Expose the Bosses' Lies; **Strike Against Wage Cuts!**

O^N several occasions the Daily Worker has branded as lies the state ments of leading bankers, manufacturers, and politicians who declared their opposition to wage cuts on the theory, as they put it, "that the return of national prosperity was dependent on high wages:" We have repeatedly charged that this was pure hokum designed to deceive the workers, to lull the workers to sleep, while these same bosses and their agents prepared by means of mass lay-offs, speed-ups and wage cuts to load the whole burden of the economic crisis on the shoulders of the workers, and to return to prosperity at the expense of the workers, if they could.

The workers' correspondence received by the Daily Worker has more than justified these charges. Every day their letters contain reports of wage cuts in three or four industries located in as many different cities. This has convinced us, and we have so stated, that all this talk recently in the daily papers about "no wage cuts" was merely the smoke screen behind which a real nation-wide drive was being launched to ruthlessly slash wages.

Now we are in a position to cite a concrete example of the most brazen kind of lying to prove the correctness of our position.

In the June 28th edition of the Financial Chronicle, James A. Campbell, the chairman of the Board of Directors of the Youngstown Sheet & Tube, made the following declaration which has since been widely quoted by all the prosperity blabbers:

"We are unalterably opposed," he said, "to any reduction in wages. We believe it very harmful to the recovery of business." In last Thursday's Dajly Worker a worker correspondent employed by the Sheet & Tube declared:

"All kinds of methods are used to cut our wages in an indirect way while the bosses are preparing to cut the wages of every man openly.'

Such reports convinced us that Campbell and his ilk were plain, brazen liars. Today's press reports, by announcing a direct wage cut in the Youngstown Sheet & Tube mills of 70 cents a ton, merely further prove our contention, and they also justify the contention of our correspondent about the bosses' preparations for direct wage cuts there.

Campbell's talk about "no wage cuts" and his careful maneuvers in the mills to put over the cuts indirectly or on a single department basis, we repeat, were merely the preparatory steps to enable his firm to put through direct wage cuts without arousing strike sentiment among its employes.

The statements of Lehman, Green, Farrel and innumerable others during the past few days are designed only to prepare the ground for wage cuts.

These lying declarations, accompanied by wage cuts everywhere, must arouse the workers. The workers must prepare to strike. It must likewise, and especially, arouse the organizers of the revolutionary industrial unions and leagues affiliated to the T. U. U. L.

We might frankly ask. "Where is the Metal Workers' Industrial League in Youngstown?" The same question could be put to all of the unions and leagues. And everywhere we would have to recognize an unpardonable slowness in developing the organization work in preparation for strike struggles against these wage cuts.

In view of this national wage slashing offensive we must emphasize the need of preparing for strikes. We cannot wait until the workers themselves walk out. The entire forces of the Party and the unions and leagues of the T. U. U. L. must immediately make this preparatory work their major task. The first step is the organization of shop committees in the factories. These must be broadened by means of a thorough propaganda in the shops to expose the lies of the bosses

Knowing the deep discontent of the masses and the growing mass sympathy for the Communists, he first demagogically whines that he might "be mistaken for a radical, a Communist, or a bolshevik" and then goes on to state that he will make "a practical, definite study of unemployment insurance, avoiding, of course, any form of dole."

All of which means absolutely nothing. 8,000,000 workers are unemployed today. The number is increasing. Before the legislature meets and completes his proposed "study" the workers, who are already starving, will be dead. What the workers want is not "study," but food and they want it at once.

Even the capitalist press in its opposition to unemployment insurance sees through the fakery behind this demagogical speech of the governor. The Herald-Tribune quite correctly states:

These problems (a concrete program for the realization of unemployment insurance .- Editor) the governor neglects to discuss; but without a discussion of them, to advocate state unemployment insurance is merely to raise false hopes.'

They also guess that "his real hope is directed rather toward the production of votes in November" than toward helping the unemployed workers.

The speech of Governor Roosevelt was a criminal playing with the misery and suffering of the unemployed with the connivance of the fakers of the A. F. of L.

The workers must not be deceived. As opposed to his proposed "study" the masses must rally behind the Unemployment Insurance Bill of the Communist Party. WHITE TERROR IN CUBA

$T^{\rm HE}$ shadow of Siles of Bolivia, and now of Leguia of Peru, both ruthless fascist dictators, hangs over Machado, the bloody tyrant of Cuba-all three the servile creatures of Wall Street, the first two dislodged overnight by military revolt maneuvered by British imperialism. When will Machado meet his doom, and at the hand of what class?

While these are questions the future will answer, the workers of the United States must help answor them, must shield their Cuban comrades, who for years have endured the most savage repression. Their unions are being destroyed, the Communist Party attacked -to bolster up the rule of the same Wall Street capitalists who exploit and oppress us.

