Diet " gen's consistent monism furnishes an explanation of such terms as religion, conscience, infinity, and conception of the world, for which the bourgeoisie vainly sought a clear and scientific understand-

Whoever wishes to get a clear understanding of the world and its phenomena must first grasp the relation of the human individual to nature. To this end we should have a clear conception of the force of understading and thought, the human mind. An analysis of this force shows that we cannot think without any material furnished either in the past or present by sense-conception. This fact may be tested by anyone who will see whether he or she can formulate any thought which did not arise out of the contact of the mind with some material

perception. Our thought becomes clearer and more scientific the more consciously it takes its departure from experienced facts, and much more confused the less we stick to experience and yield to imagination.
