (General laughter. Applause.) He detested anything new as if it were a pestilence; hated anything exceeding the bounds of ordinary daily life. A new restaurant was opened. Byelikov felt alarmed at once; to be sure a restaurant has its advantages, but it is to be hoped that nothing happens. A dramatic club was organized, a reading room opened, and Byelikov had his misgivings again: A dramatic club, a reading room—why all this? Take care that nothing happens (General laughter.).

The same thing must be said of the former leaders of the Right opposition. Do you remember the history of the subordination of the Technical Colleges to the economic authorities? We wanted to subordinate only two Technical Colleges to the Supreme National Economic Council; apparently only a small matter. But we encountered inexorable resistance from the Right. Two Technical Colleges under the Supreme National Economic Council? Whatever for? Is it not better to wait? Take care that nothing happens. And now the whole of our Technical Colleges are under the superintendence of the economic authorities, and nothing has happened-we still survive.

Or for instance, the question of the extraordinary measures against the kulaks. Do you remember the fits of hysterics into which the Right opposition fell in this connection? Extraordinary measures against the kulaks? What for? Is it not better to pursue a liberal policy towards the kulaks? Take care that nothing happens. And now we are carrying out the policy of the liquidation of the kulak as a class, a policy in comparison with which the extraordinary measures against the kulaks were a mere trifle. And nothing has happened-we

A New Wave of Struggle by Illinois Miners

By BILL GEBERT.

IN the coal field of Illinois there is a new wave of struggle of the miners against murderous rationalization and unemployment. Recent strikes in Saline County, the present strike of 2,000 miners in Zeigler, the strike in Peabody Mine No. 18 in West Frankfort, are just the first indications of the growing rebellion of the miners. The economic pressure on the miners is 'so hard that they cannot stand it any longer and they are simply forced to fight back. Wage cuts in all forms, speedup increasing from day to day and introduction of new machinery, mean that every month thousands of additional miners are forced out of the mines. The mines are "no longer mines but factories." Unemployment is severe throughout the field and those who are working do so only part time. Misery and starvation is general throughout the field.

It is no wonder that these conditions brought about struggles in Saline County and in Franklin County and that there is a growing sympathy for these strikes among the miners in other mines. This growing readiness for struggle is worrying the coal operators and their fascist and social fascist agents very much. Coal operators and city, county and state government, courts, police and fascist gangsters are all doing their bit to suppress the movement of the miners.

The raid on the office of the Illinois Section of the National Miners Union (now the Mine, Oil and Smelter Workers Industrial Union) in West Frankfort, smashing of the office and the burning of all records of the union and beating up and driving out of the county the leaders of the miners and representatives of the Trade Union Unity League are some of the methods used in the coal fields against militant miners.

Dangerous Methods.

But we want to say that much more dangerous methods are pursued by the coal operators to mislead the rebellious miners. Thanks to the opportunistic mistakes of the former leadership of the N.M.U. (Watts, Corbishly, Voyzey, Allard) and their anarchistic methods in handling the affairs of the union, the N.M.U. as an organizational force has been practically eliminated. This situation is exploited by the local fakers of the Lewis and Fishwick machines starting a so-called "rank and file movement" (which, by the way, has among its leaders a small coal operator, Sherman Steel of Muscutah). Thsee misleaders call a second State Rank and File Convention of the U.M. W.A." to be held in Bellville on August 26. The clear social fascist line of the leadership of this fake rank and file movement is very clearly exposed in a letter of John Ward and James Murry of West Frankford.

To James J. Davis, Secretary of Labor:

"Referring to your invitation which was published in the press inviting the operators and the miners of the bituminous coal field to get together and try to form some plan by which the confusion in the bituminous coal fields would be eliminate!.

"The great trouble as we see it at present is to find a man who would have the confidence of the rank and file of the bituminous fields to represent them in a conference such as you have in mind."

And Further On.

Further in the letter they state that the U.M.W.A. is "destroyed for all practical purposes in the bituminous field." This more clearly than anything else shows that the miners have no more faith in the fascist and social fascist leadership of the U.M.W.A. and therefore the leadership of the fake rank and file movement try to say that they are the only ones who can speak for the miners and so have the privilege of selling the miners to any one who will offer the best price.

Secretary of Labor Davis is very much interested that something be done to keep the miners in submission; he is alarmed over the opinion of one of the miners of West Frankfort who wrote him a letter telling him that "a general strike is imminent" as is shown in the letter written by Davis in answer to the miners' leter and published in the press in Southern Illinois.

The real face of the leaders of the fake rank and file movement and their true social fascist role is exposed clearly in their letter just referred to which declares for government subsidy for coal operators so, as they state, to 'put the operators on their feet financially."

