"WHO HAS LIED?"

The Banner's original version read: "The highest tax that can be imposed under the constitution is 31½ mills. The Banner's revised version reads: "Except as herein otherwise provided, the highest tax that can be imposed under the constitution is 31½ mills."

Five mills for public improvements as per Sec. 9; 5 mills more for schools as per Sec. 10 brings the tax to 41½ mills.

We must educate our children and we must have public improvements. Were any man in this community to object to special taxation for these purposes, the Banner would denounce him with all the scurrilous abuse it could rake up. Submitting these matters to popular vote is a mere matter of form. Therefore, 31½ mills is the minimum advalorem tax and not the highest, as the Banner would have us believe.

Direct taxation improperly placed is bad. Indirect taxation, no matter how placed, is immeasurably worse. The constitution provides for indirect taxation world without end. One could not very well misconstrue article 10 of the constitution.

Duncan exempts her oil mill from taxation, so I am told. She ought to exempt every other improvement in the town as a measure of common fairness. One improvement is entitled to as much consideration as another. No individual is entitled to a special privilege. All are entitled to equal rights. Duncan should draw her annual revenue of \$30,000, or more, directly from her townsite. Our taxes last year were \$4.50 on a very low valuation. The constitution provides for an advalorem levy of at least \$4.00 on a high valuation,

with special taxes and indirect taxes world without end on the side. What are we to gain by statehood? Nothing except the empty privilege of maintaining a horde of democratic spellbinders. That is all.

WHITE SLAVES.

It is seldom that a week passes without some of the great metropolitan daily papers having a story of the "white slave" traffic that is carried on in all of our large cities.

Dr. Geo. W. Gray, a religious reformer, was the speaker at the annual meeting of the Social Economics Club of Chicago recently. He said: "The price of a beautiful young girl in Chicago today is \$50. Inside of an area one-fourth of a mile square, lying near Halsted and Van Buren streets, I have found 257 resorts and 1,759 fallen women."

The doctor said that a systematic traffic in young country girls is carried on in the city and that \$50 is the price paid for each victim corralled by the agents of disreputable resorts. These agents make it their business to hound every pretty girl who comes to the city alone and unprotected.

The methods by which girls are enticed into the cities and into these resorts are many and various, but chief among them is the "Help Wanted" ad which appears in the columns of the great city dailies. The ads of this character are innocent enough in appearance and cannot be distinguished from the genuine, and so it is not strange that girls, especially those from the country, are deceived by them. Once on the inside of one of these resorts and there is no escape for the unfortunate victim. Her clothes are taken away and a short dress or wrapper is given her instead.

The Crittenden Mission of New York estimates that there are not less than 300,000 women and girls in the United States who are living in these public resorts. Many have been enticed by deception but most of them have been driven to it by economic necessity. Not one in ten thousand has deliberately chosen this life.

There is no doubt as to the cause of this vicious rottenness that infects our social system. It is plainly an economic cause. Some are compelled to engage in it to earn a livelihood and others are enticed into it for the sake of "profit."

As long as the business of the world is privately owned and run for the private profit of the owners, this economic condition will continue to exist. A few will own the "jobs" that the many must have in order to live, and

in default of finding a job thousands of girls must continue to sell their bodies piecemeal.

Is your daughter's future absolutely secure, and if so, are you content that the future of your neighbor's daughter should be less secure? If not, we urge you to study Socialism with us in the hope of being able to abolish this damnable economic system of capitalism which maintains a market for the bodies of our daughters.—Peoria Socialist.

THE JUSTICE OF FREE TRADE.

My brother farmer, in my last article I told you how to go about securing \$500 for your bale of cotton. This week I am going to tell you why that is a just and equitable method.

Democratic politicians tell you that the reason why some men make a financial success is because they are naturally built that way. And the reason why other men are failures is because they don't know how to be anything else.

That is the way he talks when he is not prating about the tariff.

There is a natural force that serves to develop things. When anything rises out of a lower form we say it has developed. The manifestation of this law is seen in everything we look at. It is this natural force that causes the cotton seed to develop into the fruited plant. It raises the boy to man's estate. And it also develops the large business man out of a small business man. The large farmer out of the small farmer, and so on throughout the limitless expanse of space. Consequently the small business man is just as natural as the big business man and other things being equal, as the small business man rises another takes his place. Agriculture being the mother of all other lines of business, there is and of right ought to be a steady flow of population from the farm to the city. Were it not for this the cities would die out. They would be destroyed with the frightful immorality that afflicts them. When Roosevelt talks about race suicide he is not thinking

about farmers. The cities draw everything from the farm, even to flesh and blood. The farm is the source of practically everything. Some men born on farms are designed by God Almighty for something better than yelling "Gee! haw! come around," to a pair of mules. So naturally this kind of man, if other things are equal, finds his way from the farm to town and engages in such business as he feels adapted to follow. He may make a mistake, and if he does competition will force him out again and he will try something else or he may realize that God designed him for a farmer and, if other things are equal, he will find his way back to the farm. Men must experiment some in order to find out just what they are best fitted for. If other things are equal they lose nothing by experimenting.

