The Class Struggle in Duncan

The petition asks the merchants to close up their places of business at 8 o'clock at night, so the clerks can have time to go home after working hours, eat their suppers, kiss their folks, undress, go to bed, get up, dress, eat breakfast, kiss their folks, and get back to work in time to sell a new hat to the last cotton picker in bed in the morning.

It is said that all the dry goods men but two have signed up, and it is thought that they will be brought to see that clerks are human just the same as other people, and that they are entitled to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; also, that pursuing happiness sixteen hours a day at \$2 a day is pretty strenuous business. The clerks seem determined, and if they don't get their demands they will call for the co-operation of the Farmers' Union and all other laborers. Every clerk's wages in America could be doubled and the hours cut in half, and not a small merchant in the country could be hurt. But oh, lord, what a howl would go up from the money loaners, as prosperity

for the wage earners is what they fear worse than death.

Capitalism's Inhumanity to Man

According to the Oklahoma State Capital, page 4, second column, Sunday, October 13, 1907, as follows:

"The average educated man gets a salary of \$1,000 a year. He works forty years, making a total of \$40,000 in a life time. The average day laborer gets \$1.50 a day, 300 days in a year, or \$450 a year; in forty years he earns \$18,000. The difference of \$22,000 equals the financial value of an education. To acquire this earning capacity requires twelve years at school 200 days in the year—2,400 days. Divide \$22,000, the value of an education, by 2,400, the number of days required in getting it, and we find that each day at school is worth nearly \$10 to the pupil without considering the satisfaction and pleasure of living a much more useful life."

This confession should show to the working man, especially the day laborer, that there is a value placed on his ignorance at the rate of \$1.50 per day in the labor market.

This confession is also proof against capitalism—that it profits by and through the ignorance of the day laborer.

It also proves that capitalism does not intend for the day laborer to educate his children, as capitalism is against compulsory education, in order that this education would be worth \$10 a day instead of \$1.50 per day.

It also proves that the day laborer, earning only \$450 a year, cannot by his earnings give even one child a twelve years' schooling in order to make him capable and competent to earn \$1,000 per year.

It also proves that capitalism reaps a profit of \$550 off of the laboring man because he is ignorant.

It also proves that there is a premium placed on ignorance by capitalism, therefore capitalism desires only to educate the children of the educated and still confess that the educated man is worth more to society in general but not worth so much to private capitalism.

It also proves that capitalism has no sympathy for the human family and approves and upholds laws that are to keep and hold a part of the human family in ignorance for profit.

Say, workingman, how much longer do you expect to let the other fellow do your thinking for you? I think it is about time you were making a strike at the ballot box for higher education, so that your education, with your physical body, will earn \$1,000 per year instead of \$450. Form that resolution to-day. Socialism and class conscious Socialists will assist you at the ballot box. They never scab.

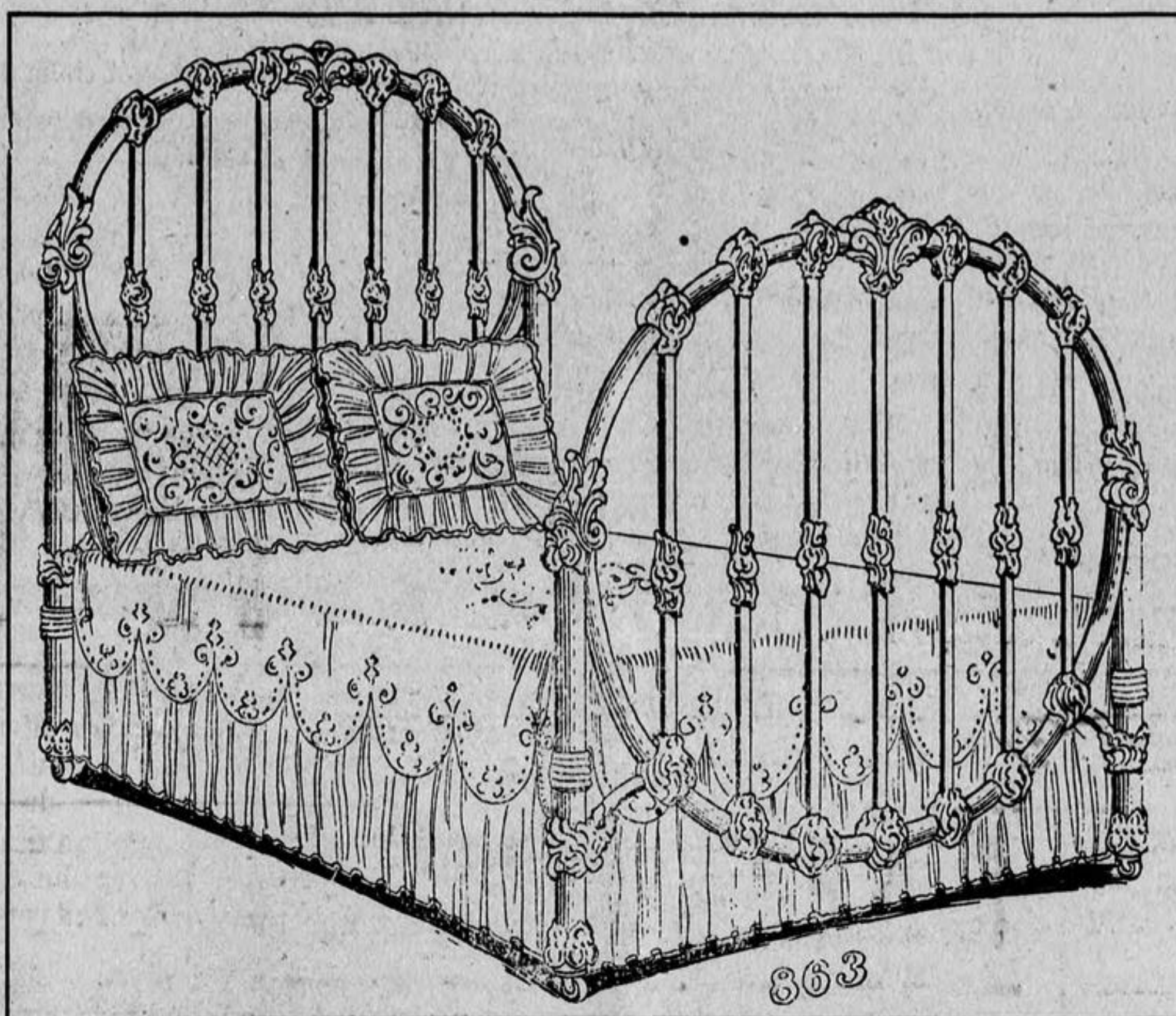

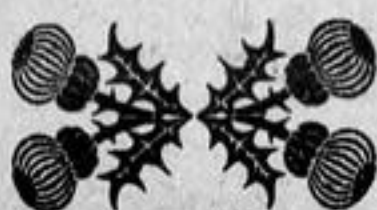

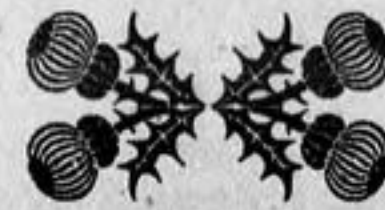
