THE textile capitalists of New England have often acted as the most outspoken of American imperialism, even though they are not the decisive factor in determining the policies of finance capital. They furnished the republican party with its national chairman, Mr. Butler, in the 1924 campaign when the immortal Coolidge was "put over." They dominate the capitalist circles of the New England States. The "New Bedford Times" is one of the chief spokesmen of this group of bandits. This paper, in its issue of Dec. 23, after quoting with approval the words of Sir Henri Deterding, head of the British oil trust, calling for economic war against the Soviet Union, adds its own contribution in the following

"We would point out emphatically that the United States must not delay or hesitate in such matters. It is a case of fight now against the Soviet or be devoured by the Soviet after we have been reduced so to be unable to fight.

"And with proper economic campaigns against the U. S. S. R. let us not forget plenty of armaments."

Every worker who fails to understand that now is being prepared var against the Soviet Union, and who therefore fails to do his full part 1 fighting against this war, is becoming one of the dupes and tools of the apitalist-imperialists. Every "socialist" of the type of Norman Thomas, who pooh-poohs the war-danger, is a direct agent of these war makers.

Workers must prepare to fight to the death against this war. They must prepare to realize for the capitalists that fear which was expressed for them in the New York Times of Dec. 26, that such a war will "infallibly let loose a civil war in which the belligerent government

# This Must Be Stopped!

(by way of the Mexican press in the United States), that two Mexican peasants, horribly disfigured and pierced with bullets of the Yankee frontier guards, were found on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande.

And this is not the first time, says the report, that Yankee frontier guards have dared to violate the Mexican frontier and commit depredations. The "Nacional" of Chicago gives the completely justifiable response of the Mexican residents of Juarez, that—"the next time the American guards cross to the Mexican side, they will be received with bullets."

The "Mexican authorities" are, of course, greatly troubled about such eventualities. But the Mexican government, completely fascist and completely servile to American imperialism, makes only the pretense of protest. Meanwhile it encourages the attrocious treatment of Mexicans in the United States by its acceptance of the infamous Harris Law, barring Menican workers from the United States, the law upon which thousands of Mexican workers, their wives and children are being rounded up like eattle and driven across the frontier.

The Mexican government, faithful to the interests of the imperialists looting the country under the Lamont Agreement and loyal to the reactionary latifundista landholders in stopping even what little distribution of land that was hitherto done, has robbed the Mexican masses of the small measure of gains won by the revolution of the masses. It is completely reactionary and fascist, an ally of Yankee imperialism in the robbery and oppression of the workers and peasants of Mexico.

Hence the Mexican government has murdered and imprisoned militant workers. It jails arbitrarily Mexican Communists and trade union leaders such as Comrade Campa, head of the Unitary Trade Union Confederation, precisely as a service to Yankee imperialism.

Hence the Mexican government pretends that it has done its full duty when it "wins the concession" (what a concession!) that the thousands of Mexican women and children, brutally herded into prison on the American side by the U.S. Department of Justice, be cared for by the Mexican "Blue Cross," the counterpart of the hypocritical Red Cross of

Tens of thousands of these Mexican workers have lived long years in the United States. They are a part of the working class in this coun-But by agreement between the Washington and Mexican governments, they are set upon, arrested, torn from their families and even these families are thrown into prison and finally whipped across the border. They are told they are here "illegally," the old excuse to justify persecution of

militant foreign born workers. But the American working class knows that any action it takes in defense of its interest against the employers is "illegal" in the eyes of apitalist government. So it scorns all such "reasons" behind which the Jexican government hides its surrender to imperialism.

No matter what the servile Mexican regime of Ortiz Rubio consents to the revolutionary workers of the United States, the Communists and militant trade unionists of the Trade Union Unity League, protests at this attack on Mexican workers in this country, and demands the repeal of the infamous Harris Law under which our class brothers of Mexican blood are being persecuted!

Word has been received from Marfa, Texas, a small town near an army post, not far from San Antonio, that swarms of jobless stormed the city jail when the first bitter cold weather struck, and that the police met them with 30-30 rifles. No casualties were reported, but that was probably just luck. The freezing, starving jobless demanded the right to sleep in the jail, and rifles were used to keep them from breaking in.

One Meal Only.

