Why Preachers Oppose Socialism.

In another article ample testimony was cited to show that lawyers oppose the universal reign of knowledge and peace because such desirable conditions would be detrimental to them, financially. In this article attention is called to the reason why preachers oppose Socialism.

Being a minister myself, I ought to be able to speak with certainty and without prejudice. Preachers, like farmers and all other men, cannot avoid being largely influenced in their belief and general deportment by their economic interests. That is a law that is as firmly fixed in all human and non-human beings as the north star is in the firmament of heaven.

When the Methodist church denounced chattel slavery, it did so because the new institution was detrimental to the economic interests of the then ruling element of the Methodist church. When the same denomination endorsed chattel slavery, the leaders of the church were prompted by the same motive, i. e., self interests. When the Northern and Southern Methodists divided upon the subject of slavery, each faction was unavoidably moved to action by their respective interests. The somersault and division of the Methodist church mentioned above are but fair examples of the actions of all other denominations, political organizations, social gatherings and individuals. I am not charging any man, or class of men, with hypocrisy. (Many men are hypocrites.) I am only calling attention to the fact that men are invariably and unavoidably prompted to action by self interest, hoping to so arouse workers that they will see the folly of looking to the present rulers in and out of the church for relief from industrial oppression. Workers should be class conscious and elect their own class to office. He who is class conscious is on the trail of the "key" taken away by the lawyers and in a hopeful position to unlock the great store-house of knowledge. Reader, if you understand the truthfulness of these statements, you know why preachers oppose Socialism.

So far as the temporal welfare of society is concerned, preachers, like politicians, are parasites. They do absolutely nothing that adds one biscuit to any man's table. All parasites exist upon the life of others. It is but natural, then, for parasites to oppose the abolition of the system by which they feast and fatten without toil.

The prohibitionists of Davidson employed a temperance lecturer to speak in the Baptist church here. All who have studied the question know that prohibitionists deal with effects and not causes. "Ye scribe" offered to deliver a free lecture in the Baptist church, giving the remedy for the liquor curse. The preachers said: "No, that would be political." I said: "You pretend to want the saloon, with all its innumerable evils, destroyed. You even hire men to air your desires. (?) But, rather than destroy the system by which you exploit others, your boys and your neigh-

bors' boys may die in the drunkard's gutter and go to hell."

A Davidson preacher said to me: "I'm praying to God that I may never read anything on Socialism."

I said: "Sir, you are following Jesus in name, I in reality."

Jesus denounced the conduct of the rich toward the poor and taught the brotherhood of man, just as Socialists are doing. When His teachings are obeyed, capitalism, with all its damnable blights, will disappear from the face of the earth and Socialism will spread its snowy-white wings over the world, and man shall triumphantly sing the angelic song, "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."

The bread and butter proposition is and always has been so much greater than all others combined, that men have even put others to death on account of it, often supposing they were prompted to action by other motives. The Roman Catholic church put thousands of Anabaptists to death during the "Dark Ages," pretending they did so because the "Anabaptists" re-baptized all who professed their faith who had been baptized by the priest. Those who have given the subject proper thought, know that the real cause of the action of Rome was this: It was not because the Anabaptists re-baptized, but because they preached a doctrine which, if believed, would convince its devotees that the priest was not their mediator, hence they would not pour their gold into the lap of Roman Catholic priests to keep them out of purgatory. Rome has been very successful in keeping her real object hid. Anabaptists themselves believed that they were suffering martyrdom because they re-baptized folks. The Catholics themselves may have been blind to their real motive. But since the time history of the world has been discovered, we know that no church or nation has ever persecuted another except for gold. As Dick Maple has said: "The modern preacher can put his ear to the ground and hear a call clear across the continent if there is a dollar in it." When the dollar speaks preachers think it is the voice of God. For that reason the angry voice of gold must be hushed and the heavenly voice of labor heard, or preachers will never cease their evil ways.

At the close of a Baptist revival the evangelist said: "Brethren, your pastor is suffering for the necessities of life. His children stay away from Sunday school on account of not having suitable clothing to wear." The pastor sat and cried like a lost child for its dead mother. The church raised her pastor \$350 that day. Next morning a stock man said: "It's a lie; the pastor gave me \$1,000 last week with which to buy cattle for speculative purposes." A petition was circulated among the church members asking the pastor, J. M. P. Morrow, to resign, which he did and went away from Vernon, Texas, disgraced, but with his pockets full of money. Do you wonder now why preachers oppose Socialism? They know that Socialism will everlastingly destroy the speculating business. That every able-bodied man must work or be useful to the worker.

