POINTED PARAGRAPHS

Taxation is the means employed to destroy the small competitor, thus restricting the operation of the natural law of competition. The natural law of supply is also restricted, so is the law of demand. In this way and by this means business is centralized and monopoly fostered. The abolition of taxation as we now have it, and the adoption of absolute freedom of domestic trade, is the proper remedy.

There shall be free trade between all parts of the United States. So says the federal constitution. Is Duncan in the United States? If so, why isn't trade free in Duncan? What right has Duncan to restrict trade with taxation?

Let us work to secure a just and equitable distribution of the annual product of Stephens county amongst the producers of Stephens county. After we have done that we may then be able to save the country. Let us first save Stephens county from landlordism and speculation.

The annual product of Stephens county should be divided between the labor and capital of Stephens county, the state and county having secured their share in the meantime in strict accordance with the laws of trade.

Whatever serves to restrict the operation

of the natural law of supply in Duncan works the robbery of the farmer.

The landlords and speculators of Stephens county constitute a small minority of the people. But they secure the lion's share of the annual product. This is due to the fact that custom has legalized injustice.

If men were burned alive for heresy today, as they were a few hundred years ago, what a time we would have attending bonfires. When we think of this we are very thankful to be living in these degenerate days.

Just think of a town lot speculator whose operations serve to deprive the workingman of employment moving heaven and earth to also deprive him of the right to drink beer. Ain't he a dandy?

The "Free Thinker."

Don't run away with the idea that because one declares himself a "free thinker" that he concedes other people the right to freely think. A "free thinker" is very often a most intolerant bigot. He concedes you the right to think only when you think as he would have you think. And you must talk as he talks, or he will promptly denounce you as a fool, and stop his paper. There are only a few religious bigots here and there who are as intolerant as some "free thinkers."

Women will not be slaves to fashion when Socialism comes, for when the profit system is eliminated there will be no occasion for all dress alike.

OUR POSITION FORTIFIED

Chicago Evening Journal (Republican.)

"The board of review should take pains to increase the taxes of land squatters, of whom there are too many in Chicago. Rich men buy up valuable vacant or cheaply improved lots in good neighborhoods and allow them to stay improved while other men build skyscrapers all around them and increase their value. Such property should not be lightly taxed. Indeed, it should be more heavily taxed than the improved land near to it, for the owners are profiting by the enterprise of their neighbors without spending a cent of their own."

Without having any desire to improve upon the above statement of fact, we beg to call attention to the additional fact that every town in the United States is afflicted in the same way. If the town lot speculator was relegated to a condition of innocuous desuetude the expansions of industry would be such that the supply of labor would be totally inadequate to the demand, and labor would have a tremendous advantage over capital; so much so that the large capitalist would have no more control of the employe than the publisher of JUSTICE has over the printer, or that the writer has over his hired hand. The natural laws of supply and demand will equalize advantages when the political law is made to align with nature's law.

WILL YOU TAKE NOTICE

When the editor of the Washington Daily Post suggested that the capitalists spend five billion dollars building homes for the working class in order to head off Socialism, he was giving the industrial kings of America some advice that they will thoroughly appreciate when it is too late. All the great moulders of public opinion have awakened to the fact, whether they admit it or not, that the working class is rapidly getting dispropriated and rendered homeless despite the unprecedented reign of prosperity. Any man with a grain of knowledge of human nature knows that the great masses of the people will not consent to be crushed into or off the earth, just simply because they and their fathers didn't happen to be successful financiers. You may at this moment be fondling a dimpled babe on your knee which will be the moral and intellectual superior of any plutocratic infant that ever hit the bottle; but what hope can you offer it? You surely are not so steeped in ignorance that you can't see that all this world's goods are rapidly drifting into the hands of the few; you know to an absolute certainty that that very thing is happening and happening in a holy hurry; you don't know why, and you really haven't got time to study out the reason. Your first noble impulse is to protect your babies from the iron heel of the monster that is crushing humanity. The most natural way for you to go about this in your mind is to accumulate enough wealth, the use of which will enable your children to hold their own in this terrible struggle for existence, but every way you turn you are confronted with a spectacle that grates on your soul; if you come of a family of farmers you can readily see the difference in the chance your child has and the one you had. More than likely when a boy your father gave you some valuable advice that went something like this: "Work hard, my boy, and save your money; this old world is running over with glorious opportunities; get you a team and wagon and some farm implements and get hold of a good piece of land before it is too late."