Mr. Ward and Murray are interested in only one thing-to put the operators on their feet financially. They don't give a damn about the starving miners and their families, about the killing of miners as a result of the speed-up in the mines, but they are interested that operators should not lose anything in the present economic crisis, which hits the coal field hard, as well as the chronic crisis of the mining industry.

Mr. Davis is not the only one who is worried about the conditions. Billy Green, fascist president of the A. F. of L., is worried very much

"The extremists will capitalize the situation -will appeal to the feelings and will mobilize discontent so that it will be well nigh impossible for anyone to require the mine workers to observe the provision of the joint agreement or to conform to the laws, rules and practice of the organized labor move-

Two Conclusions.

All these facts clearly show two things. (1) The social fascist character of the leadership of this so-called "rank and file" movement. (2) That the operators, government, fascist and social fascist leadership of the A. F. of L. and U.M.W.A. are worried very much as to the possibilities of organizing and leading the miners in the struggle against rationalization, unemployment and for increased wages, shortening of the working hours and social insurance for unemployed workers.

The struggle can be organized only by the Mine, Oil and Smelter Workers Industrial

We must also clearly understand the demogogical propaganda of the social fascist leaders of the so-called rank and file movement with their left phrases which are misleading the miners. They claim they are against both Lewis and Fishwick, Howatt and Peabody, that they are even for the program of the N.M.U. but they cannot affiliate with the movement because it is a red movement.

Left Phrases.


It is not a surprise that the social fascists use left phrases. Otherwise they simply cannot speak to the miners. The Mine, Oil and Smelter Workers Industrial Union can take advantage of this situation and is taking advantage by fighting against the social fascist of the rank and file movement, exposing their role and fighting for independent leadership and struggle by the miners. In local unions of the U.M.W.A. where elections are taking place to send delegates to the fake "rank and file" convention, miners put up candidates who are members of the new miner union and fighting for its independent leadership and program. They are electing delegates to the convention by the local unions of the M.O.S.W.I.U., to fight there for the M.O.S.W.I.U.

This activity cannot be confined to the inside of the local unions. A broad campaign must be started exposing the fake leaders and linked up with the economic every day struggle of the miners in every mine, setting up mine committees to undertake the immediate tasks and organizing miners for strike, for spreading local strikes. The unemployment movement must be organized and find expression in mass demonstrations on Labor Day throughout the coal fields. The economic struggle of the miners must be brought to a higher political "age by bringing into the coal field the elec' 'n campaign of the Communist Party. The election campaign of the Communist Party must unite all the strugles of the miners and poor farming population in that region which is also on the point of starvation, and make a united struggle against capitalism and the

capitalist government. Throughor this campaign the social ascist character of the leaders of the fake rank and file movement must be fully understood by everybody. The fight against this can be carried out successfully only when not a single

or anizational question is overlooked. Miners will follow the union and the Party

when we clearly set the facts before them.



Some Lessons of August First

N connection with August First, we gained new experiences, and lessons must be learned regarding these experiences and the many shortcomings that we still have in our efforts to mobilize the masses.

Situation Favorable for August 1st Demonstration.

First of all, it must be recognized that the political situation for mobilizing masses was more favorable than ever before. There was a deepening of the economic crisis, growing unemployment, the beginning of a national wagecutting offensive of employers, sharpening war danger against the Soviet Union, increasing offensive against all workers' revolutionary organizations-the Fish Committee, Root's proposal for federal police, the pope's attack against the Communist Party of the U.S.A., martial law against Flint auto workers' strike, the arrests and terror in the mining fields, intensified lynching campaign against the Negroes in the South, increasing imprisonments of Communists all over the country. There was growing resistance and a rising spirit of struggle among the workers against the offensive of employers and ruling class.

Our Mobilization on August 1st Not Equal to March 6.

Upon the basis of this favorable situation, we should have been able to mobilize the masses for the August First demonstration in greater numbers than ever before. What were then the reasons that we were only able to mobilize about 150,000 workers as compared to over 1.000,000 on March Sixth." Did we fail to do the accessary preparatory

work? As compared to March 6th and May 1st, we think it is only correct to say that our preparatory work was much better planned and much more systematic than ever before, perhaps with a few exceptions.

Looking irto the reasons why we were not able to probilize as great numbers of workers as our efforts would have warranted, we must recognize that the capitalist class adopted different tactics than on March 6th and May

Capitalists Use New Tactics.

First of all capitalist newspapers tried o kill our mobilization by maintaining complete silence about August First, whoreas before the March Sixth and May First they gave us big publicity. Therefore on August First. reached only those masses that we were able to mobilize directly by our own means.

Second, while on August First there were fewer attacks by the police against our demonstrations, the police did everything possible to smash our preparations, especially in and at the shops, by attacking us at shop gate meetings and jailing our speakers and organizers, thereby crippling our forces which were badly needed in the preparatory work.