Preachers demand and receive a stipulated

salary for their services. They do most all their preaching on Sunday. But if a farmer plows or a carpenter saws on Sunday the devil is to pay.

Years ago when men opposed the Abolitionists they did so because they wanted the slaves to work for them. Today preachers oppose the abolition of wage slavery because they want wage slaves to work for them. Just so long as wealth producers pin their faith to the lawyers' and preachers' coat-tails, just that long we will remain in ignorance and poverty, and support in luxury and idleness the heaviest clogs in the wheels of progress and happiness.

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LAWYERS AND PREACHERS.

While lawyers and preachers are as honest as other people, they are the greatest clogs in the wheels of progress. Most every time a man violates the law he seeks "legal advise." Lawyers are wise just so far as it pays them financially. A silver dollar contains all the knowledge the average lawyer has. In regard to the natural tendencies of all animate beings, their relation to one another and to the inanimate, they are as ignorant as bats. They do not even know that the good of each individual depends upon the prosperity of society. Why should they understand this? As the financial health of physicians hinges upon the physical sickness of the people, so the economic welfare of lawyers depends upon the adversity of the masses. **LAWYERS LITERALLY FEAST AND FATTEN UPON CRIME.** If man's environments were such as to enable him to live a quiet, prosperous, peaceable life, lawyers would starve or work. Of our eighty-nine senators sixty-seven are lawyers, twenty-five are millionaires, they all have investments in enterprises that employ labor. To ask or expect these gentlemen(?) to enact laws that would deprive them of the privilege of exploiting laborers would be like attempting to beat the waves of the ocean back with a broom or asking a firmly fixed law of nature to reverse itself. Brother worker, how in the name of God do you expect to get laws enacted that will benefit you until you elect men of your own class to enact them? Corporations have lawyers by the hair of the head, and lawyers have all other men by the tail and a downhill pull on us. And until we cut their grip loose with a Socialist ballot, we'll continue to be "drug" downward till we reach the lowest possible depths of degradation and woe.

Without knowledge no individual nor nation can progress or prosper.

It is not only true that lawyers are ignorant of the real object of life, but they have "taken away the key" with which the great storehouse of knowledge is unlocked. They did this by helping to establish conditions by which it is utterly impossible for the masses to enlighten themselves in regard to their own welfare. Today the world is lost mentally, morally, spiritually and financially. Mankind is at sea without a compass. We realize our deplorable condition, but the struggle for existence is so very great, we have no time to search for the "key" lawyers "have taken away." But, thanks to evolution, there are a few thinkers in every corner of civilization who have found this taken-away key, and are tenderly and positively saying to all the workers of the world, "Seek and ye shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you." Wherever these true and persuasive words ring, lawyers cry "Anarchist! Socialism!" The worthless hunks, they know that the day of the workers' redemption draweth nigh. They see flashes of light coming from the east. They know that capitalism is the darkest cloud that ever over-shadowed humanity. But they see above it the brightest sky that mortals ever beheld. They see in the disappearance of this muddy, ever-lowering and heart-sickening cloud the abolition of their hellish craft. They see that humanity is threatened to become civilized. That when man cuts his wisdom teeth they can no longer revel in luxury at the sad expense of others. They will not enter the soul-comforting and life-preserving science of Socialism, and those who would enter they hinder.

DIVIDING UP.

The democratic politician lays great stress upon the declaration that under Socialism the individual would have to divide his property with the whole community. If he has two houses he would be only allowed to keep one, the other he would have to surrender to the one without a house. The democrat uses this argument for the want of a better. The individual does not have to wait for Socialism to come into control before the dividing up process will begin to operate. This process is now in full operation.

Taxation is the motive power as it were, that runs the machinery that works the division of property, and takes the property from the producer and gives it to the non-producer.

"To levy a tax of seven per cent is a dangerous experiment in a free country and may excite revolt. But there is a method by which you can tax the last rag from the back and the last bite from the mouth without causing so much as a murmur against high taxes, and that is to tax a great many articles of daily use and necessity so indirectly that the people will pay them and not know it. Their grumbling then will be of hard times but they will not know that the hard times are caused by taxation."—William Pitt in a speech in the British Parliament.

