Be Prepared on the Primary Law

The last assembly passed a bill, known as Senate Bill No. 79, which provided for a law regulating election primaries, to be adopted by the people of the state of Montana, by petition and special elections.

The law is a most cunningly prepared document calculated to deprive the working class of any liberty in making nominations for candidates, or sending delegates to conventions.

It is a deep laid plot to enthrone the corporations under the semblance of an extension of popular government.

The Amalgamated company has pushed the law from first to last. It is in counties where the corporations are the strongest that the politicians have most vigorously circulated the petitions. Workingmen, vote it down.

It was hatched by a legislature that has never been anything but the agent of corporate power; vote it down.

It is a rich man's law; It will cost a candidate from \$75 to \$300 to get his name before the people.

The same frauds can be committed at the primary election under the primary law that can be committed at the polling booth: Vote it down.

It will cost counties like Cascade \$6,000 extra to hold the elections; Vote it down.



The great battle between the government and the Beef Trust magnates ended, Chicago, March 22, in the fifteen law breakers, although their guilt was evident, being freed by Judge Humphrey of the supreme court. The legal loophole in this instance was the excuse that the law breakers had been compelled to give evidence against their will by Commissioner Garfield, which evidence could not be used against them; working people are sweated and convicted on the evidence thus gained; but then, no one supposes trust magnates to be subject to laws designed for the working people. Aside from this latter question, the magnates were acquitted in spite of Garfield's testimony absolutely annulled their

One of the latest cases of resistence to the law which almost ended in the death of an officer is the case of Henry M. Tilford, Standard Oil multimillionaire thug of New York city. WOMAN AND ECONOMICS.

Mrs. Hazlett's Lecture before the Workers' Educational Club, Sunday Evening, Jan. 7.

The subject of Charlotte Perkins Gilman's famous book has been taken as the title for this address. It will be necessary to an understanding of the treatment to define the term the science of political economy, and may state in a general way that Economics is the science that deals with the production and distribution of the wealth of the world.

Obtaining Necessaries.

We will take it as referring to the means of obtaining the necessaries of life.

The modern and scientific interpre tation of history is based on the causes that lie in the conditions of obtaining the necessaries of life. The scholars, and teachers of history in the most advanced institutions of learning to-day first seek the surrounding physical conditions before they attempt to account for the event.

Thus we come to the purely scientific method of the interpretation of phenomena, the examination of the data as facts first, and then the process of arriving at the conclusion.

It may seem at first that the "interesting sex," as Bernard Shaw has been kind enough to call us, would have nothing in common with such dry matas science, and history, and

women were the early inventors of guarantee work and the state of the household arts, weaving, pottery, dressing skins, building houses, agriculture, use of fire, and cooked food. Private property was unknown in times of the common welfare.

How did the human race make the change to the present condition? It came from necessity-the attempt of every living organism to preserve itself;-The cause of the persistence of the type is that those that were successful in adapting themselves to the environment lived and were enabled to perpetuate their kind. Other types perished.

Enslaved Women.

Tribes increased and pressed on the means of life. Wars were the result. The chief victor was given the spoils, the conquered were made slaves-and women were enslaved as wives. These times were written of in the Homeric legends. This capturing of women gave own-

ership as did the capturing of property. The owners were the strongest, hence they established a government to protect their interests, and maintained it by military power. They seeluded women, not one but many, and set up the family based on private property. We have examples of this social

Limited Sphere.

Woman is thus confined to a limited sphere and forced to busy herself with trifling details.

But above all she must secure the conomic support of man-and this has been her chief aim through the awful ages of her enslavement. She had only the alternative of being man's drudge or his toy. She was placed in perpetual competition with her sisters for the favor of man, the cause of nature was reversed with awful effect upon the character of woman and her children.

So when you see women accused of illy and childish things you will know the reason why they have developed these characteristics. They have been hampered mentally and physically.