Third, while there was a temporary embargo against Soviet imports to this country, the embargo was lifted just a few days before August First which created illusions not only among the masses, but also partly among our own comrades regarding the lessening of preparations for attack against the Soviet Union. These are some examples of the changing tactics by the bourgeoisie and for this change of tactic by our enemies, we were not prepared.

It must also be taken into consideration that. because of the political backwardness of the American workers, the question of the war danger is not yet as great a factor for the mobilization of masses as is the question of unemployment. Therefore the me as ready to demonstrate against the imper-

ialist war danger as they were against unem-

ployment. Especially this was the case because our comrades in the Districts, even District Committees, did not understand how to connect the struggle against the war with the struggle against unemployment.

Our Shortcomings. Then, of course, we must observe a number

of shortcomings.

First of all, the greatest shortcoming was that, although repeated instructions were given by the Central Committee that the main efforts should be concentraed on the shops, the preparatory work in the shops was very insufficient. There were more shop gate meetings and more leaflet distributions in the shop districts than ever before, but on account of insupplifient and weak shop committees and Trade Union Unity League groups, our work inside of the shops was still very weak.

Our preparatory work on the basis of United Front Conferences was almost a complete failure. Although concrete instructions were given by the Party center, our comrades were unable to organize United Front Conferences. In many places our functionaries took the attitude that the United Front would organize itself. They sent only a formal written call for the conference and did not take the trouble to send comrades to organize delegates to attend these United Front Conferences, and even in those Districts where more serious efforts were made, our comrades did not seem to know how to organize United Front Conferences. This is a very serious shortcoming and contributed very greatly to our inability to mobilize bigger demonstrations. It is therefore very necessary that the whole Party should study the concrete methods of United Front.

We Failed to Link Unemployment With Imperialist War Danger.

We failed to link up the question of unemployment with the question of fighting against imperialist war danger. This was clearly shown from reports of District Organizers in which they claimed that they were not able to mobilize more workers from the shops because of great numbers of unemployed. At the same time, they failed to report why they were unable to mobilize greater numbers of

On account of our poor fraction work in the language mass organizations (which in many cases is completely lacking), and on account of a wrong attitude towards language work of many of our District leaders, we were not able to use these sympathetic language organizations to the extent that could have been possible.

Although we have to a great extent overcome the right opportunistic passivity, there is still a great amount of it which is hampering our Party in the mass mobilization. There is no longer an open resistance to the policy of struggle, but passive resistance is still there, and this was a big factor in the August First mobilization. This means that we must continue to struggle energetically against this right opportunistic passivity.

In spite of the fact that in most cases very energetic preparatory work was done not all comrades in the sections and units were assigned to specific work in the preparation.

Very little preparatory work was done in the A. F. of L. unions. This shows complete lack of understanding of the Party trade union policy and shows a strong tendency to give up the workers in the old unions.

Preparations For Demonstrations Must Be Linked With Party Building. A very big shortcoming is the tendency, which seems to prevail in almost all the Districts, to regard demonstrations as something

Unemployment and Wage Cuts in Illinois THE economic conditions in Illinois, as shown

in the growth of unemployment and wage cuts, reflect the general trend of the deepening of the crisis throughout the country. This is due to the strategic economic importance of the industries located in Illinois and nearby, such as mining, machinery, steel, Southern Illinois coal fields, the farm implements machine industry. Chicago, being the oldest and largest agricultural trading center, shows the effects of the agricultural crisis in its industries, mail order houses, etc.

An examination of the official Labor Department figures for the month of June, in spite of their attempts to minimize the meaning of those figures, bring out very glaringly the trend in the state.

The Labor Bulletin of the Illinois Department of Labor in its July issue in reviewing the industrial situation of June states the fol-

"Manufacturing employment in Illinois cities has decreased steadily each month since last September with the sole exception of February, in which month a slight increase was reported. The decrease during the period of May 15 to June 15 was 2.4 per cent, the most severe drop so far this year. The decline reported this month was the largest decrease in factory employment reported for any June since 1924, and the June employment index figure of 91.2 is lower than for any June on record-that is, since 1923. The decrease in factory employment was again intensified by an increase in part time work as shown by a 5.0 per cent decrease in payroll and a 4.7 per cent decrease

in man hours of work." We note that employment decrease beginning with last September, and steadily at that. It is also interesting to note that in addition to permanent unemployment, there is a great deal of part time employment. Workers having been out of work since last September and many of these working part time have indeed reached the level of starvation. The report also states that: "The decrease in industrial activity was again general throughout the state;" in other words, practically every locality and every section of the working class in the state was effected by the crisis.

