"Upon reaching the scaffold he was pinioned to the floor. First, his right hand, with which the stab had been given, was burnt in brimstone. He was then pinched all over his body with red hot pincers, and boiling oil, melted wax and rosin were poured into all the wounds. After this the executioner fastened around the criminal's arms, legs and thighs ropes with which the horses were to tear these limbs from his body. He was finally literally torn to pieces, upon which the trunk and dismembered quarters were thrown on a large blazing pile of wood and his body entirely consumed.

And during the whole horrible seene which would have crased any but the refined and bloodthirsty savages of the ruling class to add insolent mackery to the ghastly spectacle, a holy priest rolled his

bleared eyes skyward and muttered his idiotic benediction.

We have here a fine illustration of the refining graces of ruling class ethics and ideals.

Thank God, the lower class never has and never will perpetrate auch monatrons crimes upon its cultured and merciless oppossors and termentors.

Quito the most thrilling wonderful experience of my trip to Great Britain was a visit to Dublin on the invitation of the Strike Committee. I arrived on the scene at the most dramatic moment of the great struggle, when the Strike Committee carried back the message from the British Trades Unions that they repudiated the general strike, but would sustain the Dublin workers financially. That visit to Dublin will always be a vivid memory of a great life tragedy staged by a master hand.

No written words can ever carry to another mind the haunting beauty of Ireland and that strange blending of brains and stupidity. beauty and sordiness, doltish acceptance of wrongs and passionate revolt that only the religious fanticism between Orangemen and Catholies could have made

possible. Ireland in perhaps the most poverty stricken land on earth, her alums are hellish, her housing con ditions notoriously frightful, her working class exploited and tyran nized over to the last degree and yet the physical and mental degeneration that is produced by abject poverty the world over is lacking I saw tens of thousands of the poorest of the poor massed in solid bodies at strike meetings and I have never seen finer physical specimens, more handsome men or crowds that grasped the point of a speech so quickly and could turn such shrewd wit upon the speaker, who was not master of the situation

The last great aprising of the Irish people previous to the Dublin strike was from 1880 to 1882. During this time Parnell was waging his bitter fight in the British House of Parliament for Home Rule for Ireland, That Parnell served his people honestly and loyally and was blackened in character, betrayed and mur-Britain no one today doubts. We know now that he was only one of the thousands of men who have paid with their lives the forfeit for serving the common people. While Parnell was active in Par liament vainly trying to' secure legislative measures for the betterment of the Irish people, the Fen ian groups had consolidated into what was known as Irish Republi can Brotherhood under the leader ship of James Carey, a Dublin bricklayer. The Irish Republican Brotherhood was decidedly "di reet action"; in its methods, and the members were "sabetagers" of the most pronounced type.

Wherever espitalism comes comes also the labor agitator and the trades union. 

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

He no doubt lived through the horror of the arrest of his father and his associates, the tragedy of the confession and the subsequent execution of the five Fenians and the frightful experience of seeing his father shot. The sorrow, the shame and horror of it all would explain the tragic, morbid sadness that always shadows Larkin's face. It would explain also Larkin's insane hatred of England, of law, of policemen, of prisons and soldiers, for Larkin becomes a maniac when he speaks of these. This story would also explain Larkin's fanatically passionate devotion to the Irish working class, and the religious fervor with which he throws himself into his work and makes of it a penance for his father's sins.

But whether the story be true or not the Larkins appeared on the scene just at the time when Ireland was emerging from thirty years of the inertia of despair and making ready for another outbreak. The old Fenianism was dead, the newer Shin-fane movement existed only among the students and younger members of the upper class, and upon the shoulders of the working class fell the burden of a new revolutionary movement. The trades unions were compelled to fight the battles of Ireland and of labor and Jim Larkin became their prophet. But Larkin was not a trades union agitator, he was an evangelist, a John the Baptist, crying in the wilderness; he was not an organizer, he was a religious fanatic and his religion was the freedom of Ireland and the emancipation of the working class. Larkin in not a same or sensible man, but is quite as foolish and impracticable as was Jesus of Nazareth. Like all religious fanaties Larkin is an intelerant biget, suffering from an aggravated case of exaggerated egoism He has no common sense of every day efficiency and he flatly refuses to be guided or helped by any one who has these humdrum qualities. But he is a marvelous evangelist, a man who can arouse masses of human beings to their very depths, but he can never organize the sentiment he arouses and he is too egotistical to allow others to do it without interference Men follow him with blind adoration and he with his head in the clouds leads them into a ditch

Never to me again perhaps, will there come so great a moment as when the crowd recognized in my speech the voice of brotherhood from across the sea and accepted me as one of the clan. Never again will I be so deeply moved as when two hundred Irish policemen stood with lifted helme's to make a path through the seething mass of people through which two stalwart Irishmen carried me on their shoulders to the jaunting car in which I rode to my hotel while the thousands marched beside as a guard of honor such as perhaps no woman ever had before and which I will never know again.