Now the city authorities in Marfa permit a jobless worker to toil several hours at work for the city, in return for which he gets just one ticket for a meal and one night's lodging. That is all, after that he can starve anywhere he wants to, and without a place to sleep

Unemployment grows rapidly in Texas as farm workers are set adrift and others are evicted.

Wagner's main bill provides for state uenmployment funds to be made up of contributions by workers and employers. He argued for the bills that a worker thrown out of a job by economic crisis was in the same position as one suffering accident from factory machinery and had as much right to compensation. Then, in spite of this, he argued that if the worker while on the job was not taxed to make up the insurance fund, he would be "debased by receiving charity" when he drew his

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# RIGHT-"LEFT" ATTACK ON THE C.P. of U.S.S.R.

HHEN the working class is building socialism amidst bourgeois encirclement the way it is ione in the U.S.S.R., the bourgeoiste has many vays of putting obstacles in the path of Socialist onstruction. It may attempt intervention. It nay practice sabotage. It may organize the urviving bourgeois and petty-bourgeois elements for every-day struggle against the revolution. and it may try to break the morale of the ranguard of the working class, the Communist Party. This is achieved not only through the nedium of consistent anti-Bolshevik propaganda and counter-revolutionary action but also through the very existence of a capitalist system on the one hand and the difficulties inevitably encountered by Socialist construction on the other. This breaking of the workers' morale is as indispensable for every other attempt at breaking the

Bourgeois influence in the ranks of the Communist Party expresses itself in deviations from the correct Party line. Bourgeois work of destruction in the ranks of the Communist Party is carried out by anti-Party factions fighting the Leninist Party line. Bourgeois ideology, in order to be effective among the workers and their vanguard, not necessarily clothe itself in Communist phrases. If need be, the bourgeois devil will even quote Lenin in order to corrupt the mird of the workers. For what is more clearly essential for the success of the Revolution than that the working class should clearly see the road sheed, trust in their own proletarian powers, attack obstacles with a tremendous concentration of effort, develop creative initiative on a mass basis and rally around the proven, ironclad leadership of the Communist Party?

This is exactly what the bourgeoisie is anxious to undermine. And this undermining has become the historical task of all sorts of deviation-preaching and deviation practicing factions.

When the individual member of a Communist

Party becomes infected with the bourgeois virus -it happens mostly to intellectual and mostly to those remote from the actual experiences of the workers, he can, generally speaking, develop two kinds of ideological-political diseases; he can become so freightened by obstacles, so crushed by the magnitude of the tasks and so frantic with dispear that everything the Party does would eem to him to be trivial, slow and full of vicius corruptions; or he can become so weak-kneed the sight of colossal tasks and superhuman lass efforts required to maintain the onward ush of the Revolution, that he would begin to lead in a timid voice: "For Bolshevism's sake, low down this break-neck tempo." In the forner case he will blame the Party for not being decisive enough, in the latter, for being too decisive; in the former he will cry about the Party being beurgeoiss-ridden; in the latter, about the

Party attacking the bourgeoisie too strongly. The former will be a "left" deviation; the latter, a right deviation. That both are of the same origin and serve the same class purpose, goes without saying. That they are bound ocasionally to combine in order jointly to attempt o undermine the Party, is obvious from their class characteristics and has been proven by such events as a Trotsky-Zinoviev or Lovestone-Can-

The Communist Party of the U.S.S.R. has had to contend with both kinds of malady. Trotsky ias been the champion of the "left" opportunist leviations: Bucharin, Tomsky, Rykov have led he right opportunist deviation. Both groups ried to undermine the unity of the Party and ave been ignominously defeated among the ank and file Party members, and the workers enerally. Trotsky is entirely out. Bucharin ias publicly denounced his anti-Party errors. Comsky and Rykov have lost their standing mong the masses. The glorious progress of the Five-Year Plan, the unusually rapid tempo of ndustrialization and collectivization, the Socialst rivalry, the energy and impetus of the workng masses in league with the peasants, the coninuous and rapid improvements in every realm f workers' life-all this has defeated the right nd "left" groups, defeated them by indisputable

WHEN Zaritsky, the real czar in the Cloth Hat, Cap and Millinery Workers Union, fails in New Yor!. Chicago becomes his resting place. Chicago may have been a good place for Zaritky years ago, but not today. It was just a year go when he openly betrayed the millinery workrs on strike. Keeping the workers out for a umber of months and just as the season opened orcing them to go back (those that the bosses vere willing to take), facing a yellow dog conract, discrimination, 50 per cent wage reduc-

There were about a hundred present, 35 per ent cap makers working in uniformed shops who were forced to attend) also well wishers of official labor movement (Forward, etc.).

