

compare Lenin with his contemporaries is to compare a beaconlit mountain with the little sandhills around it which are swept into nothingness by a passing breeze. The heroes of the capitalist class and their wars and rule of Wilsons, misery, the Hardings, Lloyd Georges, Clemenceaus, the kings and kaisers and generals and statesmen, go to their graves with the curses of the people; only their infamy saves them from oblivion. Lenin, the greatest leader of the oppressed, continues to grow in stature and power; his words are a world influence and his deeds are a power.

The greatness of Lenin was that he was able to understand clearly the nature of the period in which he lived, the role of the oppressed classes in society today, the world-rending contradictions of imperialism which lay the basis for the development of the exploited millions into the raling class which is to free all of humanity; that he was able to forge revolutionary weapons out of every changing

form of the struggle, to fight with the same mercilessness against the concealed as well as the open enemies of the people, to combine the liberation struggle of the workers with that of the peasantry and the peoples of the colonies of imperialism; that by his leadership of the Bolshevik party and the International he led the victorious struggle of the Russian workers and peasants which opened a new era for the oppressed millions the world over.

Other great men and leaders existed before and during his time. But they were essentially different from

him. The Luthers, Husses, Washingtons, Lincolns, Napoleons, Garibaldis, and others were also great agents of history who helped to make history. But they were all the representatives of one class, which in gaining supremacy over an outworn ruling class, became itself the ruler and oppressor of a new class. Lenin, however, more than any other representative of his class was the leader of that movement which has for its aim the extermination of all class rule, and opens up an entirely new epoch for humanity.

Lenin was dominated by the disci-

pline of the historic goal of the working class. In periods of enthusiasm or depression he had the same determination. When others would become discouraged and weak, or go over entirely to the enemy, Lenin fought ahead with changeless vigor. When, after the failure of the 1905 revolution, others degenerated into philosophic mysticism, reformism and hopelessness, Lenin continued his task of weaving the fabric of the revolutionary move-When men who ment. stood at the head of the world's working class movement weakened, and betrayed their trust in the imperialist war, Lenin called for more intense struggle, for the destruction of the war of the robbers and exploiters by a war of the exploited against them. When many "leaders" scoffed and fought against the Russian revolution, Lenin led it to victory.

Lenin was a militant and organized fighter as a leader of the machinetrained proletariat should be. He was as relentless toward the enemy as it was toward its

slaves. He had the singleness of purpose that is part of every conscious section of a class that is about to change the course of history. He was warm and vital, like the movement of struggle he led. He was sharp with the knowledge that the oppressed needs as its weapon for liberation. He had the confidence that arises out of the conviction of inevitable victory.

The growing army of revolution is the tribute of the masses to their dead leader who lives and conquers in its growth.——S.

The Peace of Death

NE of the great, moving, episodes of history is contained in the story of General A. C. Sandino, who, with a comparative handful of ragged Nicaraguan patriots, is holding the mountain fastness of El Chipote against the mightiest imperialist power in the world.

For five months and more Sandino has been fighting against the United States marines.


The marines have inflicted severe losses upon Sandino and upon the Nicaraguan people. In the single bombing raid upon the undefended town of Ocotal last July they wiped out from 300 to 500 men, women, and children! Now 1,000 more marines are being shipped to Nicaragua, bringing the total up to more than 2500, in addition to airplanes, warships, and all the other accoutrements of war.

Sandino's heroic resistance is an earnest of the tremendeous vitality of the national liberation struggle. His stand has won for him the support of all Latin-America, and of many thousands of workers and poor farmers in the United States itself.

United States marines have occupied the territory of Nicaragua since December 24, 1926. They went there at the behest of Wall Street, to prevent the puppet dictator, Adolfo Diaz,

from being overthrown by the constitutional president, Dr. Juan Sacasa who was supported by the overwhelming majority of the people. Diaz has been president of Nicaragua once before—then, as now, behind the protecting lines of United States bayonets —and during his administration he turned over to American bankers control of the Nicaraguan railways and of the National Bank of Nicaragua. Previous to his meteoric rise to the presidency he had been an employee of an American mining corporation in Nicaragua, receiving a salary of \$1,000 a year.