The Dublin strike was one in which romance and tragedy, pathos and passion were blended and it shook the mouldy, musty British Empire to its core. Larkin not only raged about Ireland like a flaming torch but had the audacity to invade England and wave his torch under the very nose of respectable, mossbacked John Bull himself and John did not enjoy having his nose scorched in the least. He let out a howl like a mastiff puppy that had investigated the business end of a hornet. The powers-that-be in Great Britain arose in indignation to crush the strike and called into action the forces that have always silenced the protest of the oppressedthe church, the policeman and the soldier. But it was like trying to crush a prairie fire with a pocket handkerchief.

A miracle had happened in Ireland, when the priest invaded the street and with dire curses ordered Paddy back to his job and its slavery. Paddy stopped fighting just long enough to spit on his hands and tell the priest to get back to his church, if he needed him he knew where to find him and then waged the fight hotter than before. 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

Under her orders were the food ships unloaded, food depots established, food distribution organized and carried on; under her watchful eyes were the hungry fed, the naked clothed and the sick cared for. You can well realize that it is no small task to feed, clothe and care for two hundred thousand poverty-cursed hunger pinched human beings and do it without uproar and friction, yet the food distribution of the Dublin strike was as quiet and orderly as a prayer meeting.

Jim Connolly.

Jim Connolly's task was to keep the men in line and direct the activities of the strike-to act as commanderin-chief of the labor army. A right doughty little general was Connolly and very efficient, but Larkin's continual interference made it impossible for him to handle the strike with any system or order. If Larkin had only possessed common sense enough to have stayed on the job of evangelizing and let Margaret and Connolly run the strike the end of the story might have been far different. I devoutly prayed every day that Larkin would break his leg or have some other interesting accident happen him that would have put him in the hospital for a month and allow Margaret and Connolly to bring the strike to successful termination. I am absolutely sure that if they could have had a free hand in the management of the strike without doing anything to shake the confidence of the strikers in Larkin, the victory would have been with the workers to a far greater degree.

However the strike ran its spectacular course for several months and was finally settled with some slight advantages to the workers from a material standpoint. The gain in dollars and cents for the workers was not worth the outlay of life and energy, but the mental and moral gain cannot be estimated.

Lessons of the Strike.

The Dublin strike taught the workers of Great Britain many valuable lessons; first, that evangelists are very useful as evangelists, but we must keep them evangelizing while organizers run our strikes; second, syndicalism and direct action are all right to talk about, but that an organized, disciplined, trained working class are necessary to fight the battles of the working class: third, that the man who is not educated to vote right is rarely educated to strike right and that political education and political organization must keep pace with industrial development

The trades union leaders of Great Britain learned that they can only lead in the direction the rank and file want to go. The rank and file of the British trades unionists had a most illuminating example of the difference between a seapher oration on the beauties of direct action and syndical-

Naturally the most valuable thing accomplished by the Dublin strike was the victory of class solidarity over national prejudices, and the freeing of the working-class from priest dom-

When the English, Scotch and Welsh workers from their scanty wages support the Irish working class for months in a strike it means that the last vestige of national prejudice has been swept aside and that never again can creed or national lines divide the workers; and when the workers of Ireland tell the priests to go back to their churches and let the workers run their strikes, it means the death knell to the domination of the church in the interests of the master class.

The most valuable lesson learned by the Irishmen themselves was that the tyranny of England is only the tyranny of the owning class; that the oppressor that they must fight in the years to come was not England but capitalism, be the capitalist class English, Irish or what not. The Irish workingman found that Mr. Murphy. good Irishman and Catholic that he is, used the scarlet coated soldiers to shoot down Irish workingmen as quickly as England would. They found also that an Irishman killed by an Irish policeman at the behest of an Irish employer was just as dead as if he had been killed by an English soldier under orders from an English king. This was a bitter lesson for Irishmen to learn, but it will have a splendid effect. From this time on much of the heroism, patriotism and splendid energy that has been expended in the various movements to free Ireland from England, will be thrown into the Socialist movement to free the workers of the world from the hell of capitalism. Irish nationalism has been merged into worldwide Socialism and that means much to the workers of the world in every nation; for Irish brains and Irish brawn have fought the battles of every nation, now they will fight their own battles, the battles of workers of the world.

