LEE CRUCE'S POLITICAL OBITUARY.

ADVICE TO WORKING MEN.

ETOWAH, OKLA., April 24, 1907.

COMRADE CHEVES:

I have thought out some more thinks about the mess of scrambled eggs the workingman is fed on now, just before our next election. These thoughts and thinks come to me after reading the republican, democratic and union labor papers, especially the comments and critics on the constitution and some of the delegates of said write-ups of said state constitution, and strictly the boss one, who is now a candidate for a high office. Cadle Murder Case.

J. M. Cadle and Escow Daniels, father-in-law and son-in-law, left Eastland, Texas, last spring for Chickasha, Indian Territory. They rode a passenger train to Waurika, Oklahoma, where they stopped and got some whiskey. There they got aboard a freight train and went to Comanche, where they were put off the freight train. Testimony is that they walked up the track from Comanche, after the freight train pulled out. The testimony of some men who were plowing in a field two or three miles up the railway track was that they saw the young man by himself and did not see the old man. J. P. Yates stated that he quit work just before sundown and was driving across the track to Mr. Dural's place and saw the young man sitting down on the

railroad track, apparently drunk or asleep, and that in twenty minutes he heard a passenger train go south.

The defendant testified that he and the young man, after they were put off the freight train at Comanche, walked up the track; that after they walked a little way the young man told him to go back to Comanche and come up on a passenger train to Chickasha, and he, the young man, would show them he could ride a freight train, and that he did so; that he stayed close to Comanche that night in a cotton patch, it being a hot night and he not having much money, and the next morning he went into Comanche and got his breakfast and stayed there and had dinner and took the northbound passenger train for Chickasha. In conversation with people in Comanche he told them he lived in Eastland, Texas. He also testified that he had \$9.00 when he left Eastland and the young man had \$11, though the prosecuting witnesses attempted to show he left Eastland with \$60, but there was no proof of that fact. They claim the motive, if any, to be that the young man carried a policy in the Woodmen of the World for \$1,000, in favor of the old man's daughter.

After arriving at Chickasha the old man inquired for Daniels, stating he was to meet him there, and when he learned that Daniels' body had been found on the railroad track and learned that he had been buried by the W. O. W., he took the first train home to carry the news; that when he arrived at Eastland at 4 o'clock in the morning he woke Tom Daniels up and told him his brother had been killed by a train in the territory and Tom Daniels said it was nothing more than he had been expecting and went on back to bed and didn't tell his father until 8 o'clock next morning.

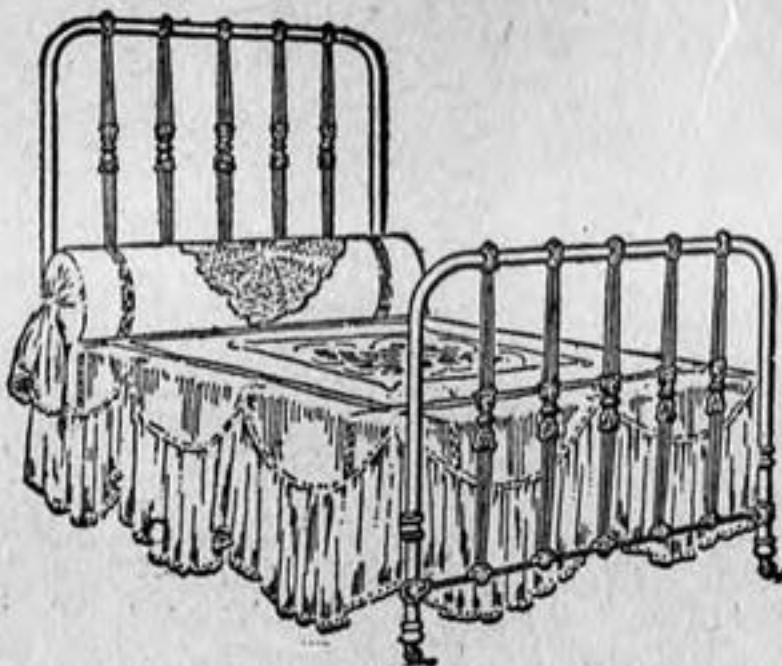

HE IS UPSIDE DOWN.

Bombastes Furioso, who shot a man in the back, and Violence Roosevelt, cheap killer, serio-comic soldier, Harriman blackmailer speaks. Is he about to lose his reason? Teaching boys to kill—he is upside down.

Goarded to anger by the demands for justice from the workers, and pushed forward by the powers of plutocracy behind him, the Bombastes Furioso of the White House has roared forth his denunciation of Moyer and Haywood.

The whole point of his ravings is found in the shrieking allegation that these men are "inviting to violence."

There is a word which Theodore Roosevelt is overly fond of tossing at others, and which it has long been thought by many belonged upon his own shoulders.

That word is LIAR.

There was never a blacker, more murderous lie uttered than is contained in that sentence from his letter to the Chicago Moyer-Haywood conference.

Where, when, and how have these men ever incited to violence?

In what place do their words stand recorded as urging bloodshed? Which of the "papers they control or inspire" has ever invited to or apologized for bloodshed?

Not one of these men ever urged the formation of a great navy to be manned with the children of the laborers, to go forth in blustering defiance in search of blood.

There are no organizers of "Rough Riders" among these men. Not one of them ever shot a fleeing Spaniard in the back, as you boast of doing at San Juan Hill.

They never urged the formation of rifle ranges in public schools to stamp the yet unformed mind with love of bloodshed and violence.

These men have shown themselves incapable of being provoked to bloodshed and violence even by the most damnable acts of your accomplices and personal friends.

When your friend and fellow Rough Rider, the murderous General Bell, shouted "To hell with habeous corpus, we'll give them post-mortems," to the miners whom he was shooting down, it was "these men" who were demanding that the law be peacefully executed. It was your friend and agent, whom you have since delighted to honor for his bloody work, who shouted his defiance of law and shrieked for blood and violence.

When the troops, paid for by private plunderers, were led forth to break up the homes, outrage the wives, and transport beyond the borders of their native state the men who had created the wealth of that state, it was these men and the papers "controlled or inspired by them" which still counseled patience, and peace, and an appeal to that law which their masters, and not they, had made.

It was not these men who came at the dead of night, in defiance of law, and at risk of bloodshed, armed to the teeth, and illegally and violently stole away men to murder.

From first to last it has been you, Theodore Roosevelt, and your class, which has sought,

alternately by the methods of the midnight assassin, and then by those of the blustering bully, to incite to violence and bloodshed, while "these men" who are attacked have at all times and under all conditions counseled peaceful methods.

The men whom he attacks are Socialists. They are workingmen.

When violence and bloodshed come it is the blood of workingmen that is shed. These men know that fact.

Therefore they and all Socialists are for peace—for any peace that is consistent with liberty and the opportunity to live.

In every corner of the world it is Roosevelt and his class who are inciting to bloodshed and violence, and the Socialists who are working for peace and liberty and justice.

It will take more than the fumings of a corporation-elected Roosevelt to stem the tide of indignation that is sweeping across the country against the dastardly conspiracy to murder the men who have dared to stand by their class in the mines of the Rocky Mountains.

This attack of Roosevelt, this cowardly attempt to serve them as he served the fleeing Spaniard, and strike them in the back while shielded by the high office which capitalist gold has bestowed upon him, will rouse such a shout of protest as will shake the very foundations of the blood-soaked edifice of capitalism. —Chicago Daily Socialist.
