Heed Ye.

Being a staunch believer in the truth, justice and ultimate triumph of Christianity I take this opportunity to call attention of the church people to some things of vital interest.

There are now going on in Duncan three series of meetings in which fully three-fourths of the people are taking no interest at all. When the carpenter of Nazareth, surrounded by uncouth fishermen, began to scourge out of the synagog those "respectables" who had made it a den of thieves and robbers, the poor people heard him gladly and he was so thronged by the common people that he could only get rest by going into the wilderness, and there he was found, and thousands came out hungering and thirsting for the message of the new order. How is it today? The preachers are at their wits ends to keep the cobwebs from choking up their churches. Out of three or four hundred working men in Duncan not over 100 go to church as often as once each month, yet they are groping in darkness in the wilderness and not a preacher dares to open to them the floodgates of light by preaching from such texts as these: Nehemiah, 5th chapter, 10th and 11th verses; II Thes. 3-10. And yet they wonder why working men do not find it worth while to go to church.

There never was a condition of society without a great underlying economic cause that produced that particular condition, this we call the law of economic determinism. This law applied to our religious conditions today is this: Christianity at the time of Constantine had gained such headway among the working people that it was a menace to the idle, ruling class, and if left unchecked for a few more generations would have eliminated the parasite class and the world would have been one great brotherhood. The headsmen's ax had failed to check it, so there was but one thing left to do—make a state institution out of it and get its powers into the hands of the best people, so that it could be used to club down the very class it was devised to rescue.

The uncouth and rough-handed carpenter, fisherman and tent-maker, fired with the message of brotherhood, defying the powers of plutocracy, one after another fell under the headsmen's ax, but the message of a new order in which "none had lack of anything" spread and the gates of hell could not prevail against it.

But when Constantine joined the church and opened the public treasury to the support of the ministry it was no longer just the right thing to talk and preach against Brother Constantine's robbery and oppression because "he donated liberally to the support of the church. But working men have become educated and read for themselves and they find little in common between the organized church and the original teachings of the carpenter Christ and his fishermen disciples and we are determined to rescue christianity from the robber barons of

plutocracy and make it our standard of life and suiting our actions to our prayers we will have Christ's kingdom come and his will be done here on earth as in heaven or, in other words, we will have the co-operative commonwealth as marked out by scientific socialism.

There will be more preachers in Duncan Sunday than we can get here again soon and if they wish to reach the working man and get him interested in the church I suggest they call a special meeting at the tabernacle Sunday evening and make it a conference meeting at which we may all take part in the discussion of this question.

This article will be read by over 400 people in Duncan and if it's false it's the duty of the church to show us our errors and protect the people from such falsehoods.

The vote stood 22 to 22—a tie. 12 democrats and 10 republicans voting for license, 13 Socialists, 7 republicans and 2 democrats voting against license. In the debate preceeding the vote Alderman Seidel said, 'Socialists know very well that prostitution is a product of the capitalist regime, indispensable to capitalistic society, that it cannot be up-rooted while the capitalist system lasts, but he said it was a vice that could be regulated to some extent for the sake of general decency and in order to lessen the number of victims of its commercialization.'"

Now as a candidate for mayor of Duncan I am proud to stand on the record of our comrades in action and by the pledge I have made to the people of Duncan and I ask the earnest consideration of the good people of Duncan who really want better environments for our children. Think from now until the morning of the election, then pray about two minutes (that's long enough for the Lord's prayer) then go to the polls and vote like you pray and I will be under the most sacred obligations to you as I take the oath of mayor.