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
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

Only the Census Taker of the Silent Shades knows how many hearts once pregnant with celestial fire" have gone down to the tomb chilled and broken by the Penury that "repressed their noble rage." The voices of song and story that have been choked, the artists' hands that have been withered, the warmth and genius of philosphers and sages that have been frozen because a useless and soulless master-class condemned them to poverty, are among the saddest of all sad things in this world of ours. Only now and then, struggling, like the wild-flower, under the bruises of the deathdealing rock of competitive war, does a great soul live to express itself. When such an one does succeed, it is in spite of the rock, and not because of it. If Barnhill, instead of associating with bourbons but one generation removed from chattel slave-herders. had been fortunate enough to have become acquainted with any of the world's scholars or artists, he would be mortally ashamed of himself for having insulted any of the men and women of this class by asserting that they had attained their greatness or goodness, their wisdom or art, by the workings of a social system that robs and degrades honest toil. Barnhill, by his own capitalist logic, would swear that Jesus Christ became what he was through the beneficent operation of the competitive system.

Competition as it Really Is

Bear in mind—do not lose it for a moment—exactly what the competitive system is, when handed out raw: It is the buying as cheaply as you possibly can, and selling for all you can possibly get; and this applies to human labor as much as it does to food and clothing. Genius needs no such infamy as this in order to grow. Followers of science and the drama, of music and art, do not poison their minds with trampling down each other in mad warfare. There is a fraternity among these that greedy grafters know nothing about. The true student of science and the drama, of music and art, gladly turns to those of his kind above him for instruction and help. Neither do those following honest and useful avocations in life go crazy about gouging each other in a competitive fight. It is generally natural, in rural districts, for farmers to help each other. Trades unions are formed among useful workers, not for the purpose of competing with and swindling each other, but for mutual and brotherly protection in wages and treatment. It is only the wolves of fang and claw that thrive by competition, and their loss to the world would be the workers' gain.


"I declare that in the Socialist Party there are men whose ability and energy qualify them to compete with any man living and you know, Mr. Editor, that such men as Debs, Charlie Russell, and others too numerous to mention could meet the proudest magnate the world ever saw and SKIN HIM."

This is COMPETITION sure enough—this art of "skinning" somebody, this game of getting something for nothing. But the point raised—impudent as it is is not the question. Perhaps Debs, or Russell, or even Jesus Christ were he living, could skin victims to the bone if they wished to prostitute themselves low enough to do so. However, it is hard to even imagine such as these in the class of Rockefeller or Captain Kidd. Their minds do not run to pocket-picking for a living. They turn to Socialism and Human Brotherhood. They wouldn't even practice child-slavery. If that were their character they would be in the Republican or Democratic party, and not going around with a red card in their pockets. Barnhill's silly twaddle about

Socialism requiring him to ask the government what kind of a hat he should wear is pitiable. I should judge from his remarks that a number 6 hat, boy's size, would become him. His allusion to the question raised in California as to whether party members-Socialists should be required to support the State paper is something else that has nothing to do with Socialist economics. In my own opinion every Socialist who is able, should support his state paper without any persuasion. But the Socialists are not forcing any such question in any state in the Union. They doubtless never will. Barnhill asks me to take a St. Louis city directory and look over the thousands of private enterprises and then tell him if the Socialists propose to take over all these. Not by a jugfull, Mr. Barnhill. Great numbers of these competitive institutions would unquestionably be put out of business under Socialism for lack of support, and still Socialism would not prevent

anybody from running any little one-horse store he wanted to. It isn't particularly the grocery stores and meat shops that are robbing the workers—it is the fellows that own the industries that create the foodstuffs that do the real skinning. Experience would soon demonstrate to what extent every existing industry should be owned and operated collectively. Great co-operative and economically run bakeries, canned goods factories, packing houses, etc., with publicly owned markets for distribution, would, I imagine, play havoc with many a small merchant, and would furnish him better employment at far better pay than the trusts now allow him in the way of "private profits."

What Socialism Promises

Socialism does not propose a bureaucracy—Socialism proposes a pure democracy in all things political and economic. Nor does Socialism promise any immediate perfection or paradise on earth. But it does promise these things:

That the great modern machines of production and distribution shall be taken from the hands of private grafters and turned over to the government of productive workers—whether national, state or municipal—and shall be made servants of the people instead of masters, blessings instead of curses.

