ONLY A WORKING GIRL.

The following letter recently appeared in the Chicago Daily News:

"I clerked in a State street store last fall and can prove the truth of what I write. Being without experience, I had to start at \$5 a week. Out of this I spent the following: Allow 10 cents for breakfast, 5 cents for lunch and 15 cents for dinner, and you will see that my meals cost me 30 cents a day. For seven days at 30 cents costs me \$2.10 a week. My room, for which I hunted two days, costs me \$2.25 a week; car fare twice a day, six days a week, 60 cents; the total was \$4.95, leaving for laundry and all other expenses just 5 cents—not enough to buy an evening paper throughout the week. There was no talk of clothes or anything else, and where they were to come from. We are at our posts at 8:15 in the morning and out at six o'clock at night. Then it was to drag one's self to the cheap cafe for a 15-cent dinner, then up two flights of stairs to a scantily furnished hall bedroom, and either sit there and look at the four walls or creep into bed and wish the morning, with its round of distasteful duties, might never come. What a life for an intelligent woman to live! And yet when I found the impossibility of living that way on such a sum and told the superintendent of the store so, he could not understand it."

She is only a working girl with strong arms and rosy cheeks and earns her clothes by picking cotton in the fall and doing odd jobs for the neighbor women, waiting on the sick and various other things far beneath the station of the high-minded, cream-faced, silk-stockinged, gold-necklaced CHRISTIAN lady who kneels on her Parisian gown in her high-priced pew and gives thanks to a meek and lowly Jesus that the children who were murdered in the sweat-shops to pay for the jewelry and other finery that adorns her hell-born body have at last reached their happy home beyond the skies at the ripe old age of thirteen years. This girl, who earned the money to clothe and educate herself while her dear old parents were living, they being barely able to pay rent and buy the scanty food to keep soul and body together, when they are dead is forced into the labor market to compete with girls who board with their parents, Chinese who can live on rice, thieves who are working for a blind, and girls who were once like her but have given up the battle and took up with the inevitable gentleman friend rather than die the death of starvation and fill a potter's grave.

We ask you, dear reader, what can this poor girl do when her wages won't even pay her board, let alone clothing and other necessities of life. She will choose the life of a prostitute in preference to starvation. Here is where we say prostitution discards its appearance of sin and pulls on the robe of martyrdom. You say these are isolated cases, which shows your pitiful ignorance of this awful blotch on so-called civilization. Statistics show that not five per cent of the wage-earning girls of free America are receiving living wages, while eighty per cent of the products of these slaughtered virgins is squandered in the Bohemian resorts of Southern

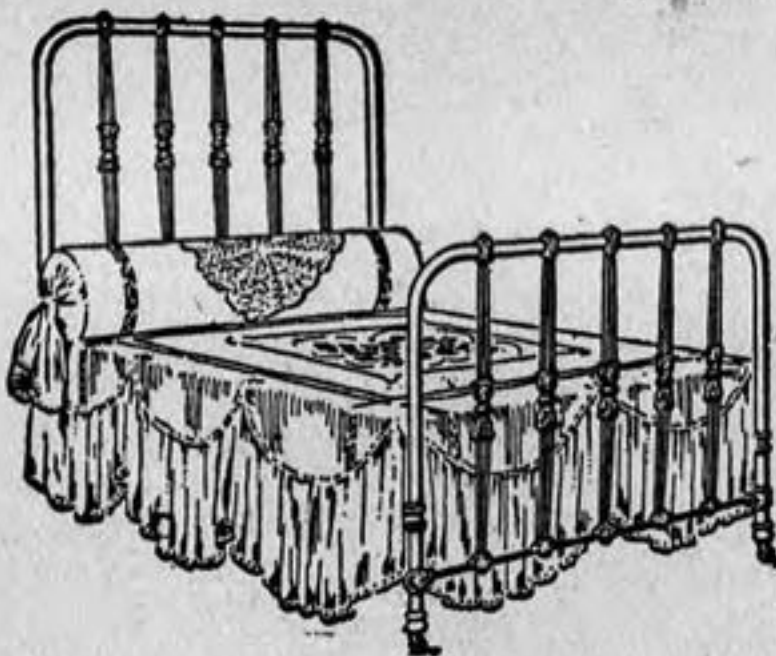

STRETCHES TEDDY'S HIDE.

Extracts from Eugene V. Debs' reply to President Roosevelt's insult to the working class, to Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and to Debs himself, which appeared in the Chicago Daily Socialist of April 15th:

"Then and there Theodore Roosevelt disgraced himself and his high office, and his cruel and cowardly act will load his name with odium as long as it is remembered.

"The mine and smelter trust had put up the funds and used its vast machinery for Roosevelt, and now Roosevelt must serve it even to the extent of upholding criminals, approving kidnaping and murdering the helpless victims.

"When Roosevelt stepped out of the White House and called Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone murderers, men he had never seen and did not know; men who had never been tried, never convicted and whom every law of the land presumed innocent until proven guilty, he fell a million miles beneath where Lincoln stood, and there he grovels today with his political crimes, one after another, finding him out and pointing at him their accusing fingers.

"No president of the United States has ever descended to such depths as has Roosevelt to serve his law-defying and crime-inciting masters.

"The act is simply horrible and without a parallel in American history.

"The same brazen robbers of the people, corrupters of the body politic who put Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone in jail also put Theodore Roosevelt in the White House.

"Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, the three workingmen kidnaped by the mine and smelter trust, have now been in jail fourteen months; they have not been tried, but twice condemned by President Roosevelt, the last time but a few days ago, in connection with Harriman, his former political pal and financial backer. These men are in prison cells, their bodies in manacles and their lips sealed. They cannot speak for themselves. They are voiceless and at the mercy of calumny. No matter how grossly outraged, they must submit.
