"The city jail," declared Dr. Titus, "is a place of dentention and not of punishment. The man incarcerated there goes in with the presumption of innocence upon him and not the verdict of guilty. Such men as are sent there for punishment are minor offenders. They have transgressed only the ordinances protecting the peace and quiet of the community, and yet I say to you, as fellow physicians, that a sentence to that awful place is often a sentence to death. "I am informed upon authority

that the county jail has accommodations for 100 or more prisoners than are at present housed there. Chief Wappenstein declares that if the city jail is closed he can keep the prisones in greater comfort and in better eye on. If this is so, gentlemen, what is to prevent you condemning that plague-stricken hole as a nuisance! No one wil object to such action. The police themselves favor it; it is killing many of them. Wherever you go you will hear the people demand it. It would be humane and a popular act.

"We do not ask anything impractical at your hands. We do not ask you to turn these prisoners loose upon the streets, although God knows it were better to do that than keep them where they are."