Year after year, the most outstanding leaders of the working class of Cuba are being killed through various means. Bruzon and Yalob were thrown into the Bay of Havana to become prey of the sharks; Alfredo Lopez, Dumenigo, Vareno, Grant, Torres Diaz, Santiago Brooks were either shot in the streets, or "disappeared," or were assassinated in the dungeon prison cells where hundreds of more vicknown and unknown, are still to be found

The economic crisis in the United States and the New York Stock Exchange crash have further deepened the sugar crisis in the island resulting in the lowest price of sugar ever recorded in the history, the consequences of which are shown in the closing of the mills, the partial paralyzation of other industries and the most barbarous system of rationalization. Cuba, with a population of 3,600,000, has 500,000 unemployed. This unemployment has of late greatly increased with a new wave of the bosses' offensive.

To the increasing misery and starvation, the oppressed masses have answered with more revolutionary action, thus sharpening the class struggle. During the last six months more than 200 strikes took place affecting every branch of industry and thousands of workers. On January 10th of this year, memorial day for Julio Antonio Mella, killed by agents of Machado, the Cuban workers went on a general political strike in memory of their fallen leader. March 20 saw in Cuba more than 200,000 workers in demonstrations against unemployment and in protest against the crimes of fascism. More than 100,000 workers laid down their tools throughout the country on May Day.

The increased militancy of the workers led by the Communist Party and the National Workers' Confederation of Labor, accentuated the instability of the imperialist regime of tyrainy headed by butcher Machado.

Fascism in Cuba tried to broaden its social basis by taking into its governmental bosom ements of the Nationalist Party, the Party of "opposition," pretending to represent the interests of the urban and agrarian pettybourgeoisie expropriated by imperialism, but founding all its policy upon surrender to imperialism

But all efforts made to obtain the stabilization of fascism have completely failed. This is why the persecutions are now intensified more and more against the workers and peasants. Fifty workers were arraigned before the courts and many more were added to the list before and after the March 20th demonstrations

The National Workers' Confederation of Labor, the Workers' Federation of Havana and forty more working class trade unions were declared illegal and their assemblage prohibited. The Workers' International Defense was also declared illegal and its leaders persecuted. At the May Day demonstration in Havana two militant workers, Montergo and Perez, were killed by the police and more than forty workers brutally slugged.

Deportations are taking place every day. During the last days of June, forty Spanish workers were deported to Spain. On Aug. 16, seven more Spanish workers were deported from Cuba, jailed in the ship which passed by New York. These seven workers were kept jail for four months without any trial. Hundreds of workers are rotting in jail and being tortured daily.

The protest meeting against the deportations organized by the Workers' International Defense was attacked by the police and four workers were seriously wounded. Eighty workers lie in the prison of Havana. ' The majority of these workers will undoubtedly be condemned to long prison terms and others deported.

On Sunday, Aug. 17, Jose Wong, a militant leader of the Chinese workers of Cuba was killed in his prison cell. The outstanding leaders of the workers of Havana now in jail are daily threatened to be brutally assassinated in their cells or tortured by inquisitatorial means used by the fascist regime.

The working class of the United States must not be indifferent to these crimes perpetrated by American imperialism and its agents 'in Cuba. This is the same imperialism that exploits and persecutes us here, that is responsible for the wage cuts, unemployment and speed up against workers in the United States. Workers organizations throughout the United States, whether trade union, fraternal, political or cultural, are asked to join by resolution in protest against the savage white terror against the Cuban workers, to demand the release of all political prisoners, to express their solidarity wit' the Cuban workers, groaning and bleeding in the chains of "Butcher" Machado, and to express that solidarity substantially in contributions to their defense, to be sent to the International Labor Defense, room 430, 80 E. 11th St., New York City, for safe dispatch to Cuba.

"Cowards"

The New York Telegram, as N'Yorkers will know, though people in the provinces may not, has more than one edition each day. And thereby hangs a tale. On Thursday, Aug. 22, we, who were still allowed at large under a capitalist regime growing ever more desirous of sending us to the electric chair for distributing leaflets, i.e., becoming more fascist, bought a noon edition of the Telegram. We were interested in seeing on the editorial page under the space devoted to letters from readers. the following letter (of which we thoroughly approve) under the heading which said, "Replies to Comment on Flight from Gastonia, N. C.," and bearing the signatures of some one named Francis Sheehy, to wit:

"When from the security of an editorial chair, you presume to brand as cowards labor agitators fleeing from long terms in prison, from the living death imposed by the ruling class for the classic crime of 'stirring up the people,' it seems to me you take an unworthy attitude.

