New York Police Follow Example of Other Capitalist Cossacks at Mass Meeting

HUNTER ISSUES STATEMENT

Needless Atrocities Arouse Indignation

With all the brutality that has characterized the present capitalist campaign of suppression of free speech, the police force of New York City lie authorities to this widespread broke up a peaceable assemblage of 10,000 or more of unemployed men and women Saturday afternoon at Union Square, where they had gathered to discuss the miserable straits in which they found themselves. This meeting had been previously arranged and advertised by the Sicialist party of New York City.

Permission had been applied for by the organization to the police commissioner, and a permit had been refused. Thereupon notice was given that the unemployed would gather at that place and that the noted sociologist and socialist, Robert Hunter, would be one of the principal speakers.

Regular committees had been elected whose duties would consist in preserving quiet and good order, and the arrangements were made to conform to the requirements of a gathering of the size anticipated.

The capitalist rulers of the city and the nation, drunk with greed and power, were not slow to use the method best known to themselves to turn this occasion of helpless, starving wage slaves making known their sufferings and their needs, into one of such carnage and disorder as would serve their own reactionary purposes.

It is not and it may never be, known why Silverstein, the youth, attempted to throw the bomb which prematurely exploded and killed one man, injuring himself and some of the police. This much is known, however, that the socialists had nothing to do with it, and that if the Cossack methods of Russia had not been employed by the system in their efforts to acquaint third, they may be repealed. the world with their condition.

"It is the opinion of well informed persons that at least 200,000 are now unemployed in New York City. Most of them have been without work for three months at least. This means that many of them are facing starvation. Various attempts have been made to call the attention of the pubmisery.

"The socialists feel the most effective way of attracting public attention to the subject was to have a mass meeting. This has been done and is being done in most cities of Europe. There seemed no good reason why it should not be done in New York City. It was my intention and that of my friends to discuss the problem of unemployment, to state the facts as we know them and to pass resolutions urging the city and state authorities to provide work.

As was to be expected, the capitalist forces of reaction, notably the prostitute press, from one end of the country to the other, seized upon the reported riot to attempt to further confuse their readers by shouting "anarchy" and holding the socialists as well day ? to blame for everything their feigned alarm could read into the occurrence.

The following extracts from the Associated Press reports tend to show how absolutely unwarranted were the actions of the police:

"Mr. Hunter said until he arrived at the square he was ignorant of the fact that speech-making had been forbidden. He learned this of the police and then determined to speak in order that the right of peaceful assemblage and free speech might be tested in the courts. He added that he had no chance to be heard, for the police 'charged the crowd with incredible brutality."

"Mr. Hunter described his own es cape from under a horse's hoofs; told how he was dragged by officers from the steps of a building from which he had hoped to speak, and how what was intended as a peaceful assembly in furtherance of aid for the unemployed was broken up with a scene that he thought 'could not be duplicated outside of Russia.'

"This proved to be a busy Sunday for the police and the socialists who were responsible for yesterday's demonstrations. There was no act of violence or disturbance of any sort, but the police were busy looking up the record of the bomb-thrower and others under arrest, while the socialists also received similar letters. were as active in repudiating sympathy with the outrage or knowledge of the perpetrator.
