# "The Threshold" By the Russian Master, Ivan Turgenieff.

The following "Poem in Prose" of Turgenieff's, under the above heading is of interests, as it was fobidden by the Russian press censorship to be incinded in the volume published under that name in 1882; and is not included in the English version of the work, translated by S. J. Macmillan. and published by Messrs. Simpkin and Marshall.

It makes a new and special appeal at the present moment to our Russian comrades who are fighting such a desperate fight against terrible odds for a constitution that shall give them new and better economic and social conditions. For students and intellectuals the present moment in Russia is an absolute reign of terror. 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


