Men prayed to Heinze, and men swore by Heinze. But Heinze has been gathered to the trusts. The idol is shattered. The forces of evolution have been working. Another forttress of individualism has fallen. All through the copper war the socialists have pointed out the law of economic determinism, that Heinze and the Amalgamated would be forced to join hands to protect themselves; that the trust would swallow the individual; and the end of the war has justified the socialits position. To the socialists the future is bright with promises. The economic conditions will force the voters to rally round the socialist party that they may protect themselves from the greater mining trust. For the American idea of greatness is conspicuity and Mr. Rockefeler is easily our most conspicuous citizen Conspicuous also for the most tremendously impressive reason-the figured total of his millions. It will not do to propose Mr. Roosevelt as his rival, for the latter owes his quite inferior sort of greatness to his official place and a kind of active self-assertion which Mr. Rockefeller would regard as beneath is dignity. Mr. Rockefeller's distinction is a purer, more detached quality-I was going to say holier, and if I had, any pious person would agree with me; for even the ministers, though they wrangle so much over our Greatest Man, end always by taking his money.

But the unique and fearful distinction of John D. Rockefeller is yet to be told: he represents and embodies to the vast majority of the American people the most concrete idea of God which they are capable of conceiving I say this without blasphemy. The American people are willing to admit in a general way that God owns all the money. But they know that Rockefeler has the bulk of it.

If Mr. Rockefeller lives long enough he wil be the same silent, all-powerful person, ruling the imagination of millions of Americans "on the make" and magnetizing at will the higher realms of finance when Mr. Roosevelt and his strenuosities will have finally simmered down into obscurity. For Mr. Roosevelt is only important while he holds the country's ear, but the country's eye is always fixed on Rockefeller.

Such is the sympathetic force of money in this country, caused by the universal preoccupation with this one subject, that it is quite possible to become rich by merely talking about it or holding the correct mental attitude toward it. This explains the persistent and peculiar enterprise of the publishers and suggests a deep psychological reason for the printing of all the stuff we see about millionaires and their doings.
