This is not the first time that this convert threat has been uttered. Children Suffering Alone

In an alley that separates two of Oklahoma City's busiest streets, of a business district where thousands upon thousands of dollars change hands every day, a brood of five motherless children, the oldest eleven years old and the youngest a baby of three years, are suffering for the bare necessities of life. From early morning until night, these little ones are alone, the elder child being their only care-taker. The family lives at the rear of 14 Hudson street.

The father, A. W. Stone, thin chested, stooped and worn by years of hard work, is employed in digging Oklahoma City's sewers. He draws a salary of \$1.75 a day and to him the "increased cost of living" problem is of more than passing interest.

He does not drink. He does not use tobacco. "I couldn't afford to if I wanted to," said he last night. "All the money I can earn must be applied to keeping the children and me from actual starvation."

Stone's wife died May 8, last.

"Things have been different since then," says the father. "When my wife was alive, our children were regular attendants at Sunday school. Their clothes were neat and clean and we were happy. We are happy now, I guess, but it isn't like it used to be. A father can't take the place of a mother, try as he may. I still owe the doctors who attended my wife during her last sickness. The children all had the measles at that time. "I pay \$8 a month rent here," and Stone surveyed the two little rooms that he calls home.

The furniture in the "living room" consists of four chairs, a small table and a stove. The rooms are lighted by a lantern.

"We will keep together," says the father. "Of course, I could 'farm my children out', but I won't do it as long as I have enough strength with which to make a living be it ever so scanty."

Behold! A Child Is Born

The successes achieved through the more or less commendable energy displayed by the ladies of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and kindred organizations throughout the country in the restriction of the liquor traffic has encouraged them to seek new and broader fields of operation, and from a comparative local question in individual counties and precincts the world is startled by the announcement that prohibition will become a living, breathing issue in the approaching national campaign, and victory is assured to that party which is willing to accept the paternity of the husky political babe and incorporate into its platform the demands of the colicky kid. The main feature which entitles it to public consideration is that its inception is entirely legitimate, its birth into the world a natural result of existing conditions, which alone will make it repulsive to both Democratic and Republican parties.
