How do the miners, without a cent to live on, with pantries and cupboards bare of food, with their wives and children gaunt with hunger. dare to strike and give up what little income they have? Oh, they dare! "We might as well starve striking as starve working," they say, and men and women. Negro and white, women and children and wives with babes at their breasts, come out on the picket lines by hundreds. march from struck mine to mine that will strike when the miners see them coming, face tear gas and scowl back down the muzzles of scowling guns. Terror has begun to lose its terrors. There are more painful ways of dving than being shot by a state trooper.

And mine after mine strikes. Here is the list of mines on strike June 4 -as far as is known, and by the time this is printed, the list will be a hopeless underestimation of the scope of this struggle. "Strike every bituminous mine in Pennsylvania. says the miners' own Pennsylvania District Rank and File Strike Committee, and "Spread the Strike! it says, looking over the border at Ohio. Kentucky, West Virginia: "Spread the strike!" it says, looking into the Anthracite where nearly 150,000 men are starving and suffering like the soft coal miners.