I have always had some trouble in finding out what that ridiculous chump, the democratic politician, means by a door of opportunity, because he does everything in his power to shut every door of opportunity in the face of the farmer.

I am satisfied that it is just a phrase he uses just as he uses, "Equal rights to all and special privileges to none." He does not know what he is talking about. He says it because it sounds nice. And that is the only reason he has for saying it.

When a man experiments he does it on a small scale. He commences at the bottom of the ladder and endeavors to climb up. You will readily understand that at that stage very little will shove him down. And right here is where the infamy of taxation comes in. It serves to crush the small merchant out of business and back on to the farm regard-

less of whether he is adapted to farm life or not.

What taxation does for the small merchant it does for every other man who endeavors to rise. It serves to shut the door of opportunity in his face. The throwing of the door of opportunity wide open to all, calls for the abolition of taxation.

At the same time taxation is only one of the factors that serves to crush the man at the bottom, but it is a twin brother to the other, and the other is the more powerful of the two. The other factor is town lot speculation, and this factor serves to increase rent. Add rent to taxation and you have the great curse of civilization under your eye—the key that locks the door of opportunity to every small farmer, small merchant, small manufacturer and small people generally throughout the United States.

The key that will open every door of opportunity to every man, woman and child in the United States is absolute freedom of Domestic trade and the taking of the value that attaches to the ground by reason of social development for public revenue. Access to the market from which our living comes must be made free and we must work the denial of the right of ownership of the ground to the speculator. The ground belongs to the user and not to the speculator.

GET TO THINKING!

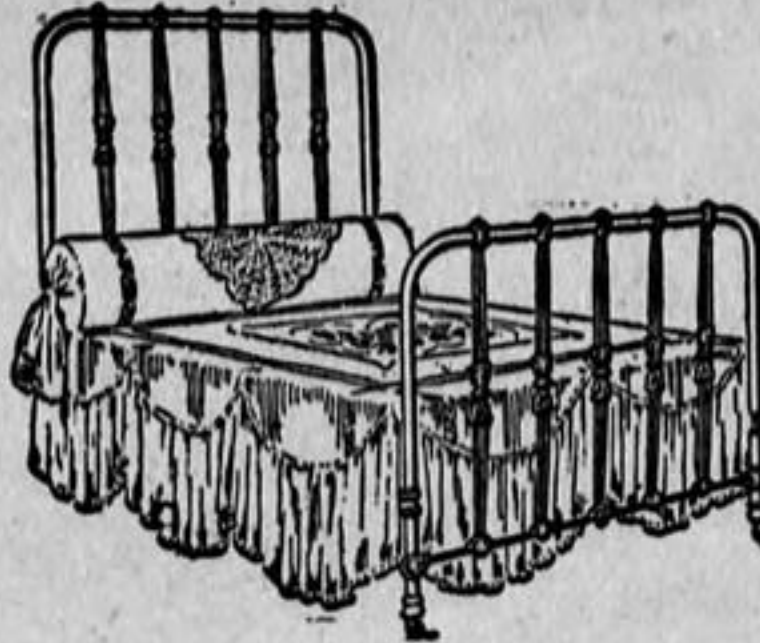

WHY WE SHOULD VOTE FOR IT.

While it is necessary to be scientific, uncompromising, radical and revolutionary, we must also learn to be practical if we wish to be taken seriously. One of the best things I ever read about the Socialists was in a republican paper of Wisconsin. Speaking of the few Socialist legislators it said: "Every time they gain a point they make a demand for two more." That fits our position to a gnats heel. We have forced the democrats to recognize the most vital principles of Socialism and put them in the constitution. It's now up to us to accept all they have given us and demand more.

They have given us the initiative and referendum. They allow the state to engage in any kind of business. They give us compulsory education. They propose to loan the school fund to farmers at low interest. They have subordinated the military to the civil authorities. Guaranteed the right of habeas corpus and prohibited deportation of citizens, yet there are many serious defects which are subject to criticism.

The initiative and referendum measure is faulty. It gives the governor discretionary power in calling an election and gives the State Supreme Court power to over-rule the voice of the people as expressed at the ballot box.

The suffrage question is typical of democracy, showing absolutely the lack of moral courage to deal with a subject. If they wished to impose a poll tax and property qualification why did they not do it like men and not shift the responsibility on the legislature.

If they thought a woman too ignorant and vacillating to vote, why did they create an unusual state office for the special benefit of one woman? But with all the good and bad features, they give us the right to change it by a majority vote, which leads us to think they did their dead level best (which we must all agree is good for democrats) and when they got tired of dodging ink bottles and thoroughly disgusted trying to frame a cage (constitution) in which they could house the lion of capitalism and the lamb of labor without the lion eating up the lamb, they threw up the sponge and virtually tell the people to "take the dad gummed old thing and fix it to
