Over a Hundred Victims. Over a hundred altogether have been at the hospital. At one time pallets had to be put on the floor in order to to take care of the victims of this damnable profit grinding. One bitter night one of the tents blew over. The hospital force is worked to exhaustion. And the devotion and sacrifice of those who have thrown themselves into the emergency as nurses is worthy of the highest commendation. Some of the trained nurses are working or half their usual pay.