All the eloquence at his command failed to ring any response from the workers. The millinery workers had a good taste of aritsky's leadership and politics. They are

not ready to follow him again. They are joining the ranks of the Needle Workers Industrial Union. They are shop committees and are making a fight side of the U.S.S.R. as represented by the kulaks and "Specs" (like Ramzin and Co.) has not yet died out, although its economic base has been shattered; the influence of the bourgeoisie in the ranks of the Communist Party is still felt, although the working class has strengthened its position enormously. The right and "left" deviations have not yet died out, either, although they are now much more anaemic than ever and have to parade under the guise of "loyalty" to the line of the Party.

The present groups are identified with the names of Syrtzov (right) and Lominadze (left) -and their "arguments" (properly to be called laments) are a feeble echo of the arguments of their elders in anti-Party outcries. The two groups are combined in a bloc, the Lominadzeopportunists "accepting" the economic analysis of the Syrtzov opportunists, and the Syrtzov opportunists "subscribing" to the charicterization of the Party by the Lominadze opportunists. They "swear" loyalty, but at the same time they maintain underground connections, which, insignificant as they may be, have aroused the scorn and indignation of the largest strata of Soviet workers who call these elements "double-hand-

What are their arguments? You listen to them and you seem to hear voices of factions long dead and buried. Moreover, there is a touching harmony between these laments and the Menshevik declarations the world over. You listen to Syrtzov and you seem to hear Abramovitch; Lominadze speaks and his voice sounds strangely like that of Kautsky.

We are moving too fast, say the twin brothers. Our tempo is not in accord with reality. We are threatened with "collapse." We must slow down to a more "realistic tempo." We are unable to master the economic situation. This is proclaimed in the face of a 24 per cent increase in industrial production in 1928-29 and of 25 per cent in 1929-30 as against the originally planned increase of 21.4 and 18.8 per cent respectively. This is proclaimed in the face of a quick and powerful mending of any breach that may threaten the weakers spots of the economic front (like the production of mean and dairy products). And does it not repeat in a somewhat medified from the capitalist-Menshevik propaganda about the "unreality" and the "imminent collapse" of the Five-Year Plan?

The Party line "ties up and paralyzes the creative initiative of the working masses," say the twins. This is news to the Soviet workers whose unprecedented economic advances have only been made possible by powerful mass initiative from below, by a release of the creative energies of the workers and peasants in every field of activity. It is news to the class-conscious workers in the capitalist countries who know that only the constructive self-criticism; the Socialist rivalry and the direct attack of the workers upon all difficulties have made it possible to reach the present economic level. But it is music to the ears of the bourgeoisie. Is spreads the vicious bourgeois lie about the workers in the U.S. S.R. being "slaves" of an "autocratic ruler." about their being driven like cattle.

The collectivization of the farms is done "in a mechanical way" says the right-"left" bloc. ignoring the fact that there has been a veritable landslide in favor of collectivization, that already in 1930 the collective farms embraced 36,000,000 hectares of land while according to the original Five-Year Plan they were to embrace 20,600,000 by 1932-33. It is ridiculous to speak of mechanical compulsion in a vast movement carried out by scores of millions of peasants. But it serves the purpose of the kulaks and the foreign bourgeoisie who are interested to discredit the movement.

A cry of "bureaucratization" has been raised by the opportunist alliance. "Bureaucratism that cries to heaven; irresponsible behavior; isolation from the masses; feudal-seigneurial attitude towards the needs and interests of the workers and peasants: an ignoring and distorting of the directives of the Party, and a most brazen opportunism." This is how the twins characterize the Soviet State apparatus. Where have we heard similar summary accusations? Oh, yes, it was Trotsky who six years ago spoke about a "dangerous bureaucratic degeneration" of the Soviet apparatus. Since then Trotsky has gone down while the Soviet State, continuously improving its own organization, is marching from one Socialist victory to the other.