That every child shall be assured a splendid education, taught a useful avocation, clothed, fed and cared for, in public institutions of learning.

That the opportunity to labor, with pay commensurate with the amount of wealth produced, shall be guaranteed to all.

That bloody wars of plunder and exploitation shall cease, and that Poverty, with its retinue of Crime and Vice, Disease and Ignorance, shall be the only enemies we fight.

That the old, the feeble and the sick shall be cared for.

That mothers, while rearing their children, shall be amply provided for.

That the aged shall be pensioned.

These and more Socialism can and shall do.

A Path That Is Blazed

There is a path that leads out of the dark and dismal wilderness of a master-and-slave-ruled society -it leads on and on to Wisdom, Peace and Fraternity. This path Socialism has gone ahead and blazed, so that "a wayfaring man, though a fool, shall not err therein." Here are the world's best living men and women; here are the beckoning spirits of the great and good who have gone before. Dear Comrade:—I am writing this letter to correct a statement in the March issue of your publication and to take a whack at a statement made by no less a light than Comrade Eugene V. Debs.

Under title "The Vital Question of Today." Debs says "The U. M. W. and the W. F. of M., the two most militant unions and the two nearest industrial and revolutionary in the federation."

The sentence should have read, two OF THE nearest, etc., as it is it leads to the conclusion that these two organizations are the only ones in the A. F. of Hell that are "nearest industrial," etc.

Now as a matter of fact these two organizations are not the "nearest industrial" unions in the A. F. of L.; the Carriage, Wagon and Automobile Workers have the most perfect form of industrial unionism inside or out of the A. F. of L. that is in this country to-day.

Furthermore we have been affiliated with the A. F. of L. for twenty-four years (no I am not bragging about it) and during that time have caused as much turmoil in the ranks of the craft unionists (according to our size and strength) as any other industrial organization.

At every convention of the A. F. of L. in the past fifteen years attempts have been made to disorganize us via the jurisdictional route, but not until the last convention have any of these attempts got beyond the committee on adjustment.

At the last convention by a fusion of fourteen different craft unions, resolution No. 125 was passed, the dictum of which is that in one year we shall turn over to these same fourteen organizations all of our members.

Of course we will do it, to be sure, after twenty-four years of fighting tooth and toenail to maintain an industrial organization, after twenty-four years of fighting the bosses and the A. F. of L. to hold our organization together, sooner than embarrass Gompers with the other members of the Civic Federation we will do just as he says and disorganize. OH, YES.

I, personally, want to hear it said wherever and whenever industrial unionism is a topic that the Carriage, Wagon and Automobile Workers is in the fight, and ask you to inform your readers that we also are one of the "most industrial" unions in the A. F. of L.

As to our being "militant and revolutionary" all I have to say is that the majority of our members carry a red card with their union card, even to our international president.





MISSOURI SOCIALISTS NG

The following worthy and farreaching proposition is being submitted to the voters of Missouri for sufficient signatures to be sent to the State Legislature, to be voted upon by the qualified voters of the state:

AN ACT

To amend the Bill of Rights, Article 2, Section 4, of the Constitution of the State of Missouri.

Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Missouri:

The bill of Rights, Article, 2, Section 4, of the Constitution of the State of Missouri is hereby amended by adding after the word "liberty" in the third line the words: "The opportunity to employ.". their own labor in producing wealth," and by further adding after the word "design" in the sixth line the words: "In protecting the rights of the people to employ their own labor, the state shall establish, own and conduct such farms, factories, workshops, public works or any other industries or means of employment whatsoever that may be necessary to give work to every person applying therefor, and shall distribute, sell or supply the product or service of such industries to the people. The legislative power shall enact such legislation as may be necessary to carry this provision into full force and effect, subject to the right of the people to adopt such legislation by direct action under the initiative," so that when amended said section shall read as follows:

Section 4. That all constitutional government is intended to promote the general welfare of the people; that all persons have a natural right to life, the opportunity to employ their own labor in producing wealth, and the enjoyment of the gains of their own industry; that to give security to these things is the principal office of government; and that when government does not confer this security it fails of its chief design. In protecting the rights of the people to employ their own labor, the state shall establish, own and conduct such farms, factories, workshops, public works or any other industries or means of employment whatsoever that may be necessary to give work to every person applying therefor, and shall distribute, sell or supply the product or service of such in-

dustries of the people. The legislative power shall enact such legislation as may be necessary to carry this provision into full force and effect, subject to the right of the people to adopt such legislation by direct action under the initiative.

