Schlalism. SOCIALISM means, the public ownership and operation of all the means of production and distribution.- It means, among other things, public ownership of industries controlled by monopolies, trusts and combines; all railroads, telegraphs and telephones: all water-works, gas and electric plants; all gold, silver, copper, lead, iron, coal and other mines and all oil and gas wells.

SOCIALISM means abolition of the private ownership of espital and of wage slavery. SOCIALISM INEVITABLE Socialism has Passed the Stage of

Dreams and Entered Upon that of Scientific Fact.

The appearance of the "Manifesto of the Communist Party," by Marx and Engels in 1848, marks an important epoch in the history of the Socialist movement. Considered as a Utopia before: Socialism now became a science. It no longer appealed to the moral sen-timents and altrurian motives of the people, but to the brains and self-interest of that class which suffered mos under existing conditions-the working class. Socialism dropped its sen timental and philanthropic mantle and assumed the garb of the class struggle. Since then Socialism has become class movement. To the modern Socialist, all social-

istic and communistic theories, pre-vious to 1848, are more or less Uto-plan. The Marxist fully appreciates the labors of such men as Owen, Four-ier, Cabet, and many others like them, in so far as the in so far as they were excellent crit-ics of capitalist society. But their positive philosophy and all practical measures proposed by them were of a Utopian character., There is a slight difference between Moore's "Utopia," Fourier's "Phalansteries," Bacon's "New Atlantic," Cabet's "learia." 1 11 somewhat religious Socialism of Saint Simon and many others. "Their "ism are chimeras springing from faultistic minds. To all of these authors Socialism was an ideal, which could be more or less realized when all 11121 1 kind-were inspired by the beauty and grandeur of that ideal. The Socialists of the first half of this century, who dreamed of realizing their ideals recentury, who lied only on the moral sentiments and emotions of the people. They had faith in the altrurian motives of man-They were idealists pure and e. But not so with the modern kind. simple. Socialists. The modern Socialistsniestly Marxists-are far from being "Illusionists," as they are often called being They are not dreamers. but class conscious workingmen, with a definite program based on historical facts scientific truths and clear observations of the fendency of the development of our present industrial forces.

What is the essential difference be tween Utopian and modern Socialism? In the first is implied a lofty ideal; in the second, a science. Utopian Socialism is simply an enterprise in the mind of a certain individual, to reconstruct society according to his ideal. It ap peals to the heart, goodness and bro therly love of all men, and not until all men become emotional and good and are inspired by brotherly love does the Utopian Socialist hope to realize his ideal. Modern Socialism is a the ory of social organization which must soon be realized, as the inevitable re sult of the present industrial develop ment and consequence of the class struggle which originated in our presclas. ent mode of production and distribu-tion-the capitalist system. Modern Socialism does not appeal to the hearts and emotions of men, but to their brains- and self-interest. It does not appeal to all men, but to the working class. The movement of modern 50-cialism represents only the working class, not all classes. In short; it is a class movement which voices to in-terests, hence the ideals and aspira-

tions of only the working class. Mod-ern Socialism was not Invented by effher Marx nor Engels, nor by any ne-else. It was only pointed out as the next inevitable stage of society by Marx and Engels, who as scientists and far-sighted thinkers, discovered in existing economic development the ele-ments-the class struggle-which must finally result in the establishment' of -operative Commonwealth

The Social Democratic party of St. ouls, in convention assembled, reatfirms its allegiance to the revolutionnimes its anegrance to the revolution-ary principles of International Social-ism and declares the supreme political issues in America to day to be the con-test between the working dass and the emitted to the working dass and the capitalist class for the possession of the power of government. The party affirms steadfast, purpose to use those powers, once achieved, to destroy wage slavery, abolish the institution of pri-vate property in the means of production, and establish the Co-operative Commonwealth.

In the United States, as in all other civilized countries, the natural order of economic development has separated society into two antagonistic classe -the capitalists, a comparatively small class, the possessors of all, the modern means of production and distribution (land, mines, machinery and means of transportation and communication). and the large and ever-increasing class of wage-workers possessing no means of production.

The evil effects of the private ownership and operation of the means of pro duction and distribution are intensified by the recurring industrial crises con-tinually rendering the existence of the greater part of the population more precarious and uncertain, which amply proves that the modern means of production have outgrown the existing sodial order based on production for profit.

Hüman energy and natural resources are wasted for individual gain. Ignorance is fostered that wage slavery m y be perpetuated. Science and invention are perverted to the exploitation of men and children. The lives and liberties of the working class are recklessly sacrificed for profit. Wars are fomented between nations; indiscriminate slaughter is encouraged; the destruc-tion of whole races is sanctioned in order that the capitalist class may extend its commercial dominion abroad and enhance its supremacy at home.

The notorious corruption and inef-ficiency so prevalent in the administration of this and other large cities are the logical fruit of capitalism. The working class has no b terest in common with what are designated "Busi-ness Mea's" fickets or "Good Govern-ment" parties. They should not be de-luded oy premises of clean streats while their wives and children are in hunder and want. • The introduction of a pay and high
