ing from the company at the time of his disablement. (c) If any employe in the service of any such company receives injury or contracts a disease in the course of his service which results in death, then the widow of such employe, or if he leaves no widow, his minor children, if any, shall receive from such company an annual pension payable in equal quarterly payments, equal to 25 per cent of the salary or wages, reckoned by the year, which such employe was receiving from the company at the time of his injury. Such pension may cease upon the remarriage of the widow, or when the youngest child becomes of age. In default of a widow or minor child, the same pension shall be paid to the father or mother of the deceased, if such father or mother was dependent upon the deceased for support.
