AGUINALDO IS BRAVE.

Instead of Being Dead, He Is As Much Alive as Ever.

It does not look as if Aguinaldo intends to give much rest to the Republican administration, judging from an authenticated interview which has been submitted by a trusted Manila merchant to John Barrett, ex-minister to Spain. Aguinaldo is evidently a man of greater education and force of character than he has been credited with by the press. It is a pity that this great Republic, though the capitalist policy of our present administration, should besmirch her glorious history of the past by prosecuting a nation that has done her no wrong. Say whatever you please, one thing is certain. The great majority of the Filipinos want independence, and every true spirited American is satisfied that the Filipinos will fight for it till they will get it. Here is how Aguinaldo himself sizes up the entire situation:

"To accept amnesty means shame, infamy, slavery, degradation. Personally, it means imprisonment for me. What else am I to expect? And what for my poor people but serfdom? What would their forefathers have said of George Washington had he accepted amnesty from George III? He fought from 1776 to 1783, and all offers of amnesty were very properly treated with scorn. They were right. You ask me what we want. I reply, liberty! The right of the Filipinos to govern themselves—a government of our own."

"You say it may become a war of extermination similar to that of the aborigines in America? Very well, so let it be. I have read that a great statesman named Patrick Henry declared that he preferred death to slavery. He spoke in the house of delegates in Virginia. Let them con-

tinue this war. Our determination is taken. We will not submit. They may exterminate us, but they cannot conquer us. Never! This noble sentiment animates all the Filipino people.

"Rebels we may be; so were Washington and his generals. If they were entitled to liberty we are. Two years of this cruel, merciless war have now been prosecuted, and what has McKinley accomplished? Has he any loyal subjects here? No; only a lot of turncoats at Manila who are ready to take advantage of any profit to themselves. They are a disgrace to their country. McKinley and the people of the United States are all deceived. The most absurd and false reports are and have been sent to him. The real truth is not known in America."

And it is such an able and spirited man that Americans look upon as a savage. It is this man that Americans, with their "negro lynching" civilization, want to govern. We have faith in the greatness of Aguinaldo and his cause and we hope that he will lead his people to real emancipation, economic as well as political.

The "Full Dinner Pail."

Here, you Republican friends, is how Mark Hanna remembers the workmen for voting his party into office:

Nashua, N. H., Jan. 25—Supt. William H. Lovell, who has charge of the local branch of the Eastern Forge Company, formerly the Nashua Iron and Steel Company, gave notice today that the wages of the employees would be reduced 10 per cent on and after February 1. He refused to discuss the reason for this order, stating that he was simply obeying the instructions of his employers in Boston.

About 160 men, a majority of whom are skilled mechanics, will be affected by this order.

It has been given out that the company is doing a rushing business here. It has recently put in an electric light plant and a new 31-2 ton hammer. The plant is one of the largest forges in New England.

We purposely emphasize the above sentences in order to convince you of the old arguments of the Socialists, namely, that the more wealth the rich acquire the less wages the workmen are allowed to earn. It has for a long time been the contention of Republicans that the prosperity of the manufacturers means higher wages and better times for the laborers. How preposterous! Here you have a living fact to the contrary. A ten per cent reduction in wages is announced at a time when the company is doing a rushing business and is making money enough to enable it to put in one of the largest forges in the state. And what does this mean? No more and no less than that the ten per cent reduction will before long cover the entire cost of the new plant. Now say that the worker don't produce the capital of this country! If you are wise you will know how to vote at the next election.

Speaking of the "full dinner pail" of the Republican party we might also mention the fact that according to a recent report of the Commissioner of Labor and Statistics of North Carolina, the average hours of labor in the mills of that state are 10 to 12½. The highest daily wages average, to men \$1.72, lowest, 81 cents; women, 84 to 89 cents; children, 25 cents. This is the kind of prosperity American sovereigns, horny-handed men of toil, put up with. And at the same time the rich are getting richer! Their prosperity is of the "real" kind. Why so? Because the millions of the rich come from the sweat and blood of those poor devils who work from 10 to 12½ hours daily for as low as 51 cents and 89 cents a day. You voted for McKinley, take the medicine!

Read and Think.