In his annual report before the Missouri Socialist State Convention, held at St. Louis, March 1, 2 and 3 last, State Secretary Otto Vierling, among other things, said:

The Right to Work amendment goes much deeper than merely putting some one to work, for it proposes that "the opportunity to employ their own labor," like the present granted right of the "enjoyment of the gains of their own idustry," shall also become fundamental law, with the addition that the state, through its legislative power, shall be authorized "to establish, own and conduct such farms, factories, workshops, public works, or any other industry or means of employment whatsoever that may be necessary to give work to every person applying therefor.'

Our Pennsylvania State Committee, I am advised, is considering the adoption of it. Our California comrades are about to conduct a referendum to adopt a Right to Work bill. The great California Labor Moving Picture, in four parts, I am informed by the manager, has featured the Right to Work bill in the picture called "From Dusk to Dawn."

As we all know, these things have all happened before and are signs of the dissolution of the capitalist system. We also know that we may expect little or no help from the stricken ones, for the needy and hungry cannot be expected to patiently strive for a peaceful and orderly solution. The success of this movement depends upon the intelligent and at present unaffected workers who have the cause of humanity. at heart. The movement is in line with-and can be developed to a greater degree than ary of our immediate demands, because it is more immediately needed than any of our other immediate demands, and that it can and would be developed in line with Socialist principles.



Incidentally I may say for the benefit of Mr. Hamilton and his ilk that I never sat at a Civic Federation banquet, served by non-union waiters, eating nonunion bread, and smoking scabmade cigars.

Now, since this question has been raised in regard to my alleged refusal to put the union label on the Locomotive Firemen's Magazine, I may as well put upon record the facts in connection with that matter.

The Locomotive Firemen's Magazine was the very first of all the railway brotherhood publications to put on the union label, and it was I who put it there, and it was kept there ever afterward. Not a non-union printer was in the employ of the firm that printed the magazine and did all other printing for the brotherhood during my connection with it.

When I became grand secretary and treasurer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and editor of its magazine and the headquarters were located at Terre Haute, my home, the local typographical union there was in a state of collapse, and practically non-existent. It was I who put it on its feet by unionizing the establishment in which the brotherhood printing was done. That establishment—the Moore - Langen Printing Company—is still in existence, and its manager is still at Terre Haute, so that the facts here presented, may be verified beyond question.

Not only was the typographical union at Terre Haute reorganized. as here stated, but from my own pocket I paid its bills, its treasury being bankrupt, paid its hall rent, secured employment for its members, had them reinstated when discharged, stood by them in having their wage scale increased, and helped them in every other way in my power. During this same period I helped to organize or reorganize most of the trade and labor unions in and about Terre Haute, led many of their strikes. and my office was the headquarters of them all.

Philip K. Reinbold, president of the Central Labor Union, 659 Chestnut street, Terre Houte, Ind., is personally familiar with the essential facts here presented, having been located there almost thirty years. Grant Hamilton will not only be flatly contradicted by the president of the Central Labor Union where I live, but if he made the false statement he is reported to have made he will be proved by the union men themselvs to be a deliberate falsifier and slanderer

TOWARDS INDUSTRIAL TREND UNIONISM.

No organization on earth is so reactionary as to be able to escape the onward march of Industrial Evolution. The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the Order of Railway Conductors have always been considered the very epitome of hidebound conservatism yet at the meeting of the General Committee of the Order of Railway Conductors held in Chicago during the month of March the following resolution was passed without a dissenting vote:

"WHEREAS: The working conditions in general for the men in both train and engine service on the Rock Island system are becoming more and more unsatisfactory. With the greatest efforts possible we are not able to move forward towards better pay and working conditions; in fact, the company is constantly encroaching upon the terms of our contracts in such a manner as to constitute a reduction in pay while prevailing conditions of track and equipment together with the increasing size of power mean a hardship for every man in the serv-

"The cause is sometimes attributed to the over capitalization of the company's stocks, but the practice of crafts attempting single handed to deal with its members is no doubt as much a factor as the financial errors and one over which we have more control.

THEREFORE, Be it resolved that it is the sense of the General Committee of the Order of Railway Conductors of the Rock Island lines that the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen be invited to join hands with the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors on the Rock Island system and perfect a system of federation."

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

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


