Some were taken from the 1890 census [the latest in his possesion] and some of 1903, which prodea. ved beyond a doubt that the country owed \$40,000,000,000 these are not his own figures, but that of the Goverments, from whose reports the figures were compiled. He stated that the capitalist system is insolvent and that in the course of time it would collapse of its own weight and corruption, and that there were only \$2,772,956,455, in money all told on June 30, 1907, as per the report of the Secretary of the Treasury, and of this sum, \$224,000,000 were on that date locked up in the vault of the U. S. Treasury, leaving only about \$2,500,000,000, to pay this enormous debt with, and that he believed that the system could never recover with this burden upon society. While the census bureau in 1903, estimated the property value at \$107, 104, 192, 410, of which \$2,000,000,000, were gold and silver coin, leaving other wealth about \$105,104,192,410. and \$40, 000,000,000, of debts, or about 38 per cent. of the total.

The French Trade Unions

The French "Bureau du Travail" gives some interesting official statistics of the French Trade unions. In 1884 there were 500 unions, with 60,000 members. On Jan. 1, 1903, the members had increased to 3,934 unions, with 613,657 members. But on January 1, 1906, there were no less than 4,857 unions, with 836, 134 members. Of course, this compares unfaborably with the numbers in Germany, the United States and Great Britain. The calculation has been made that only about one seventh of the total working population of France belong to trade unions.