There are other boys growing up who will take these opportunities if you don't get there first; but now I ask you, can you say to your son what your father said to you? No, no. If you know nothing of Socialism the only picture you can draw before your boy is one of despair. It matters not which way you turn you can see no avenue for your boy to ever rise to independence. The little farmer with his little capital of \$5000, with which he could have made himself a land king fifty years ago, is rapidly finding out that he has about all he can do to support his family and educate his children. He can't give his children a team apiece and tell them to drive out and take up a piece of good land before it is too late; it is already too late. He can now say, "Children, study hard so you can make good servants for your masters." No use

trying to hold the old homestead, for the day of the small farmer is waning; the bonanza farmer with his modern machinery and cheap labor will crush you, so prepare for the inevitable wage slavery and its hated galling ways. The working class' productive ability is rapidly increasing, but there is no considerable part of that class that is receiving its just proportion of what it helps to produce. Why? Study Socialism and find out. Socialism will tell you that it is the fault of the system; and more than that, it will make you believe it.

When Things Will Be Different.

All children will have equal opportunity when Socialism comes.

THE WORKERS' NEED, THE SOCIALISTS' DEMAND

Consider the barren prospect of the average boy who faces the world today. If he is the son of a workingman his father is able to do little in the way of giving him a start.

He does not get to college, nor even to high school, but has to be satisfied with what he can get in the lower grades, for as soon as he has physical growth enough to work he must find something to do, so that he may help support the family.

His father has no influence and can get no preferred employment for him at the expense of some other boy, so he thankfully accepts any kind of service that he may be allowed to perform.

How hard is it to find a place for that boy of yours!

WHAT TO DO WITH THE BOY.

"What shall we do with Johnny?" is the question of the anxious mother long before her boy is ripe for the labor market.

"The child is weak, you know," continues the nervous, loving little mother, "and can't do hard work; and I feel dreadfully worried about him."

What a picture! Yet so common that the multitude do not see it. This mother numbered by the thousands many times over, instinctively understands the capitalist's system, feels its cruelty and dreads its approaching horrors which cast their shadows upon her tender, loving heart.

Nothing can be sadder than to see the mother take her boy by the hand and start to town with him to peddle him off as merchandise to some one who has use for a child-slave.

To know just how that feels one must have had precisely that experience.

The mother looks down so fondly and caressingly upon her boy; and he looks up into her eyes so timidly and appealingly as she explains his good points to the business man or factory boss, who in turn inspects the lad and interrogates him to verify his mother's claims, and finally informs them that they may call again the following week, but that he does not think he can use the boy.

Well, what finally becomes of the boy? He is now grown, his mother's worry is long since ended, as the grass grows green where she sleeps—and he, the boy? Why, he's a factory hand—a "hand," mind you, and he gets a dollar and a quarter a day when the factory is running.

That is all he will ever get.

He is an industrial life prisoner—no pardoning power for him in the capitalist system.

No sweet home, no beautiful wife, no happy children, no books, no flowers, no pictures, no comrades, no love, no joy for him.

Just a hand! A human factory hand!

Think of a hand with a soul in it!

In the capitalist system the soul has no

business. It cannot produce profit by any process of capitalist calculation.

The working hand is what is needed for the capitalist's tool and so the human must be reduced to a hand.

No head, no heart, no soul—simply a hand.

