A problem now exists, where do these gamblers get things to eat and wear now? They don't make anything: they must take from those who do. But that couldn't be, the working men would kick if they did. Wroking men have too much sense to create wealth for others to enjoy. The problem still remains, however, where do they get anything to eat and wear?

THE OLD STORY IS BEING REPEATED IN NEW ORLEANS. A love'/ sight this is to comprehend, a mayor, owing his election to the votes of the work-ing class, calling out the militia to shoot down those who placed him where he is. There are two things which the workers can do under the circumstances, first, elect another capitalist politician and get the same dose at the next strike, or elect a mayor from their own ranks on their own ticket, whom they can control, and who will call the militia in the favor of the strikers, if the militia is to be called at all.

THE GLOBE-DEMOCRAT STATED IN A RECENT EDITORIAL ON the coal strike. "the people are tired of a system so fragile as that it is par-alyzed by a single strike." The Editor of the Globe said more than he thought he said in that statement. What is the system to which he refers? Nothing but the system of private ownership of the mines and their operation for pri-vate profit, and indeed the people are tired of that system, and are fast grow-ing to be tired of it, not only in the coal fields, but in all other fields of in-dustry as well. The workers especially are learning that the system of pri-vate ownership and private profit makes them the slaves of the private owner and compels them to surrender the greater part of the wealth created by them in the shape of private profit. The workers in the coal fields can mine no coal save at the will of those who own the mines, the shoe worker, the clothing worker and all other work-ers can't do nothing without the consent of those who own the machinery with which they work."

This power to control the labor of the workers gives the mine and ma-chine owners power to control the product of that labor, and they use that power to compel the workers to receive barely enough to live upon, while they take the balance and live in luxury. As the Globe says, a single strike shatters the whole system, because it deprives it of its slaves and stops pro-duction. The remedy lies in changing the system, in changing it from private ownership to public ownership, and those who are tired of such a system will some day do it.

A New Life Standard. The Republic in a recent issue de-clares: "The final destruction of bood-ling must come' from a new standard of public life in America." Bosh, a new public standard has been preached over and over thousands of times, yet boodling still continues and shows no signs of abating. The St. ouis bood

signs of abating. The St. ouls bood-ling is only a chapter in a book of booding as big as the whole of the Uni-ted States. Every large city in the country has had its boodlers, and its boodle trials, but it has all died away as soon as the excitement passed over. A few scape goats are made to bear the burden and the really guilty parties escape as they will escape in St. Louis. Boodling can be cured, however, and by a very simple remedy. In the first place, we must understand that to remedy any evil which exists we must strike at the cause of the evil. The same thing is true of the boodling; we must know the cause of boodling. What is it then? First of all, let it be remembered that boodling is not engaged in for pastime or pleasure, but because something is to be gained by it, some private interest is to be advanced. Under our capitalist system of industry, each individual or collection of individuals is engaged in business for private gain and each seeks to further its interests by whatever method presents itself. If in the furtherance of that private interest it becomes necessary to corrupt and bribe public officials.

it it rrupt such will be done, and it will be a legitimate means of gain, as legitimate as any other means. As long as this private interest can be subserved in this manner, boodling will continue and all the new life ta'k will fail flat, it is impossible to have a new life as long as the system of private interests con-tinues, and for the same reason it is impossible to stop boodling as long as private interests continue. When private ends can not be served by corrupting legislatures, legislatures will cease to be corrupted. This will be possi-ble when public interests supplant private interests. When Socialism has supplanted capitalism.