The capitalist press has always taken special pains to tell the American people to oppose Socialism on the ground that family ties will be loose and the home will be no longer sacred in the co-operative commonwealth. But here we have an official report by the Commissioner of Labor and Statistics of the state of North Carolina, showing that state to contain 180 cotton mills, 80 knitting mills and 11 woolen mills. There are 1,297,771 spindles and 29,890 looms in operation. In the knitting mills 2,028 machines are employed. The number of employees is 28,647, of which number 14,999 are men; 10,640 are women and 2,998 are children. Of the latter 8,589 are boys. Just think of it! More women than men, more than half as many children as men and half as many little girls as boys! Don't you think this is dividing and breaking up family life on a grand scale? Murderous capitalism, and not SOCIALISM, takes the mother from her smoking babe and the child from its loving parents and drives them both to the factory where their their muscles are coined into American dollars. And while we do not class any of the parties concerned as murderers, which the Haverhill Gazette maintains that we do, we nevertheless condemn the system of capitalism which both the Republicans and Democrats support and which results in the breaking up of everything that is dear and sacred to human life.

Collective Ownership.

The citizens of Haverhill pay \$1.00 for a thousand feet of gas. A corporation is in control of the lighting plant of this city and the Haverhill Gazette claims that "there have been no end of demonstrations that municipal operations are awlays from two to three times as costly as private enterprise." So that according to the "philosophy" of our contemporary it would cost the citizens of this city twice or three times \$1.00 per thousand feet gas if the gas plant would be owned and controlled by the citizens of Haverhill through their government. But what will the Gazette say to the following item, which is indisputable and quite suggestive: "A plebiscite of the city of Toronto, taken on the question of municipalizing the gas service, resulted in an overwhelming vote in favor of the city buying the gas plant. The present company supplies gas for 90 cents a thousand feet, but it is expected that gas will be furnished by the city at half that price. This belief is well founded, for Toronto owns its water plant and supplies its residents at one-half the rates that prevailed when the plant was in the hands of a private corporation."

It will not be very long before the people will realize that all commodities, not only gas and water, can be produced more cheaply by the state owning and managing the entire capital by the country than by heartless corporations that are organized for the purpose of enriching themselves at the expense of the people. Socialism is making rapid progress.

Results of Imperialism.

Here, American jingoism, is something that will gladden your patriotic hearts. As a result of your imperialistic policy take the following result:

"When you read of the Americans not looting you can just wink the other eye. The Americans and the English got a trifle more than the Yanks, because they were smarter. If I could have taken care of and safely handled all the loot and plunder which I had and could have got, I would return to the United States a rich man, easily worth from \$25,000 to \$80,000." (Extract from a letter received in Worcester from a soldier who is serving with the Ninth U. S. Infantry in China).

"In conclusion read the following, also as a result of your imperialistic policy:

Manila, Jan. 20.—General MacArthur has ordered the deportation to the United States of George T. Rice, editor of the Daily Bulletin, a marine journal. Rice will sail on the Pennsylvania next Monday. The order characterizes him as a "dangerous incendiary and a menace to the military situation."

Rice's offense was the publication of allegations that Lieutenant-Commander William Brannensheuter, captain of the port, had charged ex-

cessive pilotage and moorage fees, a percentage of which he had kept himself.

The Real Question.

"Today," says Karl Kautsky, "there is no longer any question as to whether or not the system of private ownership in the means of production shall be maintained. Its downfall is certain. The only question to be answered is this: Shall the system of private ownership in the means of production be allowed to pull society down into the abyss, or shall society shake off that baneful burden, place the land and the implements of production in the hands of the people, to be operated collectively, for use and not for profit, and then, free and refreshed, resume the path of progress, which the evolutionary law prescribes to it?"

Such is the question and such the alternative. Our generation stands where the roads fork. One path leads, through ruin, back to barbarism; the other leads onward to the Co-operative Commonwealth.—Socialism.

Remember the Women.

Socialists, don't forget the women in your educational work. As Walter Thomas Mills says: "It is not only new voters but new workers that is wanted. Socialism means more for women than it does for men. It means their enfranchisement as citizens and their deliverance from the current shame of womanhood—marriage for bread. VERDI AND VICTORIA.

The One a Genius; the Other Merely a Queen.

Verdi is dead. When our last week's editorial was written criticizing the social views of the great Italian composer we little thought that a week later he would be no more among the living. We lift our hat for this great master of music; we honor him as one of the great men of the nineteenth century who contributed very much to the fame and high civilization of man's greatest age. Verdi was 66 years old.

People talk of the greatness of Victoria. Almost every daily newspaper in this country had several pages of news and descriptions of the life of Victoria. Nearly every sermon delivered last Sunday in the churches of this country was on the life of the English queen. And while all these eulogies praised the dead queen in the highest terms, not a single one of them succeeded in pointing to one definite thing as the creation of the queen. What has the queen done for the civilization of the world? Don't attribute to her what has been done by the English Parliament or by English statesmen. What great thing as a person, as a queen, has she accomplished?

