SOCIALIST SPEAKS

On labor day at Dallas the following speech was delivered by Guy E. Miller a Socialist.

Guy E. Miller, organizer for the National Socialist party, spoke for that party. He said some of these days you will come in at the first table. Labor which throughout the centuries had no language but a groan is coming at last into its own. And how much is that? All it can produce. That is what labor is going to have. We are coming to take our own—not with dynamite not with armies. No outrages will then disgrace the country. Then there will be no class with all the power of government behind it to oppress the masses.

The speaker then compared President Roosevelt's prompt action in ordering warships to the coast of Africa to rescue an individual American citizen, with his failure to interfere when 15,000 citizens were in jeopardy in Colorado, during the miners strike.

The farmer makes the town lot valuable. The politician allows the speculator to reap that value, while at the same time he robs the farmer to support the town.

Where ever the democratic party governs, men are encouraged to take the law into their own hands, and the administration of Justice is an outrage upon common sense.

There are slaves who will not choose hatred, scoffing, and abuse, rather than in silence shrink from the thoughts they need must think they are slaves who dare not be in the right with two or three.

PRINCIPLES OF SOCIAL-DEMOCRACY.

We, the Socialist party, in convention assembled, make our appeal to the American people as the defender and preserver of the idea of liberty and self-government, in which the nation was born; as the only political movement standing for the program and principles by which the liberty of the individual may become a fact; as the only political organization that is Democratic, and that has for its purpose the democratization of the whole society.

To this idea of liberty the Republican and Democratic parties are alike false. They alike struggle for power to maintain and profit by an industrial system which can be preserved only by the complete overthrow of such liberties as we already have, and by the still further enslavement and degradation of labor.

Our American institution came into the world in the name of freedom. They have been siezed upon by the capitalist class as the means of rooting out the idea of freedom from among the people. Our state and national legislatures have become the mere agents of great propertied interests. These interests control the appointments and decisions of the judges and our courts. They have come into what is practically a private ownership of all the functions and forces of government. They are using these to betray and conquer foreign and weaker people, in order to establish new markets for the surplus goods which the people make, but are too poor to buy. They are gradually so invading and stritcting the right of suffrage as to take unawares the right of the worker to a vote or voice in public affairs. By enacting new and misinterpreting old laws, they are preparing to attack the liberty of the individual even to speak or think for himself or for the common good.

By controlling all the sources of social revenue, the possessing class is able to silence what might be the voice of protest against the passing of liberty and the coming of tyranny. It completely controls the university, the public school, the pulpit and the press, the arts and literatures. By making these economically dependent upon itself, it has brought all the forms of public teaching into servile submission to its own interests.

Our political institutes are also being

used as the destroyers of that individual property upon which all liberty and opportunity depend. The promise of economic independence to each man was one of the faiths in which our institutions were founded. But under the guise of defending private property, capitalism is using our political institutions to make it impossible for the vast majority of human beings to ever become possessors of private property in the means of life.

Capitalism is the enemy and destroyer of essential private property. Its development is through the legalized confiscation of all that the labor of the working class produces above subsistence wage. The private ownership of the means of employment grounds society in an economic slavery which renders intellectual and political tyranny inevitable.

Social-Democracy comes to so organize industry and society that every individual shall be secure in that private property in the means of life upon which his liberty of being thought and action depend. It comes to rescue the people from the vast increasing and successful assault of capitalism upon the liberty of the individual.

II

As an American Social-Democratic party, we pledge our fidelity to the principles of the International Social-Democracy as embodied in the united thought and action of the Social-Democrats of all nations. In the industrial development already accomplished, the interests of the world workers are separated by no national boundaries. The condition of the most exploited and oppressed workers, in the most remote places of the earth, inevitably tends to drag down all the workers of the world to the same level. The tendency of the competitive wage system is to make labor's lowest condition. Industry and finance are no longer national, but international, both in organization and results. The chief significance of national boundaries and of the so-called patriotism which the ruling class of each nation is seeking to revive, is the power which these give to capitalists to keep the workers of the world from uniting, and to throw them against each other in the struggle of contending capitalists for the control of the yet unexploited markets of the world, or the remaining sources of profit.

The Social-Democratic movement, therefore, is a world movement. It knows of no conflicts of interest between the workers of

one nation and the workers of another. It stands for the freedom of the workers of all nations; and, in so standing, it makes for the full freedom of all humanity.

Socialism and the Church

Today the Socialist stand for the complete overthrow of the wage system which our Baptist minister in 1835, told you was a difference in degree, only from that of chattel slavery. Under chattel slavery the master owned the body of the slave and took what he produced, today the Capitalist owns the machine, the mines, the factories, the railroads and the greater share of the land. The worker can produce only on his terms, and his terms are the entire product save enough to live upon. These were the terms of the slave owner, only he was more generous, he provided shelter and food and medical care, when the worker had nothing to do or was sick, the slave had decidedly the best of it.