For thirteen years (1912-1925) United States military forces maintained unpopular native dictatorships in power in Nicaragua. As soon as the forces were withdrawn the contemporary dictatorship fell. A new lummy government is now set up to reclaim the conquests of Wall Street and

Washington in the earlier period, and to complete the looting of Nicaragua, then only timidly begun. An American, Dr. William P. Cumberland, has been made financial dictator. Negotiations are under way which will result in new loans totalling \$20,000,000 being saddled upon the backs of the Nicaraguan people, with the military and naval forces of the United States serving to guard the imperial investments.

But the chief objective in the invasion of Nicaragua is the Nicaraguan canal zone across which is to be built a new Atlantic-Pacific gateway of American imperialism, a new radiating center for the ever-widening profit-empire of Wall Street. The


right to build a canal across the territory of Nicaragua was bartered to the United States government, together with liberal grants of territory in perpetual lease on either side of the prospective canal, in return for \$3,000,000, little, if any of which, has ever found its way to Nicaragua.

The Bryan-Chamorro treaty signed on February 18, 1916, gives the United States government the following concessions:

- 1. The right to construct a trans-isthmian canal via San Juan and the Great Lake route, or any other route thru the territory of Nicaragua.
- 2. The control by lease for ninety-nine years of the Great Corn and Little Corn Islands, and of a naval base in the Gulf of Fonseca.
- 3. The United States has the option of renewing the lease on a naval base for another ninety-nine

vears.

This treaty blithely ignores the fact that Honduras and Salvador border on the Gulf of Fonseca as well as Nicaragua. The Nicaraguan government-even if it were a legitimate one and not a dummy for American imperialismhas no right to make agreements affecting the Gulf of Fonseca without consulting Honduras and Salvador.



THE acquittal of Calogero Greco and Donato Carillo is a distinct victory for labor, and a blow against the frame-up system. It is not a victory for the "justice" of the courts of capitalism. The intention of the prosecution, which included the judge as well as the district attorney was to railroad these two innocent workers to their death. They hesitated, and failed to accomplish their murderous purposes not because the two anti-fascist workers were plainly innocent, but because the militant workers very swiftly demonstrated that they were already on guard, that with publicity and public demonstrations they would make this case a national and international issue, and

dark of the night without such a protest as would shake the world as it did in the case of the two martyrs, Sacco and Vanzetti. The victory in this case showed that increasing numbers of workers have learned the lessons of the Sacco-Vanzetti fight. This time there was no hesitation. From the very beginning it was made clear that it was an instance of class persecution, and not a case of criminal justice. The campaign of publicity was immediately organized, and even before the trial began, the angry voices of the workers in far-off Europe were already being heard in the labor press, protesting against the development of another Sacco-Vanzetti assassination. Meetings were arranged in various cities of the country. A committee representing all the

class agitation from the very beginning. Its telegram to Governor Smith, who has presidential aspirations, undoubtedly played its part, also. The prospect of demonstrations thruout the country in the presidential year, with thousands of workers accusing Smith of having played the same role as Fuller, was none too pleasant for the democratic party machine to visualize. It was this

threat of an international movement of the millions who participated in the Sacco-Vanzetti campaign that frightened the prosecution out of its prey.

The victory in this case should give the entire labor movement confidence and renewed power in mobilizing for a national fight against the frame-up system. The dozens of workers in prison, and those who are yet to come, form a constant demand upon the working class of this country for swift and decisive action. The International Labor Defense has already issued its appeal for a powerful, united movement. It is the duty of every worker to join in this fight to crush this vicious monster that seeks to destroy the movement of freedom for the working class.





The oppressed millions of China are longsuffering and patient; but it is not the patience of meekness. It is a patience of watchfulness. The flag of the revolution waves in China, even above the black mist of reaction. In many cities, the workers and peasants have established their Soviet rule. The labor unions, still bleeding from the cowardly attacks of the reaction, still have the adherence of hundreds of thousands; and the strike wave rises where it is least expected. The peasantry is still opposed to the militarist adventurers and imperialist agents who ravage the land and keep them in a state of poverty and starvation. Even some of the petty trades men have protested against the servile action of Chiang Kai Shek in breaking off relations with the Soviet Union—the only country which treated the Chinese people as equals and comrades in a common fight—and wantonly murdering many of its accredited representatives.

The Chinese revolutionary movement is now going through one of its most difficult periods. But it will not be crushed by the American, British, French and Japanese imperialists, or their navies, or their armies, or their Chinese servants, for the revolution has an inexhaustible virility and it is armed with the forces of history.











