FOR THE SAKE OF THE CHILD

The heaviest of all the counts in the indictment against present civilization must be brought in the name of the child.

Among birds and beasts the days of infancy are those of care by the adults. During the countless ages that man was coming up through savagery the burden of providing food, shelter and clothing fell only upon the adult.

Only with the coming of civilization did the burden begin to be shifted to the shoulders of the child. At first it was only in those tasks that are almost play that the child worked by the side of its parent in the open air. Indeed, the work had much the character of education. It was not done under the scouring whip of profit seeking.

But as the years passed by man learned to do the work of the world in better, easier ways. The great machine came in to do in hours what had once taken days and even months or years.

This might have brought leisure and happiness to all. But the machines became the property of the few. These few owners received all that could be produced by the machines save what they paid to those who tended them, and who must tend them in order to live, since they could not produce the wealth they needed without using the machines.

These owners, therefore, sought only for the CHEAPEST labor.

Then it was discovered that the child could work cheaper than the man, and for the first time there arose a society that turned upon a child's strength.

Today we are just beginning to wake up to what that means.

We are discovering that the child worker means tramps and criminals in manhood, that it means illiteracy and degeneracy and real race suicide.

Today there are many who are looking into the effect of present society on the child. They know that the child is the stuff out of which the future society must be built, and woe be to that society that devours its own future. That is just what our present society is doing.

From the very hour of birth, and even before through its treatment of the mother, the child is cursed by the blight of capitalism.

The mill and the factory steal the mother from the home and leave the infant uncared for. Competitive business poisons its food. The rule of the landlord deprives it of a playground or even of the very air that is necessary to life. So terrible is the pressure of these opening years of life that more than half of those that are born die before the first four years have passed.

The young marine, selected for the job because of his fine appearance and soldierly bearing, walked among the idlers with a blase air.

Into each hand, as he passed, he thrust a circular.

This circular attracted all, and some were late in the dash for the newspapers with their "want ads."

At the head of the circular, in big, black type, were the thrilling words, "Men Wanted."

Each idler read the circular feverishly.

"Able bodied," the document continued, and the cripples dropped it.

"Must be at least 21," it said further on, and the boys dropped it.

PRINCIPLES OF SOCIAL-DEMOCRACY (continued from last week)

III.

The Social-Democratic movement owes its birth and growth to that economic development of world-process which is rapidly separating a working or producing class from a possessing or capitalist class. The class that produces nothing possesses labor's fruits, and the opportunities and enjoyment these fruits afford, while the class that does the world's real work has increasing economic uncertainty, and physical and intellectual misery, as its portion.

The fact that these two classes have not yet become fully conscious of their distinction from each other, the fact that the lines of division and interist may not yet be clearly drawn, does not change the fact of the class conflict.

This class struggle is due to the private ownership of the means of employment, or the tools of production. Wherever and whenever man owned his own land and tools, and by them produced only the things which he used, economic independence was possible. But production, or the making of goods, has long since ceased to be individual. The labors of scores or even thousands, enter into almost every article produced. Production is now social or collective. Practically everything is made or done by many men—sometimes separated by seas and continents—working together for the same end. But this co-operation in production is not for the direct use of the things made by the workers who make them, but for the profit of the owners of the tools and means of production; and to this is due the present division of society into two distinct classes; and from it has sprung all the miseries, inharmonies and contractions of our civilization. —Social-Democratic-Herald.