"The men of whom you write so scorn-fully, demonstrated an abundant courage when they invaded a stronghold of reaction, provincial prejudices and quick violence, and there raised up a rebellion against the slavedriving oligarchy of raw, unchastened industrialism

"Theirs was, in my view, an historic achievement, a landmark in the toilsome evolution of the American South from barbarism to civilization. And now, if they are unwilling to expiate their heroism by endless years in inhuman cages and walled yards, you point the contemptuous finger and cry 'Coward'!"

From Mr. Sheehy's comment that the Telegram's attack on the Gastonia victims as cowards was "unworthy" of that hypocritical capitalist sheet, we gather that he is not a Communist, although his opinion as a whole should be held by every Communist. Calling the Gastonia defendants' action in escaping from a fascist death sentence is entirely worthy" of an editor of a capitalist newspaper and those who agree with capitalist newspapers. But to top it all, we started to show this healthy mass response to a correct policy to one of those who thinks we are still living in the "democratic" era of President Harding's malcy. when we discovered that in the later (4 p. m.) edition of the Telegram, all the other "Letters From Readers" were there, but the one bawling out the Telegram editor for being the one that played a cowardly role-was missing. The darn thing just vanished after the editor looked over the first edition, and in its place was-what do you think? A long item on weather reports from 44 different cities, including the time the moon rises and sets and when it is high tide at Hell Gate and Sandy Hook! Strike Strategy

By JACK JOHNSTONE.

Workers! Demonstrate On Unemployment Day, Sept. First!

THE great teacher, experience, is driving home to us the lesson that strike struggles must be properly prepared. This, however, must not be approached mechanically. It does not mean merely that a definite percentage of the workers must be organized into shop committees, the revolutionary unions and leagues, etc., although this is a prerequisite for successful struggle. Are the conditions favorable for a strike? Is the mood of the workers for strike struggle? Does the situation require or allow more time for further preparations before the strike is called? Shall we develop single shop or department strikes as part of the preparations? These and many other questions have to be asked and answered in the preparations for strike struggles.

Rank and File Strike Committees. Preparations for strike must be carried out on the basis that the workers shall form broad rank and file strike committees, not after the strike has been called, but in preparation for the struggle, and where the fascist company unions are making pretenses of strike struggle or framing up with employers for a lockout, the slogan: "Take the strike or lockout into your own hands or else you will be defeated" must be raised and put into effect. The exposure of the fascist A. F. of L. and socialist leadership is an essential part of strike preparations. One of the essentials in the preparatory period is the organization of shop committees on the basis of the united front from below, the holding of shop delegate conferences, and the setting up of permanent shop delegate councils.

this respect the question of bringing forward certain demands become of major importance. The 7-hour, 5-day week is the major demand in this period, while this important strike struggle demand is economic in form, it is highly political in content, and goes hand in hand with the fight for unemployment insurance around which both the employed and unemployed worker can be organized for joint struggle.

Strike Struggle Fund Essential.

In preparation for strike struggle the question of a strike struggle fund must be raised and ways and means found to make the fund an impressive one. To wait until the strike has been called before beginning to raise a strike fund is entirely wrong, or to consider such a fund as a basis of relief by which the worker will win a victory over the bosses is wrong. A strike struggle fund is neeled for strike preparations, and questions of relief measures of course must be taken up as part of the preparatory work, but strikes are not

as was seen in the recent Flint auto strike of 5.000 auto workers, where the youth were most militant in the battles with the state troopers. National Guard, Chicago gangsters and local police.

In order to lay the basis for real effective work among the young auto workers, the Auto Workers Union and the T.U.U.L. The conference is not an end in itself, but merely • means of laying the basis for organizing this bload movement of rising discontent. The conference will mean nothing if it is not followed up with tedious, systematic, routine, everyday organizational work in the shops among the young workers. This conference will lay the basis for the formation of real youth sections in the existing shop locals of the Auto Workers Union such as Fords, Briggs, La Young, Chrysler, Fisher Body, Hudson, etc.

The T.U.U.L. Youth Department and the Youth Committee of the union are concentrating on the most important shops where previous organizational work has been done with the definite organizational objective of forming groups of young workers in the various departments to be represented at this conference. A series of shop-gate and organizational youth meetings are being held and many more are plannel. Every shop that has been chosen as a concentration shop will be covered twice a week with shop-gate meetings. Youth shops in Flint, Pontiac, Muskegon, Cleveland, etc., are being taken into consideration in the plan.

These struggles in the auto industry must be systematically prepared consciously by means of preparatory work. This can and will be done only if we correctly approach the young workers simply on their specific youth issues and grievances, and show them that only through organization and fight can they better their conditions. However, we cannot organize the workers merely by shop-gate meetings on the outside, but must properly coordinate and supplement this with constant bammeing away on the inside of the shops through personal agitation and personal connections. The whole campaign for the auto youth conference must be conducted on the basis of their youth grievances under the general poli sal slogan of "Organize to strike aggingt wave-cuts and speed-up!", at the same time rio triping the slogan of social insurance for the young workers to the fore-ground. | insurance!

office but they determine who should hold such offices.'