THE name and tradition of Spartacus is dear to the heart of every working class rebel in the world, and particularly to those of Germany. Spartacus is for them the standard of revolutionary courage against the perfidy, cowardice and betrayal of the bureaucratic leaders during the imperialist war, the banner borne by Karl Liebknecht, Rosa Luxemburg and their comrades. Spartacus is for them the flag of struggle which led them in the January uprising in 1919 to a heroic attempt at the final victory of the oppressed. Spartacus is for them the ineradicable memory of those two peerless leaders who were

dead. With hands raised the revolutionaries, beaten and spat upon by the soldiers, march to the barracks. Here they are placed against a wall and threatened for hours with death. A sixteen year old young corporal is ordered to shout. 'Long live Scheidemann.' With pale face he turns to his tormentors and calls, "Long live Liebknecht!' A rifle shot, and he falls dead to the ground."

But above the crack of the rifle shots that wound and kill the fighters in the army of liberation rises the deathless cry: Spartacus still lives!

ident Diaz. Therefore President Coolidge sent Col. Henry L. Stimson to Nicaragua as his personal emissary.

Stimson brought about "peace" in Nicaragua-that is, he negotiated a deal with Diaz and Moncada on the basis of which constitutional President Sacasa was obliged to go into exile. Other features of the deal -besides the secret features which have not been given out-were provisions for continued occupation of Nicaragua by United States marines ("to supervise the elections in August, 1928"), and of course a loan put thru by American- bankers.

But there was no peace. Stimson negotiated his agreement in May of last year, and in July the Ocotal massacre occurred to mock the smug claims of peace. Additional murders of Nicaraguans have continued up to the present time. Everyone who resists American imperialist domination in Nicaragua is treated as an outlaw and attacked. The peace of the Stimson agreement is a peace of death. Nicaragua, Latin America as a whole, can never tolerate such a peace, which is already being shattered to smitherings by the army of General Sandino, who is now the idol of the Nicaraguan people. The widespread support for Sandino in Nicaragua is proven by the strike of stevedores in the port of Corinto, who refused to unload ammunitions for the American invaders. Sandino in resisting imperialist aggression in Nicaragua represents the struggle of all the op-

pressed peoples against imperialist domination. Nicaragua is an important test. It is a test for American workers and farmers no less than for the people of Latin America.

It is the test which will determine whether or not American imperialism can go forward to the rape of one Latin American country after another without any effective resistance from the masses of the Americans themselves. If the imperialists are allowed to go ahead in Nicaragua there is no crime, no outrage which they cannot perpetrate in Latin America under the bloody profit flag of the Monroe-Doctrine.

It is in Nicaragua and around the question raised by the invasion of Nicaragua, rather than at Pan-Amercan conferences, that the real questions of Pan-Americanism will be fought out.

Sandino is fighting for all of us.

A REBEL WORKER'S LIFE

THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY
OF A CLASS WAR PRISONER
By EUGENE BARNETT

(Continued from last issue.)

I didn't know what to do. I got my horse and rode south on Pearl Street two blocks, then went west. I had lived out across the Chehalis River on a farm, and had worked for the farmers over there. I thought of going to them, telling them what had happened and trying to get them to come in and protect the boys from the mob, but was afraid they wouldn't come. So I started for home. I went north on a street three blocks west of Tower Avenue, till I got to Third Street, went east on Third to Tower Avenue. This was not quite a block north of the hall.

The mob had gone so I thought I would get my coat for I was afraid they might burn the building and burn up my land papers. So I put my horse in a wood-drying shed, half a block east of Tower Avenue on Third Street and went down to get my coat. There was a crowd standing around the front of the Roderick and the Hall. The front was torn out of the hall, the doors between the hall and the hotel were torn off the hinges and one of them was on edge.

Across the door to the hotel lobby Mrs. McAllister was standing in the doorway telling the crowd how it all happened. I asked her if Mr. McAllister was there. She said yes, and while she was telling the crowd about me being there while the raid

was taking place I stepped over the door and went inside. I found Mr. McAllister in the back room patching up a door that the mob had smashed.

"It was no use saying anything and get killed," he said.

