DOWN TOOLS! INTO THE STREETS MAY FIRST!

Throughout the world on May Day the tramp of marching feet of millions will be heard.

Millions of workers and farmers will join in demonstrating for the rights of Labor on May 1—the day of international solidarity.

Experience in struggles with the capitalist class has swelled the ranks of militant labor, and this year's demonstrations will be the greatest in all working class history. Spurred on by the rising wave of fascism, the workers will merge their mighty forces in one solid, unbroken united front.

In the United States they will demonstrate against the Roosevelt hunger regime which dooms 16,000,000 to starvation and misery.

They will demonstrate against the newest wave of repressions embodied in a whole series of alien and sedition laws which are aimed to throttle the labor movement, and in particular the Communist Party of the United States.

They will demonstrate against the growing menace of fascism and the spectre of a new, bloody imperialist war.

Fifty years ago, when May Day was first established as a day of struggle, the fight for the eight-hour day was the burning issue of the American working class.

Since that time the workers have engaged in bitter struggles for the shorter work-day, increased pay and for the right to organize. For more than fifty years, from the days of the Molly Maguires, who fought for their unions in the Pennsylvania coal mines, to the recent strikes—such as the general strike on the Pacific Coast and the strike of 1,000,000 textile workers—the workers of America have battled militantly for their rights and liberties, for more and better food, for bread and milk for their wives and children.

The demand of the workers for improved conditions is met by N.R.A. boards and Wagner Labor Disputes bills aimed to crush all genuine labor unionism and to entrench company unionism; the demand of strikers for improved conditions and for the rights "guaranteed" them by clause 7a of the N.R.A. codes is met with gunfire and tear-gas.

The millions of unemployed in the U.S. have been reduced to the level of paupers, and President Roosevelt, by his \$50 maximum wage

on the public works, is seeking to make this the prevailing wage for all American labor.


On International May Day the workers of America, Negro and white, will demonstrate against the continuance of this murderous rule of the capitalist class.

Workers! Down tools on May Day! Into the streets in united front demonstrations against the bankers and landlords, against the Wall Street government which oppresses and persecutes you.


The First of May is the gathering of our strength and forces for a Soviet America!