The workers are over-exploited! The real wages show "a very alarming situation," chant the twin brothers, here, too, repeating the old Trotsky lamentations. The fact is that real wages are now about 175 per cent of the pre-war wages and are continuously rising, while the working day is being reduced to 7 hours and the week to five-days. The further realization of the Five Year Plan will assure further improvements in the life of the working masses. The bloc's accusation is a slanderous distortion of the truth, yet it is in unison with the bourgeois slander about the "starvation" of the Soviet workers. It is good counter-revolutionary propaganda.

"We are way below the tasks advanced by life itself," declare the double-handed predicting that the future holds only defeats, breaches, gloom. But even here they only echo voices long dead. Didn't the opportunist Zinoviev-Trotsky bloc in 1927 assert that the Party was "no more a Party of the working class" but a party of "Nepmen, kulaks and bureaucrats" leading to Thermidore, i. e., to the defeat of the Revolution? Today, the Nepmen have been almost completely wiped out; the Kulaks are being deprived of their base; bureaucratism is successfully fought against, and the Party is leading the country towards Socialism with seven-league

Every single utterance of the bloc gives expression to bourgeois hopes, wishes, views, and is intended to divert the Party from its Communist course. The onslaught of the Party upon the last strongholds of capitalism in U.S.S.R. has intensified the class struggle. The class-enemies leave no stone unturned, as revealed most clearly by the trial of the counter-revolutionary engineers. The workers' need of unity, cohesion, faith in the Party is a guarantee of their success and is more urgent than ever. In such times, the doublehanded work of the twin-brothers only plays, objectively, into the hands of the damagers and their foreign protectors and allies.

The workers of the U.S.S.R. have condemned the right-"left" block. The workers of other countries must support them in their struggle against right and "left" opportunism. We must rally around the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, which is exterminating the double-handed disease. This will only increase the fighting power of the Soviets and facilitate Socialist con-



# LENIN CORNER

#### Turn the Imperialist War Into Civil War

"The European War, which the governments and the bourgeois parties of all countries were preparing for decades has broken out. The growth of armaments, the sharpening of the struggle for markets in the epoch of the latest, the imperialist, stage in the development of capitalism of the foremost countries, the dynastic interests of the most backward East European monarchies, were inevitably bound to bring about, and did bring about, the present war. To seize lands and to conquer foreign nations, to ruin competing nations, to pillage their wealth, to divert the attention of the laboring masses from the domestic political crises of Russia, Germany, England, and other countries, to disunite the workers and fool them with nationalism, to annihilate their vanguards in order to weaken the revolutionary movement of the proletariat, such is the only real essence, the significance and meaning of the present war.

"Upon Social-Democracy, in the first place, devolves the duty to make clear this real meaning of the war, and mercilessly to unmask the falsehoods, the sophism and the 'patriotic' phrases which are spread by the ruling classes, the landowners and the bourgeoisie, in defense of the

"One of the belligerent groups of nations is headed by the German bourgeoisie. It has fooled the working class and the laboring masses by asserting that it wages the war for the defense of the fatherland, liberty, and civilization, for the liberation of the peoples that are oppressed by czarism, for the destruction of reacsm. In reality, that same bourgeoisie, servile in face of the Prussian Junkers with Wilhelm II at their head, has always been the most faithful ally of czarism and the enemy of the revolutionary movement of the workers and peasants in Russia. In reality, that bourgeoisie will, together with the Junkers, direct all its efforts, no matter what the outcome of the war may be, to support the czarist monarchy against a revolution in Russia.

"In reality, the German bourgeoisie undertook a predatory campaign against Serbia with the aim of subjecting it and throttling the national revolution of the Southern Slavs, at the same time directing the bulk of its military forces against freer countries, Belgium and France, in order to pillage the richer competitor. The German bargeoisie, preading the fable of a defensive war on its part, in reality chose the moment which was most propitious for its warfare, utilizing its latest improvements in military technique and forestalling the new armaments that had already been mapped out and approved of by Russia and France.

"At the head of the other group of belligerent nations are the English and French bourgeoisie which fool the working class and the laboring masses by asserting that this group leads a war for the fatherland, freedom and civilization against the militarism and despotism of Germany. In reality, this bourgeoisie has long been buying for its billions, and preparing for an attack on Germany, the armies of Russian czarism, the most reactionary and barbarous monarchy of Europe.

