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FIVE MILLION voters in 1924 who looked to the LaFollette movement to challenge the republican and democratic parties expected the son of the old man to carry on the fight. These voters, in 1924, thought of LaFollette, Sr., as the cartoonist pictures him above, a rampaging bull. But the son did not continue even the liberal bourgeois policy of his father. Instead he is accepted as a full-fiedged republican calf by grace of the Coolidge gang. As the followers of LaFollette, with their eyes opened, in the agricultural states say: "The republicans first fed him oats, now they have the halter on him!"

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