A thousand hands to one brain—the hands of workingmen, the brain of a capitalist.

This is capitalism!

And this system is supported alternately by the Republican party and the Democratic party.

These two parties relieve each other in support of the capitalist system, while the capitalist system relieves the working class of what they produce.

A thousand hands to one head is the abnormal development of the capitalist system.

A thousand workingmen turned into hands to develop and gorge and decorate one capitalist paunch!

POPE'S DRASTIC ORDER.

Rome, Sept. 16. — Alarmed by the spread of extreme liberalism even among the Roman Catholic clergy, Pope Pious X. today issued an encyclical in condemnation of "modernism," bitterly attacking the ideas of the new theology.

He said: "Modernism is a peril for the church. Its reforms in faith, philosophy, theology and history are all errors and drive those who believe in them to atheism. Boundless curiosity, pride of individualism and disregard of true Catholic knowledge and discipline actually have spread modernism among the clergy."

The encyclical decrees that philosophy and theology hereafter must be taught in the Catholic schools and universities in the complete spirit of the Catholic church and in accordance with the rules of the church.

It is decreed that all teachers imbued with the spirit of modernism must be dismissed and bishops must compel the clergy and the faithful to abstain from reading papers inspired by the spirit of modernism or advocating the new theories.

A board of censors is to be established in every bishopric to revise and edit all Catholic publications.

The ecclesiastics are forbidden from sending papers through the mails or otherwise directing them without the consent of the bishop. The ecclesiastics also must keep a close watch upon their assistants to prevent violation of this ruling.

Clerical congresses are forbidden except in cases when dangers of modernism and laicism arise.

A board of supervisors is to be formed

in every diocese to prevent the spread of "new errors."

All bishops are instructed that they must forward to the Pope individual reports regarding the matters covered in the encyclical.

The encyclical of today has caused a great stir throughout Europe and is regarded by far the most important issued during the present pontificate.

It is regarded in some circles as liable to arouse as much controversy as the famous promulgation of the dogma of the immaculate conception by Pope Pious IX.

A press dispatch dated New York, Sept. 16, says: "The first intimation that the Catholic clergy of New York had of the declaration against modern methods of teaching came from the United Press."

"At the residence of Archbishop John M. Farley it was stated that the head of the local archdiocese could not discuss the provisions of the new writ until the actual text had been received by him."

"However, all who were asked as to the reasons for the issuance of the decree and its widespread effect agreed it is aimed at the public school system of America more than anything else."

TO CLOSE CHICAGO SCHOOL.

The Daily Socialist, published at Chicago, commenting upon the proposal of a local judge to close one of its places of learning, has this to say:

"Judge Julian W. Mack, in an address before the congress of the National Prison association at the Auditorium hotel, declared that the John Worthy school ought to be closed; that it was not a school, but a prison, and that the delinquent youth of the city should be placed in a farm school, with the cottage plan in vogue. The judge also said he was in favor of medical inspectors and nurses for public schools, as the New York system now requires. He gave as a reason for this that it is often impossible to determine when a child is unfit for the school. Frequently he will be afflicted by an adenoid growth that prevents his breathing." The youth of the west is largely afflicted with a similar complaint, the vicinity of Duncan coming in for a liberal portion of youthful criminality, but somewhat more radical treatment is practiced than that employed in the east. In this locality when a boy is discovered fostering an abnormal growth of the kind mentioned, his "adenoid" is usually punctured with a brawny fist, and it is argued that a club is even more efficacious in effecting a cure. The services of a doctor come in later to restore his breathing.

Other addresses along this line were made by Judge Cleland, who believes in placing criminals on probation in cases where their crimes consist of malicious mischief, the theft of wearing apparel or drunkenness resulting from stolen whisky, and by Attorney Arthur N. Sager of St. Louis, who made a plea for the aged quasi-criminal of bad influence and worse whisky on the ground that if he committed indiscretions at an advanced age he was not inherently criminal.