"In reality, the task of the struggle of the English and French bourgeoisie is to seize the German colonies and to ruin a competing nation which is distinguished by a more rapid economic development. For this noble aim, the "advanced" democratic nations are helping ferocious czarism still more to choke Poland, the Ukraine, etc., still more to throttle the revolution in Russia.

"Neither of the two groups of belligerent countries is behind the other in robberies, bestialities and endless brutalities of war. But in order to fool the proletarians and detract their attention from the only war for real freedom, namely, a civil war against the bourgeoisie both of "their own" and "foreign" countries, in order to further this noble aim the bourgeoisie of each country strives, by means of patriotic phrases, to extol the significance of "its own" national war and to assert that it strives to vanquish the adversary not for the sake of robbery and seizure of lands, but for the sake of "liberating" all the other peoples except its own.

# Hours of Work Under the Five-Year Plan

By G. T. GRINKO. People's Commissar of Finance, U.S.S.R.

On the other side of the Soviet frontiers, in all capitalist states, savage pressure is exerted by capitalism in order to wipe out the eighthour day which has been partially achieved by the proletariat. The revolutionary energies of the European working class are still spent on the struggle for the eight-hour day, i. e., the same demand that has been inscribed on the banners of the international proletariat for decades. In the capitalist countries of Europe, America and Asia, and in colonies, the nine, ten and even twelve-hour day still predominate; and in places we find even more horrible forms of labor exploitation.

The evolution of the working day in the U. S. S. R. presents an entirely different picture. In 1913 the working day averaged 9 hours and 42 minutes; in 1917, when the workers took matters into their own hands and introduced the eight-hour day, the average hours of labor really were 8 hours and 45 minutes. By 1924 the average working day was reduced to 7 hours and 37 minutes, by 1925 to 7 hours and 25 minutes, by 1926 to 7 hours and 20 minutes and by 1927 to only 7 hours and 18 minutes. These figures are given according to the compilation of the trade unions themselves. On the tenth anniversary of the October Revolution the historical manifesto of the Central Executive Committee of the U.S. S. R. was published, providing for the gradual introduction of the seven-hour day for all industrial workers. The Five-Year Plan of economic development does not merely include in its computations the carrying out of the instructions of this October manifesto. It also foresees the possibility, at the end of the five-year period, provided the entire program of economic reconstruction is successfully realized, for the gradual introduction of the six-hour day.

As compared with the pre-revolutionary past the working day of the industrial proletariat is at present 2.18 hours shorter, and in 1932-1933 it will be shorter by 3.21 hours.

There is no doubt that the seven-hour day will be put into effect for all the workers in industry and transportation of the U.S. S. R.

before the conclusion of the five-year period. And there is nothing fantastic about the expectation that by the end of the five-year period the question of inaugurating the gradual introduction of the six-hour day will be taken up for practical consideration and action.

This sums up the most important phases of that involved complexity of questions which form the labor problem of the U.S.S.R. in the initial stage of the socialist reconstruction of its economic system. But one cannot examine this subject from all angles without taking into consideration the rapid development by the working class of class consciousness, culture and social and political initiative which are reaching a higher level with every year of socialist construction. The impetuous wave of socialist competition, the decisive proletarianization of the Soviet apparatus, pours forth like a gusher in the real course of Soviet socialist construction. The fact that the Five-Year Plan, which provides that the greater part of the national income be used for capital investments, involving as it does quite expressed self-denial for the cause of the great historic tasks of socialism, nevertheless enjoys the greatest popularity among the proletarian masses of the Soviet Union, bears testimony to the high degree of class maturity of the Soviet proletariat as well as to the genuine socialist nature of the economic construction that is carried on in the U.

of an adventurist, and that ever since, I joined the Party I had been utilized for factionalism by the Lovestone group, which then was in control of the Party.

"Second, when in May and June of this year I made an appeal for re-admission into the Party, I was not sincere. When I got out of the army and started to be active, I began to understand the incorrect anti-Party line, of the Lovestone renegades, and their role of misleading the workers and utilizing them for their attacks against the Party in San Antonio.

"About a week after I had been active I made complete break from the Lovestone group and at the first meeting of the Party unit that I attended I proposeed the following motions:

1.) That we immediately combat Lovestonism by organizing mass activity, by carrying mass activity, by carrying on mass work, by taking leadership through organizing the Trade Union Unity eague, Unemployed Councils, etc.