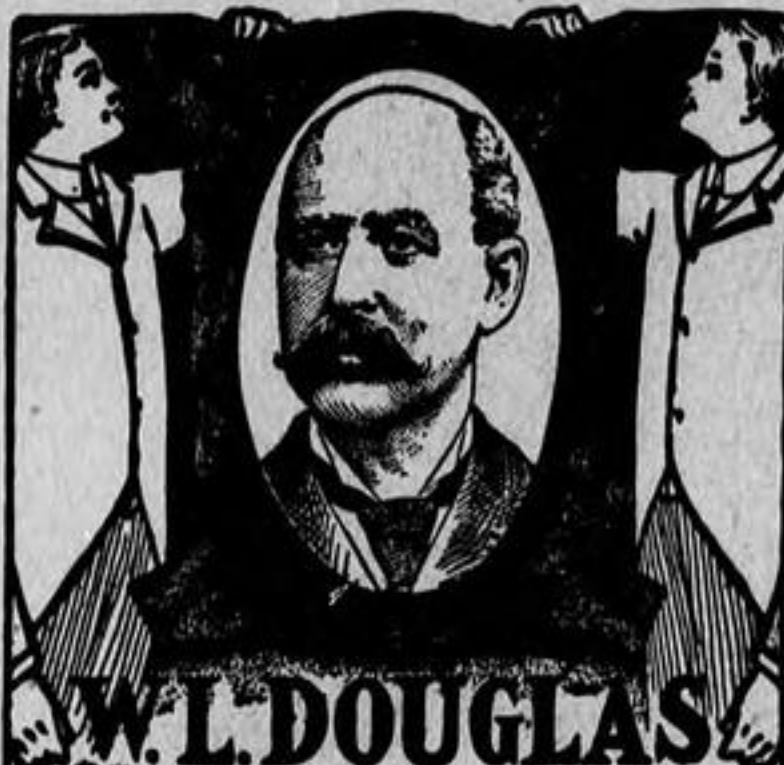

Forum of the People.

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TAXATION.

At one time all the people, learned and unlearned, firmly believed that the earth stood still, while the sun moved from east to west. The learned men believed it because they thought they could see the sun move, and the unlearned believed it because the learned men told them so. Occasionally men more observant than the others would question the soundness of this belief, but they usually found themselves in jail or in a bonfire just about the time they commenced to argue the point. Finally the learned were brought to see that what they saw (?) was only apparent, and that what they saw (?) was so was not so at all. Then the learned told the unlearned and then the unlearned built monuments to preserve the memory of the teacher they formerly burned as an atheist. This is the way the unlearned have learned throughout the ages. The man they mob and burn today they commemorate with a monument tomorrow. The unlearned man is usually a most profound donkey, who implicitly believes what he sees. And what he sees as a rule is always apparent, but rarely the truth.

As it was with the movements of the planets, so it is today with our beautiful system of taxation. Tell a learned man that the rich man is not contributing anything to the support of the state, or the schools, or the maintenance of the roads or streets, or anything else that the public require as common property, and he will laugh, ha! ha!!

He knows the idea is ridiculous because he can see that the rich man pays taxes. In fact the taxes are imposed upon wealth in order to compel the rich to pay taxes, and of course the rich pay the taxes. As for the unlearned man, it is positively dangerous to even suggest to him that a tax imposed upon property is not paid by the property owner. He has the tax placed upon property so that the owner will have the tax to pay. And you must not suggest that the unlearned man is a sane fool who believes that the sun moved because he could see it moved.

Because the owner of property he is using himself is a taxpayer it does not necessarily follow that the owner of property who is not using the property, he owns, is paying taxes upon that property. No man, not even the owner, pays taxes on property that other men are using. The state or community takes a part of the product when a tax is levied, and that part of the product is taken from the producer. The user of the product is simply using it as capital and the one furnishing the capital that other men use, contribute nothing to the cost of production as the rent and interest more than reimburses him for the service rendered. The tax does not come out of interest or rent. It comes out of the product. And it comes out of that share of the product that belongs to the user of the property. The steady and perpetual rise of rent ought to be enough in itself to convince any reasonable man of the truth of this contention. Just as soon as the individual begins to accumulate

more property than he can use himself he begins to cease to pay taxes. Because, as a rule the user of the property can only secure the right to use it by paying all costs and a sum over and above all costs as the price of the right to use. Therefore, the more property one accumulates the less he contributes to the support of the state. The less property one has the more he contributes to the support of the state. When the individual finds that he can not charge all the costs up to the user he stops converting his wealth into capital for other people to use. This is a fact that is generally recognized. Therefore, the individual possessed of more wealth than he can use himself is ever endeavoring to find ways and means to induce other people to use it, on understanding that the user pays all the costs and something over; whether an individual will hold a lot vacant or put it to use is determined by the ability of the user to use the lot and pay taxes and all other costs including the maintenance of the property. If the lot owner has any reason to doubt the ability of the user to do that, he prefers to hold the lot vacant until the rise of rent demonstrates his ability to collect all charges and costs and a net profit into the bargain. It is foolish to contend that the owner of rented property pays taxes on every other charge against the property. The user is the one who foots the whole of the bills.