That should be clear to every worker. Fiftynine men, including Rockefeller, Mellon, Morgan, Ford, Farrell, Van Sweringen, Raskob, Insul, Du Pont, Lamont, Owen D. Young, are running the country. They are the bankers and industrialists who determine the policy of the government. They are the people who select the candidates, put up the money and see to it that the men they want are elected.

They select the candilates of both the republican and democratic parties and decide among themselves who shall support and finance the republican and democratic party. Insull supported both parties.

There is no difference between these parties. Look at the discussions and votes on the London Naval Treaty, the Smoot-Hawley tariff, the discussions on the prohibition law. It is not one party against the other, but, if there are any differences, they are inside both parties.

Now the Democrat's Raise the "Prosperity" Issue.

Then why do the capitalists have two parties and use a third party-the socialist party? They have them for the purpose of shifting from one to the other in case of an economic or political crisis, such as we had in 1913 and have now. Al Smith says: "The democratic party will soon be in control in Washington and will make this a happy and prosperous nation."

The democrats are in control in New York City and State and unemployment is about the worst in years. Bread lines, tens of thousands asking for work at the employment bureaus; few jobs to give; wage cuts; evictions-this is the prosperity in democratic New York. The some in republican Philadelphia; dispossessed workers housed in the sheds at the county fair at socialist Reading, Pa.

But this is not all. Jacob Panken, candidate of the "socialist" party for congress, will be supported by the republican party; Norman Thomas is being supported by the Times (Adolph Ochs is the owner and one of the fifty-nine mentioned by Gerard), the Telegram (Howard, the owner is also listed among the fifty-nine) and the Worll; Heywood Broun is supported by the Telegram and by a group of writers, actors and song writers including Irving Berlin, son-in-law of Clarence Mackay, head of the Rostal Telegraph Co., Ethel Barrymore, Alexander Woolcott, Walter White and James Weldon Johnson (traitors to the Negro race)-none of whom even know what socialism means. But being that the socialist party is a third capitalist party, they know they are safe.

The "Socialists"-the Last Reserve of Capitalism.

All this is emphasized by the British labor party's government acting to the satisfaction of British imperialism; in India, Egypt, etc. and with the workers at home; the German capitalists using the social-democratic party to lead the government of Germany whenever a sharp turn has to be made. The same holds The United Front From Below.

The organizing of the workers on the basis of the shop is a fundamental necessity. This does not mean, however, that only those who are ready to join the TUUL or a revolutionary industrial union are qualified for membership in the shop committee. While all efforts must be made to draw the workers into the revolutionary unions and must be the organizational objective, the shop committee is the basic form of the united front from below, the objective being to organize the workers, unorganized, members of the A. Develop Rank and File Initiative.

The preparations for strike struggle should be carried out in a manner that will develop rank and file initiative, the propaganda for creation of broad rank and file strike committees should be subject for discussion in the shop and factory so that the need for these militant organs of struggle will emanate from the ranks of the workers, and when they are created they will not be a mere mechanical elected committee but a broad rank and file committee that will give life and leadership to the strike.

The organizing of the unemployed into industrial councils of unemployed is a central point in the preparation for any strike at all. In

Bessemer City Strike and Boss Press

EVER since the outbreak of the textile strike in Bessemer City, the bosses' newspapers have been carrying stories to the effect that the workers have "chased the N.T.W.U. organizers out of the city." That "a bunch of Reds direct from Moscow have come here to take part in the strike, etc." and "that the workers have beaten up several of the N.T. W.U. organizers and chased them out of the city."

The National Textile Workers Union has been in Bessemer City prior to the strike and is in there now directing, meeting with the workers, and constantly warning them against the gang that has put itself at the head of the strike misleading the workers, and eventually will sell out the strike. A mob of about 24 has been organized by the stools of Mr. Goldberg, the purpose of this mob is to terrorize the union workers, and to watch out for union organizers.

On Monday, 5:50 p. m., this gang, led by W. E. Gilippspe, fake preacher, and agent of the bosses, followed J. Cooper for about two blocks, when Cooper seeing this stopped and faced them, Mr. Gilippspe suddenly started after another worker who was standing and looking to see what was going to happen, after giving this worker a few kicks, and telling him to get the "hell out of this city" a group of strikers rushed over and started a fight with the gang for having beaten up the worker. The result was that all were arrested, and the strikers had to pay \$15 fine for beating up the mob. (Capitalist class justice?)

The workers of Bessemer City, many of whom are members of the union, are anxious to have the union lead the strike, but have not yet been able to kick the gang out of their midst.

The workers are warned by the N.T.W.U. that these lawyers, stool pigeons of the bosses, preachers, etc., are not interested in winning the strike or better conditions for the workers, they are in this for what they will get out
