Refuse All Propositions

Citizens' Alliance of Billings Spurns this dty. Efforts Made by Yellowstone Trades & Labor Assembly

In order that all persons might have | means to solicit their membership. an opportunity to express their unbiased opinions on the labor situation at Billings, open meetings have been held at the Union Hall every Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and Wednesday evenings at 8 o'clock for the past six weeks, and they have been fairly well attended by both union men and fair minded business men, and unbiased persons of all classes and professions. And as a result therefrom a committee of nine persons with Frank Rademacker, as chairman of the committee, was appointed; all fair honest busines men, having nothing but the best interest and welfare of Billings in view, and the betterment of conditions both socially and in a business way, and knowing that no family can long prosper where contention, animosity and quarrel exist, and Billings is but a large family. These men appointed to see if the difficulty could not be adjusted, and wanting a proposition from some one as a basis to act on, the following proposition was prepared by the unions:

1. Full recognition of the union.

No discrimination to be made against any union men for having taken active part in the present difficulty .

3. That we will work with non-union men, provided they are not expelled mem, bers from any union, and that contractors alow union men to use all honorable

4. That eight (8) hours shall const tute a working day, between the hours of 8 and 12 o'clock s. m. and 1 to 5 o'colck p. m., and all overtime, if there be any, to comence after 5 o'clock p. m. and to be paid for at the rate of one and one-half time of amount as per previuos hour worked.

5. That, in the event of a dispute between employer and employee an arbitration committee must be appointed, each party intrusted to choose one, the two to choose some disinterested party persecution. to act with them, they to settle the dispute, and in the event they cannot agree, they to appoint two disinterested parties to act as the committee, the two to appoint a third party who shall decide the difference and their decision to be final.

6. We in turn agree that should these articles be accepted, we agree not to discriminate against any firm, business or contractor having taken active part against us.

STREET SPEAKING.

And How to Sell Socialist Literature

By Arthur Morrow Lewis.

I have been buttonholed by so many of our comrades-speakers and com rades intending to become speakers-to give an account of the methods by which the Lewises 'accomplish their literature sales, that I cheerfully comply with the editor's request and answer through these columns all who are interested in

It is impossible, I think, to separate the general question of street speaking from the specific one of selling literature. The qualifications that make for success in the former are absolutely essential in the latter. I will therefore take the liberty of dealing briefly with the question of street speaking by way of introduction to the main question of this article, and the comrades who know all about this part of it will please bear with me for the benefit of those who don't.

The first requisite for street speaking is a good voice. One meets quite a few speakers whose qualifications are almost entirely limited to a good voice. These omrades find it easy to attract a crowd and begin to rest on their oars long bereally efficient propaganda, Speakers who have made this fatal blunder usual ly hold their audiences fairly well at a street meeting and many in the crowd Jos. Mlekush are immensely pleased to hear a public peaker give full endorsement to their wn obsolete and exploded ideas. The street speaker who allows himself to remain in this rut ends by becoming a chronic demagogue and the movement eventually passes him by and leaves him in an oblivion for which he has only his own laziness to thank. Thus it often Livingston happens that an average voice is a blessing in disguise, as it spurs its owner to develop ability in other directions to balance that handicap.

(2) Granted a good average voice which is sure to improve with use, especially when one learns to speak from the chest and lungs instead of the throat or palate, next comes a good manner or style, though I think manner is the better word. How many a speaker splendidly equipped in every other respect is almost a complete failure because of an impossible manner of delivery. Speakers who are deliberate and rational and natural in a conversation, the moment they find their feet on a platform all organizations as are in existence for that rationality seems to forsake them and they behave like a piece of wound-up mechanism, sometimes resembling a of the I.
