Any one or more persons can star a new club, but it took all the progress sive Socialists of the nation to "start" The Socialist Party. If you get one branch of that organization established in your township or ward you can res assured that there will be no wasteful stepping on each others' heels. Everycan be assigned to a particular one duty in a particular section for detail work. When a large undertakinga house to house distribution of a cam paign circular or a great central agitation meeting is to be advertisedthen every organizer of a township ward sends the necessary dodger to the various precinct organizers and each one will attend to his respective territory. Then, there will be wasteful treading at each other's heels every one will have his or her allotted task and upon the fidelity displayed will depend whether the comrades ad vance the worker to greater responsibilities and duties.

It may be argued by some comrades who reside in the sections where but little or nothing has been done along the line of public meetings that they must first have several Socialist speak ers to sew the seed before they need to think about organizations. There is no greater blunder possible than that of holding an agitation meeting in a section or community which has made no effort at organizing. Here is a sample from the East published in "The Worke:r"-"Comrade Geiger held meetings during the week at 'Waterbury, Bridgeport, etc., etc. Where advertising was don, the meetings were well attended. Several metings were not advertised at all, and the speakers had to call up casual passersby." Here it should be said that the existence of a local or branch does not Recessarily mean that a community is organized, nor even approaching organization, in the full meaning of the word. Die first requisite for a healthy-growing branch is a business meeting 52 times each year, once every week. If you haven't time for a weekly meeting, then you show less interest for the life-giving cause of socialism than is manifested by the upholders of the modern mock ery of religions. That weekly meeting should be held in some place which can be had rent free until your branch has too many active organizers to rowded into the available room or kitchen of some house or shop. Some have the erroneous idea that a welllighted hall is best, even at \$1 or so per night, in order that a "good impression" may be made upon a possible Socialism is not here to make a "good impression" except in so far as results from its truth; truths of Socialism are demonstrated at agitation meetings, not at business meetings. The possible convert has no busine at the pure and simple business meet ing: only workers are wanted there workers who have reports of duties performed since last meetings, and who obtain at the business meeting an out line of the next wek's work. Such a branch can take up any offer from speakers on one week's notice, and guarantee good auguences. It can ad vertise its meetings through its own news communicating channels-from the ward organizer down to the pre cincts, and on down to the possible city division-a city block or ganization.

National Platform of the Socialist Party.

Adopted at Indianapolis, July 31, 1901.

The Socialitz Party, in National convention assembled, reaffirms its adher-ence to the principles of International Socialism, and declares its aim to be the organization of the working class, and those in sympathy with it, into a politi-cal party, with the object of conquering the powers of government and using them for the purpose of transforming the present system of private ownership of the means of production and distribution into collective ownership by the en-tire people.

tire people. Formerly the tools of production wer simple and owned by the individual worker. Today the machine, which is an improved and more developed tool worker. Today the machine, which is an improved and more developed tool of production, is owned by the capitalists and not by the workers. This owner ship enables the capitalists to control the product and keep the workers depen of product

ent upon them. Private ownership of the means of production and distribution is re-sponsible for the ever increasing uncertaintly of livelihoost and poverty and misery of the working class, and it divides society in two hostile classes—the capitalists and wage-workers. The once powerful middle class is rapidly disap-riating in the mill of competition. The struggle is now between the capitalist class and the working class. The possession of the means of livelihood gives to the capitalists the control of the government the press, thepulpitand schools, and enables them to reduce the workingmen to a state of intellectual, physical and social inferiority, political subservience and virtual slavery. The economic interests of the capitalist class dominate our entire social sys-tem. the lives of the working class are recklessly sarificed for profit, wars are formed between nations, indiscriminate slaughter is encouraged and the de-struction of whole races is sanctioned in order that the capitalists may ex-tend their commercial dominion abroad and enhance their supremacy at home.

tend their commercial dominion abroad and enhance their supremacy at home. But the same economic causes which developed capitalism are leading to Socialism, which will abolish both the capitalist class and the class of wage-Socialism, which will abolish both the capitalist class and the class of wage workers. And the active force in bringing about this new and higher order of coclety is the working class. All other classes, despite their apparent or actual conflicts, are alike interested in the upholding of the system of private owner-ship of the instruments of wealth production. The Democratic Republican, the bourgeois Public Ownership parties, and all other parties which do not stand for the complete overthrow of the capitalist system of production, are alike po-litical representatives of the capitalist class.

The workers can most effectively act as a class in their strongle against the collective powers of capitalism by constituting themselves into a political party, distinct from and opposed to all parties formed by the propertied classes. While we declare that the development of economic conditions tends to the overthrow of the capitalist system we recognize that the time and manner of the transition to Socialism also denoted upon the state of development of the transition to Socialism also depend inon the stars, of development reached by the protecting. We therefore, consider it the atmost importance for the Socialist Party to support all active efforts of the working class to bet-ter its condition and to elect Socialists to political offices, in order to facilitate the attainment of this end.

As such means we advocate: 1. The public overship of all means of transportation and communication and all other public utilities as well as of all industries controlled by monoptrusts, and combines. No part of the revenue of such industries to be applied to the reduction of taxes on property of the capitalist class, but to be ap-plied wholly to the increase of wages and shottening of the hours of labor of the employees, to the improvement of the service and diminishing the rates to the consumers

2. The progressive reduction of the hours of labor and the increase of wages in order to decrease the share of the capitalist and increase the share of the worker in the product of labor.

3. State or national insurance of working people in case of accidents, lack of employment, sickness and want in old age; the funds for this purpose to be purpose to be furnished by the government and to be administered under the onrtcol of the working class. The inauguration of a system of public industries, public credit to be

but in establishment of the Co-operative Commonwealth, we warn the work-ing-class against the so-called public ownership movements as an attempt of the capitalist class to secone governmental control of public utilities for the purpose of obtaining greater security in the exploitation of other industries and not for the amelioration of the conditions of the working class.