The Bulletin is also compelled to report the following:

"Industrial operations continued quiet during June, with the volume of employment and payrolls again showing reductions from the figures of the preceding month. Reports from 1,365 industrial establishments in all parts of the state indicate a decline of 2.0 per cent in the number of wage earners employed, and of 3.3 per cent in payrolls. This brings employment to a level 10.7 per cent below the figure of a year ago. The volume of employment in Illinois is now smaller than at any time since the depression period of 1921. Monthly indexes of employment have been complied by this office since January, 1922. The lowest employment index figures previously reached during the entire period 1922-1930 was 91.3 in April, 1928. The index for June, 1930 fell to 90.7." (My emphasis.

Wage Cuts Increase.

In this statement, as well as in the statements which we will quote from the Bulletin, it is quite obvious that alongside of the increase in unemployment there is also an increase in wage cuts for those who are "fortunate" enough to remain at work. The depth of the crisis can also be gathered from the statement that "the volume of employment in Illinois is now smaller than at any time since

the depression period in 1921." How basic the crisis is can also be seen from the official report, namely, "manufacturing industries have shown the effects of the present industrial depression more than theso-called non-manufacturing industries." Further: "metals, machinery and conveyances, the most important of the manufacturing groups. showed a decided downward trend in employment during June, the curtailment exceeding that of any previous June since 1924. This marks the reduction of 5.4 per cent in volume of employment and it was accompanied by a 9.4 per cent less in payrolls." Here again we the growth of wage cuts go hand in hand

with unemployment. Chicago being one of the largest and most important industrial sections in the state. shows definite and visible signs of the crisis. The official report for the month of, June (which we quote below) shows very clearly the following: (1) no break in the growth of unemployment; (2) the growth of wage cuts, and (3) the most important industries are affected by the crisis.

"The seventh consecutive decrease in industrial activity was recorded for June, with a decrease of 2.1 per cent in factory employment and 4.2 per cent in payrolls. An employment decline was reported in seven of the ten major industrial groupings. The metals and machinery industries reported a decrease of 5.3 per cent in employment, while the textile groups decreased employment 4.7 per cent and the furs and leather goods group 4.5 per cent."

separate from the every-day Party work. This has developed the tendency to organize demonstations in order to carry out the instructions of the Central Committee and to achieve some record for the District. This is a very dangerous attitude and must be overcome immediately. All the mass demonstrations must be regarded as measurements of the Party activities among the masses and as mobilizations for further struggles. Preparations for demonstrations must be linked up with the Party building. To prepare abstractly for demonstrations only is wrong.

There are a number of other shortcomings than can be enumerated. For instance, the Daily Worker and the Party press generally, was not supplied with concrete material from the Districts. This is not the shortcoming of our District Committees only. This shows our failure to organize workers correspondence

We must also note that only in a very new reports is there mention of recruiting of new members to our Party or to the T.U.U.L. Perhaps in Oakland, Cal., the best results were secured where 26 new members joined our Party. There are a few other places where some new members joined. With little effort, hundreds, perhaps thousands, of new members could have been recruited. This shows how loosely August First work was connected with the Party building task. We must learn that success of our demonstration cannot be judged only according to the number of participants, but according to what organizational results we are able to draw from our propaganda. That is how many new members are recruited for the Party, for the T.U.U.L., for unemployed councils and how many new subscribers are gotten for the Party press Much more efforts should be made in our future demon strations for this end.

The general lesson that we must draw from August First, is that we must redouble our efforts in the future mobilizations. We must do more political work, more propaganda work | of the T.U.U.L.

and much more systematic organizational work in preparing our future demonstrations.

Now that we have already the experiences of two August First, March Sixth and May First Demonstrations, and especially the fresh experiences of the last August First demonstrations with the changed tactics of our enemies, we must base our preparations for September First unemployed mobilization on these experiences and make all efforts to overcome the shortcomings we still have.

Party Work Must Center in Shop Nuclei. For instance, August First showed that our

failures were mainly in the big cities, whereas, in numerous small industrial towns our Party was able to mobilize a surprisingly large number of workers. This difference was due to the fact that in small industrial cities our Party is rooted more deeply in the industries than in the big cities. Therefore we must pay particular attention to changing our Party from the street nuclei basis to the basis of shop nuclei in the big cities.

There are many more concrete lessons to be drawn and they must be brought out and

Although sharpest self-criticism is necessary in the light of our August First demonstrations, there is not the least reason for pes-

Compared with March Sixth, we well far low on August First, but compared with May First, our August First, with all shortcomings, was a fairly good achievement and shows that our Party was able to mobilize and lead the masses, and that we are on the

road of becoming a mass Party. But our Party can go towards greater success only if we redouble our efforts not only in the organization of demonstrations, but in the every-day work of building the Party upon a mass basis, on the basis of shop nuclei, simultaneously building the revolutionary unions