And so while millions are starving in England today by reason of this very cause, they do "not know it." They attribute the trouble to something else. Taxation high or low, as it may be, is entirely wrong in principle and absolutely destructive to industry in application. A five per cent tax will yield more revenue to the state than can be secured from five 1 per cent taxes because the taxpayer who is always a producer, must pay the cost of collection in addition to the tax itself, and it costs more to collect five small taxes than one tax equal in magnitude to the five small ones.

All business men understand that it costs more to do business on a small scale than on a large scale. The collection of revenue is subject to the same rule. The more indirect the tax the greater the cost of collection. Therefore direct taxation yields the most revenue and bears lightest upon the producer. A perfect tax having the least weight and yielding the greatest sum of revenue is a direct tax imposed as a single sum.

The method of assessing a farmer's property for taxation is in my opinion a very good illustration of the absurdity of our method of raising revenue. For instance, the state levies a tax on the farmers cultivator; not because the state wants a part of the cultivator at all; the state takes no part of the cultivator; the tax is paid with a part of the product of the cultivator. It levies another tax on the team that pulls the cultivator; that also comes out of the product. Another tax on the plow that breaks the ground, another on his house, another on his wagon, another on his cow. The state endeavors to levy a separate tax on everything he has. All the taxes take just so much of the product. They all centralize on the product. This method enables the state to levy a little tax on flour, another on coffee, another on bacon, another on hardware, and so on world without end, amen. This is only a more indirect method.

the state employs to take more of the product. As this method increases the cost of collection, why does the state resort to it? William Pitt answered that question for the lawmakers of England something like one hundred years ago. If the producer only realized the evils springing from this method of raising revenue he would stop the state or tear the foundation out from under it, and the democratic politicians are aware of that fact.

The vast bulk of taxation is concealed in the prices we pay for what we buy, and the cost of collection far exceeds the sum of revenue received by the state, not to count the restrictions imposed upon the production and exchange of wealth. And all serve to cause the centralization of wealth and power in the hands of the cunning few.

The fact that all taxes come out of the product knocks the idea in the head that merchants are taxpayers. The merchant is a tax collector, nothing more. He pays himself for collecting taxes, by simply adding the tax with cost of collection to his prices. He is enabled to do this by reason of the operation of the law of competition. This law serves to hold the merchant's profit down to a normal line regardless of taxation. Taxation is a simple addition to the cost of transacting business. Whatever adds to the cost of transacting business serves to force the small competitor out at the bottom. Reduced competition enables the merchant to charge the additional cost to the producer, so the entire sum of taxation comes out of the product. When the farmer advocates the levying of taxes on the merchant he is simply cutting his own throat. The moral of this is: "Do not monkey with the laws of nature, those are the true laws of God."

While competition protects the farmer against excessive prices, it also protects the merchant against taxation by forcing the small competitor out of business and back into the ranks of the agricultural class, thus increasing the agricultural product while contracting its market. The farmer is dividing his product with the politician, the merchant, the boodler, the grafter, the parasite, the cunning manipulator, the speculator, the trust and the combine, not because the men who make a living by these various methods are any more dishonest than the farmer, but simply because the farmer, in common with all others, fails to recognize the law of God in the law of nature.

The law of competition is such a law and taxation serves to work its annulment and render it of no effect. Therefore the abolition of domestic taxation is the proper remedy for the most of the ills we bear. Taxation prevents the free operation of the law of God—the law of nature—the law of competition.

Who Are the Demagogues?

One of the most frequent words in the mouth of President Roosevelt, along with "delighted" and "Liar!" is "demagogue."

The sycophant press has seized upon the word and now uses it as a stock designation for all who dare to criticise the present reign of plunder. It is especially utilized as a substitute for the word "socialist." Roosevelt has applied it to Debs, Moyer, Haywood and several other prominent Socialists whenever he has had occasion to refer to them.

Here is a question of the use of words.

Many a dog has been hanged by giving him a bad name, and it is manifestly the attempt of Roosevelt and his masters to do the same with honest men.

When dealing with the use of words it is well to know their meaning. The Century dictionary defines a demagogue as "one who seeks to obtain political power or the furthering of some political purpose by pandering to the ignorance or prejudice of the people."

To whom does this definition apply?

Certainly not to Debs or Haywood or Moyer. All of these men have sought to remove the ignorance of the people, not to pander to it. They have worked tirelessly to educate those whom Roosevelt and his class have kept in blindness.