2.) That we organize the Unemployed Councils, and conferences under the Trade Union Unity League with a view toward an unemployed demonstration in the near future.

3.) That, to start this work, mass meeting be organized around the issues of Unemployed Insurance Bill, reports on Red International of Labor Unions, etc.

"The only reason for my not making the present statement to the Party at that time was my desire, realizing the strength of the Lovestone group in this locality, first to draw the attention of the Party to the situation here.

"I am making it now, fully realizing the consequences as to my re-admission into the Party. "I only ask the permission to carry on work

Not to make the story too long, we start right off by quoting a resolution adopted by the Political Bureau:

"In the Daily Worker of December 17, Jorge wrote in Red Sparks in answer to a Section Organizer's letter regarding attendance at unit meetings and payment of dues, in which a wrong approach is made to this question. One of the healthiest signs in the Party today, is precisely this, that the units of the Party are systematically checking up on the activity of every member, and tightening up on dues payments. It is the sign of a more serious, more proletarian Party. It is a sign of bolshevization. But Comrade Jorge, under the pressure of his many duties on the Daily, forgot this, and allowed himself to write in such a manner (claiming the support of the Central Committee in this) as to hinder this development of the lower units of the Party. The Central Committee in no way supports any resistance to unit and section discipline, and Central Committee members and staff are subject to it in exactly the same measure as every other member of the Party. Insofar as special assignments of work prevent attendance at unit meetings, this must be explained to the unit, and in case the explanation is not acceptable to the unit, then the matter must be adjusted by the next higher committee. The right of unit and section to call any member to account can never be questioned. What is said about attendance applies also to dues. The life of the Party units and sections must become the first concern of every Party member and also of the Daily Worker. The danger of bureaucratic tendencies in the Party does not arise from efforts of units and sections to control the activities of the members. The Central Committee does not support the expressions of Comrade Jorge in the Dec. 17 issue of the Daily And what have we got to say about this?

Firstly, that we had it coming to us, and that we agree completely with the line above given. As in other cases where our foot slipped and where we corrected ourselves, we meant to do the same with this matter, but since the Polit-Bureau beat us to it, we welcome it. As to showing that we mean it, we have attended the unit, adjusted all matters amicably, and in addition reported on the recent Plenum Resolution, taking the opportunity to defend the Central Committee against the wrong point of view expressed by us on Dec. 17.

Secondly, we did not intend our comment on the Section Org.Sec'y's letter, to controvert the unquestioned right of the unit to demand accountability and we admitted our shortcomings as preliminary to correcting them and not to boast about them-an astonishing interpretation to the Keeper of the Crocodiles. Where we erred was on two points:

1. Merely because the letter of the Sec. Org .-Secy. was couched in uncalled for terms, we made a fuss over that, forgetting that the substance of what was said was quite correct, and hence our comment as the Polit-Bureau says, hindered the development of the Party line on unit activity. The campaign to tighten up on this activity is certainly the important thing, and our dwelling upon inconsequential points was decidedly bad. To raise an objection to the manner in which a policy is presented justifies a suspicion that the objection is really directed against the policy, which would put us in the same position as those comrades who claim that they don't object the substance of Red Sparks criticism, but merely object to its manner or

2. The matter of claiming Central Committee authority was due to our submitting our writings for alteration, approval or rejection, as in other cases, to the comrade whose position as Secretariat member and acting editor is supposed to insure that the matter approved contains the line of the C. C. But it was our hard luck that the very villain was himself in a worse fix than ourselves as regards unit affairs and hence liable to bias. But that, dear comrades, does not mean that the Central Committee is condemning what appeared before or after Dec. 17. If we had our wish in the matter it would, and thus we would be relieved of the unpleasant and frequently perilous job as Keeper of the Crocodiles. We could dedicate the ugly animal to the Bronx Zoo and find more time for the first duty of all Party members, attendance at unit meetings.

Thus the plot hatched by the Lovestone renegades against the Party came to grief and turned out against themselves.

As to Papcun's re-admission into the Party, the Central Control Commission has decided to postpone final action until such time when, by protracted work and real tests in the struggles he will have proved that he has stabilized himself and has lived down his black record of irresponsibility and under-handed dealings with the Party; in the meantime, while given opportunities to work in organizations sympathetic to the Party, he cannot be placed in any posts of responsibilty.
