TRIUMPH FOR SOCIALISM.

In June I boarded the train at Vernon Texas, and went West as far as Texline, which is near the line of New Mexico, about 300 miles from Vernon. I stopped at several stations going and returning and lectured on Socialism. I found many enthusiastic comrades and dozens of "mourners in zion." After speaking at Clarendon, Texas, the comrades said: We'll give you \$20 to speak here the 4th of July and review Joe Bailey's speech of the 3rd." Being like other modern preachers, who, as Dick Maple says, can put their ear to the ground and hear a call clean across the continent if there is a dollar in it, I said "Good!" The chairman of the committee on arrangements told the comrades they would not occupy the court house at any hour during the afternoon of the 4th. He told me the same thing at 12 o'clock on the 4th. During the noon hour of the 4th the comrades distributed 1000 bills announcing my appointment at the court house at 3 p. m. The old ex-confederate soldiers then planned a meeting to be held in the court house at 2:30 p. m.; and refused to let me speak. I asked permission to speak ten minutes, which they granted. I told the large audience which had assembled to hear me how I had been treated. Addressing the old soldiers I said:

"Gentleman you are discussing mankind issues. Jesus says 'let the dead bury the dead.' These meetings cannot place one biscuit on any man's table, nor add a moment of happiness to any life." Commenting on a couple of speeches that were delivered that morning I said: "Judge" (pointing my finger at him) "Judge Browning, the spirit that prompted you to say 'God help us to keep up strife' came from the devil. As the young lady, (God bless her) stood before us with beautiful, snowy, white, outstretched arms begging you old soldiers to lay aside the tomahawk, I thought of the son of God when he exclaimed 'Oh Jerusalem, Jerusalem, how oft would I have gathered you together as a hen gathereth her brood under her wings and ye would not.'" Then the chairman said: "Your ten minutes is out." Then I said: "Ladies and gentlemen, if you wish to hear me expound Socialism and skin Joe Bailey, follow me to the court house steps." The entire audience, except 4 or 5 old soldiers, arose and followed. After I'd been speaking about five minutes the chairman of the old soldiers' meeting came to the door and begged the old soldiers to return so they could proceed with their business, but they did not return. Then their meeting was dismissed, and hundreds of people stood for an hour and a half listening at the gospel for the first time in life. After the speech many said to me: "You've converted me. I shall never attend another old soldiers' meeting."

THE CONSTITUTION.

Well comrades I did think that I would keep out of this discussion, but here goes. I want to say that Comrade Roselius struck the key note when he said the Socialists ought not to be monkeying with the constitution. Who started this monkey business anyway? It was this committee of five of which Roselius was a member, who drew up a platform in such a manner that the Socialist had to reject or endorse a constitution that few of them knew what it contained. Now then if they had left it alone we would have been alright. The way it stands now the majority dictates to the minority how they shall cast their vote. That reminds me of the yellow dog with the brass collar on and a log chain tied to his tail, or in other words this out herods Herod. When I was a little fellow I was very fond of cheese. They told me the moon was a ball of cheese. They did not have any cheese so I commenced bawling for the moon. They offered me corn-bread and sow-belly, but I would not have it. Well, what was the result? I starved to death, of course. Now the application, let us bawl for a Socialist constitution and take no other though we know it is an impossibility until we elect a Socialist president, congress and have a majority vote in Oklahoma. What will happen to us in the meantime? Plenty. I had a dream that was not a dream; I thought I was inside a large wall, and the place was gloomy with ignorance. The railroads and coal combines had a deadly clutch on the people. The government finally punched a hole in the wall and said, "Come out in the sunshine." I wanted out and I wanted out bad. I made a rush for the hole when, judge of my consternation, I found those five members of the committee, Comrade Stanton and a lot of federal appointees getting ready to close up our only avenue of escape, and I will tell you right here I don't like the looks of the crowd you are lined up with comrades. Comrade Branstatter said the platform carried because it was in the affirmative. He said our motion, if put in the affirmative, would probably carry. A man should consider his ballot a sacred trust, he should go to the polls and vote to the best of knowledge for the welfare of himself, his wife and his children, but the way things stand now some of us will have to say I believe it to my interest and the best interest of the Socialist party and for the best interest of the children who need the free schools. Yea, if I vote against it I disfranchise myself, but 700 Socialists say I must vote against my convictions of what is right, so I vote against it because that great big majority must be right. If any of the comrades will show me a single thing to be gained by turning it down I will vote against it. You have declared against it, yet we don't know, even now, what it will contain. When the convention meets on the 10th it may be changed. Now, comrades, this controversy between the Socialist reaches beyond the vote on the constitution, and we will have to thresh it out among ourselves. Are we to sit down and howl for the moon, or, are we going to try to do something to better our condition? You think it will carry even though we vote against it. A man should cast his vote just the same as if he knew his vote would decide the issue, then you nominate a full set of

officers. If Comrade Roselius was to tell me he had a fine apple tree and would invite me to come and eat some of the fruit at a certain date, how do you think I would feel when I went to eat the fruit and find the tree cut down. That is the way you treat your candidates. Let us press forward, stagnation is death. If we want to take one step forward let us take it. Don't sit down and wait for the wheel of evolution to whirl you into Socialism. If you do it may turn backward. Let us get up and put some oil on the wheel, then get behind it and push.