That every citizen should contribute to the support of the state is a democratic theory that is evidently sound. But it is not the rule at all in practice. In practice the state draws its support from those who work and exempts the man who owns property to rent. The little scheme is worked in a round-about way that completely befuddles the worker. The worker knows that the rich man pays the taxes because he can see him paying them—just as he formerly knew that the sun moved because he could see it move.

He made it a point to give satisfaction to each man for whom he did work. This put him at the mercy of the whims and caprices of his employers.

His wife became ill and he got into debt, and before he had time to pay up his daughter became ill and his debts grew larger. Worry began to get in its work on him and he broke down to some extent. If the idiot would have been close in his dealings and not so strictly honest he could have passed through all this and had money to pay his debts and been looked upon as a respectable member of society. But we hear this, "He is a poor manager. He is mighty slow pay." His life has become a mere struggle for existence. To see him passing along the street to and fro at his daily labor, with his dirty, ragged clothes on, how he must shock the artistic eye that loves beauty. He is a blot on the landscape—a parody on the human form divine. But don't fret; it won't be long until he will drop out, and the hurrying surge of humanity will close up the space he left vacant.

Fairest of Treatment

DEMOCRACY.

About the funniest thing we have the pleasure of listening to is a merchant claiming that he pays the taxes. He doesn't tell us how he adds on to the price of his goods to make up for his taxes and other expenses. 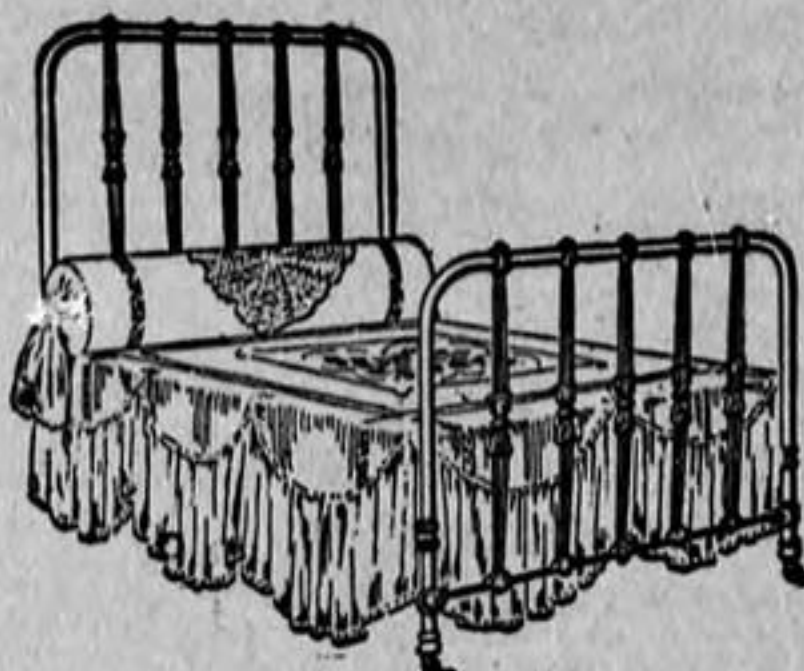

ANARCHY.

It appears that the anarchist is abroad in the land. He has blood in his eye and dynamite in the heel of his fist; also bad booze in his head. Having no use for law he arrogates to himself the power of judge, jury and executioner. The anarchist is either a senseless fool or a dangerous lunatic. He has the same conception of constituted authority as a wild bull. He also loves to run with a herd. So he is always at his best in a mob.

And the mob is abroad in Duncan, and if accounts are true, it has one more shameful and disgusting outrage charged to its credit. In dealing with a case of this kind one is sorely tempted to heap ridicule, and contempt upon the heads of those preposterous self-constituted guardians of public morality and let it go at that.

Imagine a drunken mob of law-breakers, themselves aiders and abettors in the violation of the law, taking the law into their own hands, that are foul with its violation, presuming to regulate the morals of other people. Surely this is a sight fit to make the angels weep.

And what are the constituted authorities going to do about it? What they have always done? Are they going to license mobocracy, as they license every other form of crime, by imposing a nominal fine upon the perpetrators of the outrage? Are they going to encourage the mob until its fiendish spirit one day fills Duncan with funerals and makes our firesides black with the woe of death, as it has repeatedly done elsewhere? Are they going to wink at this outrage because the helpless and defenseless are its pitiful victims? That is what the constituted authorities have always done. Why not nip this spirit in the bud just for a change?