The Socialist says the worker is entitled to the full social value of his labor, and that this can only be accomplished by the collective ownership of the machines of production. Eliminating the private Capitalist entirely, as we have done with our school system, and our public road system, and partially by our public post office system.

The church today supports the wage system, why? For the same reason that the church supported the chattel slave system. The church derives its support from the Rockefellers, the Morgans, the Carnigies, the Depews, the McCurdys, the Burtons, the Mitchells, the Clarks and the little capitalists, who hope some day to be big capitalists,

their economic interests are at stake, they are afraid they will lose the support needed to maintain their institution, and so they either silently ignore it or openly espouse it. I am speaking of the church as an official organization, and I make no exception. There are many noble men among the ministry, who with courage stands out badly against these inquisitive wrongs but they soon find themselves without jobs.

Dubois. P. A. (special) Mayor Lewis Boyer has issued the most sweeping Sunday closing law that ever has been promulgated in this section of the state. Beginning Sunday street cars must stop running, every where within the city limits including private vehicles must cease at 9 a. m. Sunday newspapers must suspend operations, and the lid must be put on everything that bears any resemblance to work.

But the Mayor goes further, he decrees that fashionable paid choirs must not sing, church organists must not play, and church collections must not be taken up, he has not yet decided to muzzle the preacher, but he has taken the matter under advisement, stopping the collections is expected to have the direct effect. The preacher is not expected to work for his health, and the Mayor won't let him work for pay on Sunday.

USELES CAPITALISTS

Are the interests of the capitalists and the laborer identical? Many people say that they are. These people reason that if there were no railroads, mills, mines, and machines labor would find it hard to produce wealth. If labor did not use these things no wealth would be produced. Therefore—and here is where there is a big jump in the train of reasoning, the laborer and the capitalist are equally necessary.

Let us look a little closer into the connection between labor and capital. The laborer is an owner of labor power and the capitalist is an owner of capital.

The laborer is firmly attached to his labor power, and when he sells he must go with it himself and undergo whatever discomfort attaches to its use. But the capitalist may live at Newport or in Europe while his capital is being used to produce wealth in the mines of Pennsylvania or the packing houses of Chicago.

The laborer uses capital as a means with which to produce wealth, but he does not have any use for the capitalist.

The income of the capitalist is the difference between what he is forced to pay for labor power and what labor power will produce. If he can find the labor power which he needs in the possession of women and children too weak to resist oppression, he will buy of them rather than of men. The capitalist is interested in everything that tends to make labor power cheap.

If left alone the capitalist would reduce wages to the point where he would impair the efficiency of labor power, and this fact is sometimes offered as evidence that the capitalist is interested in having high wages. But this is the same as saying that because a well fed horse will do more work than a brush fed mule, therefore, the horse owner is interested in having the price of oats as high as possible.

The cheaper the labor power the larger the profits, the greater the income of the capitalist, this is the law of capitalism.

The capitalist desires child labor, long hours and low wages.

The laborer demands that childhood be freed from toil, that the human frame be not worn out by overwork, and that the worker shall have the full product of his labor.

The Capitalist encourages competition between workers that the selling price of their labor power may be determined by the resistance of the weakest seller.

So the contrasts might be drawn indefinitely. When one uses the words capitalist and labor instead of capital and labor the antagonisms become evil to all.

But there is a deeper antagonism between capitalist and laborer.

The existence of the capitalist class constitutes a drag upon social progress. The interests of the laborers are, on the contrary, most emphatically in accord with social progress.

The welfare of the working class and social progress alike demand the abolition of the capitalist class and the taking up of the function of ownership by the laborers collectively.

All would then be laborers and also common owners of capital.

Against the coming of such society the present capitalist class is fighting with all the powers at its disposal. The daily press, the lecture platform, and all the machinery by which public opinion is created are used to propagate the idea of the necessity of the capitalist at present and his indispensability in the future.

Fortunately for the laboring class this siren song is fast losing its power to charm. Strikes, injunctions, blocklists, Idaho bull pens are rapidly awakening the laborers to a recognition of the antagonism existing between the laboring class and the capitalist class.

The Socialist sees that this class struggle is here and that it is founded upon an antagonism that reaches deep down into the roots of our social order. He sees that because of the overwhelming numbers of the working class it is necessary for them to but see these facts to win the struggle and with it the cause of social progress.

The attainment of that victory by the workers and the accompanying abolition of an exploiting capitalist class by the collective ownership of capital is the only road to social peace and THAT ROAD LEADS TO SOCIAL ISM.