I asked him where my coat was and he told me it was behind the counter in the lobby. At the time of the trial he was afraid to admit this. I got the coat, put the card in my sock, put the coat on and went out. On the way back to my horse I heard a boy about twelve years old telling a bunch of kids how he had climbed a telephone pole with the end of a rope to hang a Wobbly but, he said, a woman stopped him. I learned that one of the fellows shot was named Hubbard.

I met an acquaintance named Arrowsmith who, like myself, liked hunting dogs and he walked down to my horse with me. I led my horse out in the middle of the street and while telling him about my hounds, I put my chaps on.

There were all kinds of people passing with guns, going toward the east side called the Logan District, where nearly all the houses are occupied by working people. I saw kids ten or twelve years old hunting Wobblies with shot guns and rifles. I got on my horse and started home. I met an automobile and a fellow on the running board called out, "we have got two more

of the s—s of b——s." The driver of the car was Olliver, of the Olliver Hardware Company of Centralia.

They had John Lamb and his son Dewey. In the vicinity of O. C. Bland's house, between 40 and 50 automobiles were standing and men were searching from house to house. I walked my horse most of the way home. About three miles out a young fellow named Johnson caught up with me. He was on horseback, and was going after the mail. I told him about the trouble. Next I met Jones in the road in front of his house. He was a farmer and had a car, so I figured he would go to town when he heard the news and that if he knew the truth he might help keep the mob down so they would not lynch the boys in jail.

So I told him just what had happened as far as I knew. I had heard that only two men were shot, that one was dead, and Hubbard was shot three times, but was still alive. I told him they should have killed the whole damned bunch, for they had no business raiding them. Then he told me his nephew belonged to the Legion. I have learned since that it was this nephew who showed his fist to a coal miner, after he had hit Wesley Everest in the face while three men were holding him with a rope around his neck. And Jones came on the stand and swore point blank lies.

Come in Mass To Aid the Labor Defense!

Tom Mooney at San Quentin

E accompanied Dr. Stanley to the dining room. The man who

waited upon our table was Tom Mooney, whose conviction as a dynamiter stirred the nations of the world. Still in middle life, the years are nevertheless crawling heavily across Mooney. Though even the intercession of Woodrow Wilson failed to get him a new trial, he still hopes for a pardon. . .

Allowed to languish in prison the past dozen years, he is neglected by the parlor radicals, now grazing in more luscious publicity fields. Men high in financial power have said of Mooney, "Well, if he's not guilty of the Preparedness Day bombing, he's guilty of something else. He belongs in San Quentin." Mooney's enemies are unlike his friends: they know exactly what they want.

Mooney, now phonographic, talked for an hour, detailing his acquittals and convictions. If he is innocent, it seems incomprehensible that semi-civilized men should be guilty of such a crime. But even Sinclair Lewis suppressed the hardness of a Babbitt to gain his end.

"Well, Tom," said the reporter, "if they let you out tomorrow, what would you do?"

Mooney stood erect, the picture of subdued virility. "I'll tell you what I'd do—I'd look after my health right away."

All of us glanced at the physician. No man spoke for a minute.

"What's the matter with your health, Tom?" the doctor finally asked.

"No reflections on you, Doctor," returned Mooney, "but you know how it is," and then further explanations, which wended back to the injustice of twelve years' imprisonment.

Those years have eaten at the mind of Mooney, stooping his shoulders.

McNamara was then in charge of the condemned row. I had told him the outline of a novel in which a youthful radical was to be hanged. He was much interested in the plan.

He was eager to help me get the correct details and atmosphere. He talked of my embryonic leading character as though he were a reality.

"You want to get it right," he then said, "it'll help the cause."

He had followed my career and always asked me, "Are you still going to do the story of the boy?". . .

The Prison Cure for the Fascist Ague



against the state, conviction upon which brings the sentence of death.

The revolutionaries are to be tried in the Special Court at Rome, which deals with "crimes against fascism and fascist state." It is presided over by the notorious General Sanna, who is cursed with the name of *Il Boia* (The Butcher) among the workers and peasants of Italy.

The fascist ship of state is enabled to keep afloat in the stormy waters of Italy, tossed about as it is by the increasing misery and opposition of the overwhelming maiority of the people, only by the steady stream of gold from the overflowing treasury of the American bankers. But even this cannot permanently protect the rotting vessel from the anger and power of the rising waves of opposition. And this opposition today finds its only organized expression in the militant battle fought against fascism by the Communist Party.