And the citizen whose proud boast is that he stands for law and order, what is he going to do about it? Still maintain those constituted authorities because they pose as democrats?

Whenever the mob appears its presence indicates one of two things; either a vicious law or a vicious administration. In either case, in this land of manhood suffrage, the remedy is in the hand of the citizen, who stands for the maintenance of the law. If the law is bad he can change the law. If the administration is bad he can change the administration. And in the meantime, it is his duty to suppress the mob spirit by double-blindfolding Justice and relieving her of the rotten reed she usually carries in a case of this kind. And it is his duty to see that Justice wields the sword with the view of cutting to the heart of this arch-enemy of a free people. It is his duty to endeavor to suppress the spirit of the mob, for in this direction, and in this direction alone, lies the hope of popular government.

BROTHERHOOD OR SLAVERY.

Dr. J. H. Kellogg has given out some startling statistics on the increase of disease and crime in the last fifty years. He winds up the awful record by saying, "The race is sick—unnatural habits and appetites and unwholesome indulgences are the cause. Man has lost his way on the great highway of existence, and is wandering in the by and forbidden ways. He has forsaken the old paths and is traveling down the Jericho road. Thieves beset him on every side. He is robbed and beaten at every step."

We have too many classes of preachers. One class say the world is growing better, and point with pride to the increased membership on the rolls of the different churches. The other class say the world is growing worse and will continue to do so until an angry God will destroy it.

Now, I do not think any man with an average degree of intelligence could doubt for a moment that the people are worse today than they were fifty years ago. Then the learned statistician removes it beyond the shadow of a doubt. He says that diseases peculiar to the idle and dissipated have increased 1,000 per cent. And under high license and prohibition drunkenness has increased 250 per cent. You don't believe it? Read the records of the increased sale of liquor. Then look at the divorce records. Then look at Reed Smoot in the Senate. Then look around you at your business associates and at the preachers who draw a salary from the church and speculate in real estate at the same time. And then tell me, is the world growing better? Now then, for the man who says it will continue to grow worse. God forbid, for it is bad enough now.

My friend, there is a cause for everything. Let us seek the cause and remove it. This is the remedy. I find upon careful investigation that owing to labor saving inventions one man can produce ten times as much wealth as he could fifty years ago. Nearly all of the wealth is concentrated into the hands of a few. This concentration of wealth gains momentum as the years go by. I find that in the dim ages when a few of the people became owners of nearly all the wealth that civilization went down and anarchy took its place.

I find that the rich oppress the poor because they have the power to do so. I am unable to decide who this system hurts the most the rich or poor. The rich live unnatural lives which tends to make them dissipated or vicious. Their money gives them too much power over those with less money, which tends to make them proud and arrogant and to have less regard for the rights of others. And the nauseating part is that the money-mad people try to ape the false and artificial life of the rich. Isn't it a sight for gods and men to see the poor trying to ape Mrs. \$1,000, who is trying to ape Mrs. \$10,000, who is trying to ape Mrs. \$100,000, who is trying to ape Mrs. \$1,000,000, and so on.

Now for the cause. In the first place, the law-making power has always been under the control of that class that had the most wealth. Stick this in your hat. Now it is a natural law that greed grows as it is fed. As the rich become more greedy they, having control of the law-making power, gradually take away the rights of the poor until they become in the condition described by one of the leaders of the Southern Confederacy when speaking of the common people of the South fighting for their rights, he said, "Poor fools, they have no rights to fight for."

There are two paths for us to choose. One is for the rich; to increase the standing army; to absorb all the small fortunes; to terrorize and intimidate the laboring class—witness Idaho—to get possession of all the land; to make a property qualification to vote—witness seven Southern states—to get possession of all the railroads, mines and manufactures, then give the laborer his orders and if he refuses to obey them shoot him down. Then they can pass laws to kill off all the maimed and aged that are unable to work, and if a young one shows any indications of making an agitator kill him, too. Then they can pass laws to breed them up and control the output. You say a free people won't stand for this? I don't say this will be all done in a day, but I do say that in a few short years we will have either this or Socialism. A man will let them do him any old way that has not the nerve to march up to the polls and vote for the right as he sees it.