Mark our word. Very few daily papers will devote half as much space to the life of Verdi as they did to Victoria. Very few sermons, or none at all, will be delivered in honor of the great Italian artist, whose music the people will always appreciate and admire. Verdi is a man who personally added to the greatness and grandeur of the nineteenth century. His music is a permanent addition to the world's greatest accomplishments. He was a man of tireless energy, devoting his life toward making people happier. Giuseppe Verdi left behind him a heritage which places him among the world's immortals.

When men will be wiser and all their actions more rational, when the human mind will be free, thoroughly unrestricted and prejudice will be no more, when the human heart will no longer worship at the shrine of blind power, unreasonable custom and disgusting conventionalities—Victoria will be a forgotten woman. And Verdi will then be remembered!

THE POPE AND SOCIALISM
Misunderstanding of Socialism—One of the "Crafty Agitators" Replies—Under Socialism There Would Be Plenty for All.

The Pope seems to have been more anxious to attack the Socialists than to defend the poor. His suggestions for the adjustment of the "claims" of capital and labor are trite and ineffective. The thing he advocates is Competitive Individualism, tempered by religion. We have had Competitive Individualism tempered by religion for many centuries, and the results are bad. The Pope admits the magnitude of the evils now existing; but seems to think all would be well if we had more religion. But we are likely to have less religion, for Competitive Individualism is too frank a weed to allow religion to thrive in the same field with it. Moreover, the thin and weak religion which the Pope offers in his Encyclical would not sustain life, even if it could grow.

We just passed the nineteenth century of the Christian era. We have competition, we have individualism, and we have religion. But we have not morality, we have not justice, and we have not peace. Take an outcast, famished child of the slums, take a drunken wife-beater, take a lost woman of the streets, take a goal-maddened criminal, a sweated laborer, an unemployed workman, an overworked laborer, a broken-down pauper, a senseless miser, a bowless money-lender, a time-serving politician, a fraudulent bankrupt, a jerry contractor, a dissolute noble man, a vicious lady, a lazy parson, and a lying pressman, and make a bouquet of them. Will the flowers do credit to the garden of the Lord? Will the odor thereof be the odor of sanctity? But you know that you can find all these types of misery and sin in the United States; and that you can find them by the hundred, by the thousand, by the street, and by the district in our "great" and "prosperous" and "Christian" towns. And while you can find them you may be sure that the system which produces them is rotten, and not pure, is foolish, and not wise, is villainous, and not just.

with contumely, and seals brave histories with a pauper's grave; which promotes vice and greed to high places, and clothes business in robes of pride; which fosters craft, falsehood, and dignifies the whole swinish, hellish system with the name of Christ. I say that such a society is bestial and accursed. I say that such a society now exists; and that it is the inevitable outcome of the theories of sanctified exploitation upon which the Pope relies for the earthly salvation of the people. The Pope sets out to make clear the principles of truth and justice; but he darkens counsel with a multitude of words; confounding justice with expediency, truth with sophistry, and offering the people a pauper's doler instead of a rightful due. I say that while women are weeping and children starving; while industrious men and women are herding like beasts in filthy and fever-banished hovels; to build art galleries and churches, town halls, mansions of marble, and to put a diamond crown upon a by-gone head; I say that the religion and the culture which demand riches and blazonry while vice and misery are at their side, are like painted harlots hiding their disfigurements with rouge; and their shame with garlands and spice.

I say that the cult and affection of piety and culture which isp sentiment and chant hymns in drawing-rooms and chapels while flesh and blood are perishing in the streets, and while the souls of our sisters creep shuddering to hell—I say that this religion, this culture, these man-lin, sickening things, with their poems and sonatas, their chants and benedictions, are things false and vain, and nothing else but lies.

I do not attack the pope. I attack his foolish arguments and unwholesome sentiment. I dare say he means better than the Encyclical; but I do not attack religion, but only the pretence of religion. I do not put out religion against another. I have often met the Catholic priests and sisters, and I believe them to be sincere and charitable people. I have met them in the slums engaged in works of mercy; I have met them in Ireland fighting for the people; and I know that they are the most devoted, the most unselfish of all clergymen; but we must have justice, and we must have truth, and the Pope's message is neither true nor just.

The Pope's methods have been tried, and they have failed. We Socialists are honest, and of long good faith; we demand sound argument and fair hearing. We think Socialism would be more practicable, and we are sure that it is just. Socialism would not bring perfect happiness. No political system could do that. But Socialism would reduce the big dreadful sum of misery. Socialism would let Labor breathe. Think again what Socialism is, and then you may easily compare it with the state in which we grow, suffer and struggle for a brief, anxious, and feverish life.