The Communist Party has been able to organize tens of thousands of workers and peasants into its underground and illegal ranks. While all the other "opposition" parties allowed themselves to be dissolved and dispersed, the Communist Party alone





remains in Italy fighting with unremitting vigor. It is the only party, outside of the fascisti, in Italy today. Its existence as the organizing and rallying center of a revolutionary anti-fascist movement gives Mussolini and his assassins chronic ague. These insane fools now hope to cure their ague by imprisoning the leaders of the Communist Party, as they have done with thousands of other revolutionary workers! The blood-drenched executioners might just as well hope to drain the Mediterranean with a sieve.

The National office of the International Labor Defense is in need of more copies of the Labor Defender for July 1926 and June 1927 in order to complete a few more of the bound volumes of the magazine. FIFTY leaders of the Communist Party of Italy are now imprisoned awaiting trial for fermenting revolution and rebellion against the power of the fascist state. Among them are the most popular and well-known leaders of the Italian labor movement, men who have remained in Italy in the face of the fascist terror and organized the only existing movement against the regime of the blackshirts.

They are being tried for actions taken during the time when the Communist Party functioned as a legal political organization, and if they are convicted their sentences will run anywhere from five to thirty years of imprisonment. For many of them imprisonment, particularly on the felon islands of the Mediterranean, is equivalent to slow death. Two of them, Umberto Terracini and Amadeo Bordiga, are in addition accused of organizing an armed insurrection

(Continued from p. 35) We must begin a campaign throughout the country to smash this poisonous system, to root it out, and to release its victims from their prisons. Especially must we fight energetically for the release of Tom Mooney and Warren Billings, whose cause was first in our minds when we were freed in the courtroom. Those courageous and noble fighters who have suffered the frightful torture of ten years of imprisonment solely for their lovalty to the cause of the working class have a great appeal and first claim upon the labor movement. We must fight for their active return in the same spirit and with the same energy with which the working class fought for Sacco and Vanzetti.

In our case, the lessons of the Sacco-Vanzetti fight were well learned by those who rallied to our cause. The movement of defense was already at hand when we were being prepared for the trial. The defense was ready and on guard, as it will be in the future, before we were placed in the death cell for execution. At the first sign of the plans of our enemies to send us to our death, the defense movement was on hand prepared for a vigorous struggle. Our case demonstrated more than ever the value of the International Labor Defense, which is constantly ready with the ma-

chinery of defense, the means of organizing the protest movement and providing legal defense and public agitation. The need of such an organization, when the arrests of workers is growing throughout the country, is more imperative than ever.

We appeal to all class conscious workers to join the International Labor Defense and support it in its great work in behalf of victimized and persecuted workers.

It was gratifying to know that in this case there was unity of all forces and all shades of opinions in the labor movement. We believe that such unity as was shown in our defense is exemplary and must be maintained in the movement for the release of all working class fighters who are in prison or on trial for their devotion to our cause.

We feel a strong responsibility for the honorable discharge of all financial obligations incurred in our defense and we hope that the sympathising workers will all assist in the collection of the funds still needed for this purpose.

We appeal likewise for the victims of Italian fascism, thousands of whom are today in the clutches of the blackshirted beast, imprisoned in the foulest dungeons or exiled to a terrible existence in the islands of the sea. Thousands of the flower

of the Italian proletariat have been murdered by the blood-maddened agents of Mussolini and every day scores are added to the long list of his victims. And the fight against Italian fascism must not neglect the struggle against the fascisti in this country who initiated the frame-up against us. Like the fascisti in Italy, they are prepared to destroy the labor movement, to crush it or drive it underground. Their violence and hatred is directed not only against the Italian workers in this country but against the entire working class. The workers must prepare now to fight them bitterly before they are confronted with a much more powerful monster that will seek to crush and tear them to the earth.

Workers of America! The poison of fascism and the frame-up system must be counteracted by our own powerful movement of solidarity and struggle. It is a fight in which every worker must join with conviction and militancy. In the name of the blood of our martyrs and our class comrades in the prisons of capitalism we appeal to the entire working class for concerted and irresistible action.

Rally for the struggles against infamy and terror, against the frame-up system!

Free the working class soldiers from the prisons of capitalism!




