"We see," he is reported to have said, "the tide of a great movement, and claim that when industries reach which, whether we like it or not, is the trust form they are ripe for sogoing to be the master current of the life of the people of England in the twentieth century.

"There is an abundance of luxury, but there is an appalling abundance of poverty. The nineteenth century forgot that it isn't enough to produce wealth lavishly. It is important how it is distributed. The reaction was bound to come. Some of us welcome it. The nineteenth century was a periol of individualism and competition; the twentieth century will take its place as the era of socialism and cooperation."

The bishop's speech naturally draws attention as to how the great national movement now in course of organization against the serious menace of socialism has aroused the various socialist bodies in London to abnormal activity and to show their hands in no mistakable manner by the most striking step that has been taken by the Social Democratic Federation in the shape of a list of immediate reforms.

No more striking illustration of the complete upheaval of society contemplated by the socalists could be found than is contained in this amazing programme. York Herald: A striking speech on preaching a class war and urge it to socialism which has created something of a stir, was delivered by the bishop ing themselves masters of their own of Stepney, Dr. Lang, at the church congress the other day.

"We see," he is reported to have said, "the tide of a great movement, and claim that when industries reach which, whether we like it or not, is the trust form they are ripe for sogoing to be the master current of the life of the people of England in the twentieth century.

"There is an abundance of luxury, but there is an appalling abundance of poverty. The nineteenth century forgot that it isn't enough to produce wealth lavishly. It is important how it is distributed. The reaction was bound to come. Some of us welcome it. The nineteenth century was a periol of individualism and competition; the twentieth century will take its place as the era of socialism and cooperation."

The bishop's speech naturally draws attention as to how the great national movement now in course of organization against the serious menace of socialism has aroused the various socialist bodies in London to abnormal activity and to show their hands in no mistakable manner by the most striking step that has been taken by the Social Democratic Federation in the shape of a list of immediate reforms.