They have sought political power for no one, and least of all for those who were mentioned. They have never received or expected any political advantage from anything they have done. On the contrary, they have reaped nothing but imprisonment and ostracism and suffering in return for their efforts to remove the "ignorance and prejudice" of the working class.

Turn now to Roosevelt. He has sought constantly to keep the people in ignorance. He has tried to persuade them that he is their friend. He has had himself elected to "honorary membership" in a trade union—to the everlasting dishonor of the union.

His only possibility of political life depends upon his keeping the workers in ignorance of the fact that they are being robbed, and in arousing a prejudice founded on ignorance against those who are trying to tell them the truth.

He has fattened so well upon this ignorance and prejudice that he has obtained the highest office in the gift of the American voters. He has "obtained political power" by ignorance, and used it to perpetuate that ignorance and maintain the exploitation of those who are kept in ignorance.

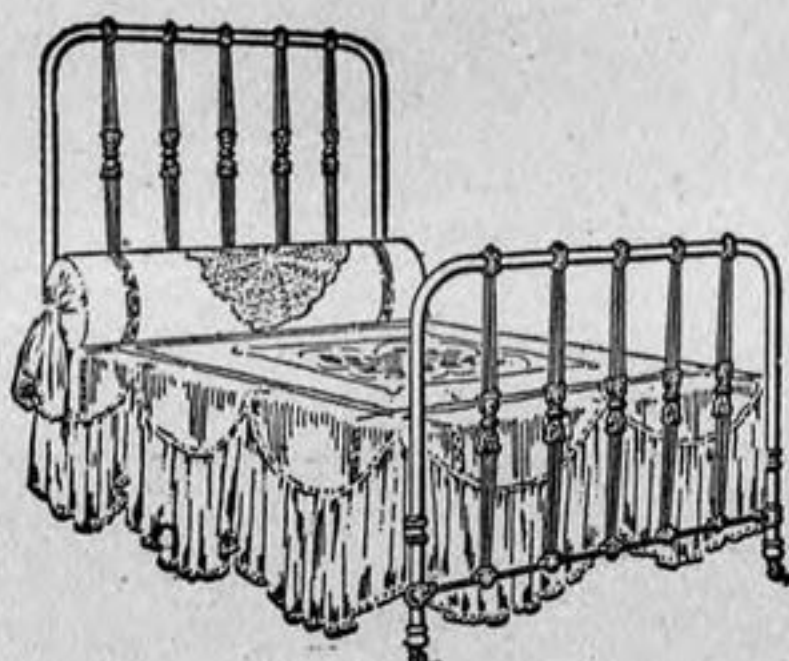

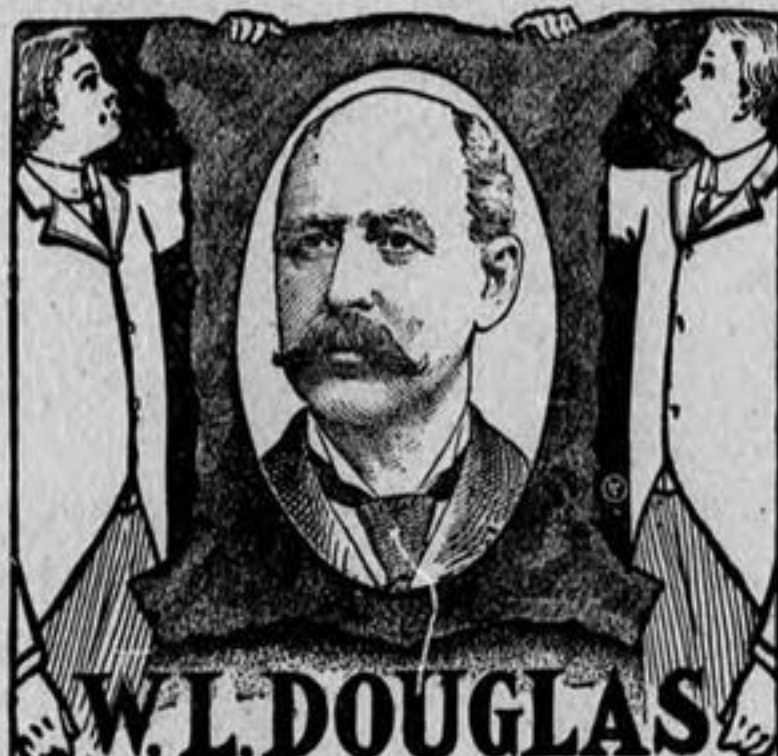

In spite of all this they feel the panic coming.
