The open prostitution of law and all authorized legal procedure in the circumstances attending the arrest of Vincent St. John, and the turning of him over to the Colorado authorities, is sufficient to warn the workingmen of the land of what it means to have their government institutions in capitalist hands. These vultures for the greed of profits, and control of the money-making powers of society will stop at nothing to force the toilers to their will. The methods employed in St. John's case are wholly unprecedented. Justice Stovall convened court for the specific purpose of dismissing the Idaho charge against him in the Steunenberg case, without even giving notice to his attorney. It is cut and dried that St. John is to be taken back to Telluride to be hanged for crimes that he never committed. These pillars of the social fabric met recently, filled with frothy indignation, against the "incendiary," "sedatious," and "anarchistic" resolutions of various revolutionary trades unions, determined to "offset" the bad effect of those dangerous documents by several mild allusions to the red-handed character of the murder of Steunenberg by the Western Federation of Miners officials. What effect their rabid prejudgement as to the guilt of the accused would have had in mollifying public sentiment will nevbe known as the resolutions are kept only for the ears of Helena's "inner circle." One member of the "inner circle." however, would not swallow this kind of business, and had to suffer the anguish of having it jammed down his throat by sundry incensed members of the "law and order" men. provide comfortable places for the convalescents until they are ready for work. Their contract in taking the hospital fee demands that they should do it. It is a form of brutal or'minality imaginable only under the most degraded barbarism to first practically nurder the men to provide cheap living, take from their meager wages under promise to protect them, then turn them out to die or starve, or use up their own scanty savings because

blew over. The hospital force is worked to exhaustion. And the devotion and sacrifice of those who have thrown themselves into the emergency as nurses is worthy of the highest commendation. Some of the trained nurses are working for half their usual pay. Several have offered their services for nothing. One of these young women has contracted the disease and at this writing is a patient herself and at the danger point.

#### Inadequate Provision.

Careful investigation has shown that so far as the hospital force is concerned the patients are getting all the care that is possible under the circumstances. Only four have died, and the usual percentage in cases of typhoid is much greater. The one exception, and it is a serious one, is that the men are made to leave the hospital too soon. They are turned out in a number of instances four or five days after they are up. From two to three weeks is the usual time that is allowed before typhoid patients are safe from care, able to take care of their own eating, and ready for work. These men have been turned out when they were so weak that they fell against the railing as they went down the steps.

#### Fell To the Floor.

One man, who was obliged to call a carriage, fell on the floor, and remained there helpless during the drive to the hotel. Some of the men are so weak that their ankles will scarcely sustain their weight. Their large pathetic eyes, their pallid faces, and feeble frames, fill one with indignation at the hideous crime that would take the money from these men for hospital service, and then turn them out at a time when there
