## Machinists' Treasury Attacked by Courts

labor unions Tuesday when Supreme Court Justice Mills, at White Plains, ruled that the District Council No. 15 New York, of the International Association of Machinists must pay \$3,847 to the Jones Speedmoter Company to reimburse the latter for the expense of guards for strikebreakers and special detectives caused by a strike of the former.

The suit was brought by Joseph W. Jones as president of the Jones Speedomoter Company, which has a large factory at New Rochelle and another in New York. It was directed against George M. Maher, as president of District Lodge No. 15 of the International Association of Machinists.
