### To the Working Class:

Brothers-You have before you in this campaign the same always confronted you and when you cast your vote on next Tuesday you will register your approval on one side of that issue or the other, and in thus deter-mining the officers of government you will determine either in favor of your employers' interests or your own. For upon that alignment rests the issue before you.

On one side of this question you will find all the influences and forces which live off the labor of others, on the other you will find the forces which are seeking to end such a condition; on one side you will find the capitalist, on the other the worker. And in this division there is no middle ground and your vote will be for either one class or the other.
