LEADING American newspapers are sending their most sapient reporters to Great Britain to cover the crisis in that country. J. H. Thomas and their Socialist-Imperialist followers derided the Labor Party and formed a National Coalition government to save the Empire. Bah!

THE BIGGEST NEWS in the world today is not the current Chinese flood or the current husband of Gloria Swanson but the crisis that throws a klieg light on the decline of the British Empire, its passing as the dominant world power and the new constellation of forces that are bound to be set in motion thru the impact of this crisis on the British working class and on world capitalism.

BEFORE the last gun belched forth its message of destruction and death on the battlefield of France in 1918 a wise Frenchman prophesied that Britain would win that war but would never win another. He predicted that the end of the war would find John Bull sitting on top of the world but with a time bomb under his throne. It has come to pass, though it will yet be some time before the lighted match is set to the fuse. Empires rise slowly in times of peace. But they are usually ushered into the naivete of history to the music of cannon and the tramp of marching men.

THIRTEEN YEARS after Germany was forced to sign the most ignominious treaty that even the envoys of a once puissant power were compelled to lay pen to find England the world's outstanding medicant. With hats in hand the official panders of the British ruling class were compelled to wait in the ante-chambers of the New York and Paris money lenders until it suited the pleasure of those glorified bankers to give them an audience. And the British hooked the bread and butter of their working class before they got the loan. Over hundred million dollars in mean sum and surely one cannot blame such patriotic institutions as Wall Street and the Bank of France for insisting that the necessary steps must be taken to insure payment of the interest and principal in due time. And the time is darned short.

ENGLAND is faced with a budget deficit of \$850,000,000. Andy Mellon might not have much trouble in conjuring that sum out of his socks. But Chancellor Snowden does not find it easy. So he and MacDonald, the traitor Socialist, broke with their party and the trade unions and decided that some of it must come out of the starvation rations of the unemployed. MacDonald and his crew have now hooked and landed up with the Tories and what is left of the liberals to form a temporary government with the object of bringing the country out of the crisis. A Sisyphean task indeed!

WHAT really rules in England now is the Tory party with MacDonald and Snowden and a few other laborites to pull the wool over the eyes of the working class. They are the puppets of the erstwhile champions of labor who show themselves in their true colors as the most loyal imperialists of the lot. What the Communists are now telling the workers for years can now be seen by the least observant. There is nothing novel in this situation. The working class movement reached up Briand and Millerand in France and Ebert and Scheidegger in Germany. Others of the same stripe all over Europe. We have our Greens and Wolls in the United States.

PLAN THOSE SOCIALIST pinch-hitters for capitalism save the British Empire? I think not. It is doubtful if they believe that. Comparatively few Englishmen know any more about Socialism than John Calvin did, but they do know that Robert Balfour—an exponent of Socialism one empire—exposed the emperor in the innards of the system thirty years ago. Even capitalist journalists are writing to-day about the dangerous conditions of capitalism in Europe. It is ironic that those who have the greater part of their wealth, even in the role of decoy ducks, should in the system's dotage throw in their lot with the labor order and earn for themselves a niche in the rogues' gallery of history.

COMPARED to England we are in a happy condition. Oh, yes! Of course we have 40 per cent of the monetary gold supply of the world in our vaults. (Continued on page two)

Mellon's Flunky Would Save His Face

BELIZE, CAPITAL OF HONDURAS, IS DESTROYED BY STORM: 1300 ARE KILLED AND HUNDREDS INJURED

Hurricane and Tidal Wave Strike City During Holiday Festivities—Pestilence Already Raging—American Warships on Scene with Medical Supplies, Food and Clothing—Ships Piled High on Beach—Bodies Being Cremated on Huge Funeral Pyres to Stay Plague.

Belize, British Honduras, Sept. 12.—More than 1,300 of the 16,000 inhabitants of Belize perished in the hurricane which struck here Thursday during the height of the celebration of the 133rd anniversary of its independence from Spain it was reported today after a survey.

Unable to keep up with the rising death toll the government applied the torch tonight to burn areas where the destruction and death took the highest toll. The funeral pyres were lighted to ward off the menace of disease, made more threatening by the broiling sun which beat down upon the ruined city.

Fire lanes were cut around the grimly burning area to protect the rest of the city. Belize depends upon a catchment system for its water supply and with all roofs blown off the government was preparing to prevent a water famine. A spring of fresh water was discovered in the middle of a street in the center of town and it was hoped that this would afford some relief.

Eighteen of the students at the Jesuit college have been buried and the government has decided not to seek any more bodies at the college but to burn the debris. The captain of a motor vessel which weathered the hurricane and which was off the shore near the college when it collapsed said the building was heaved high in the air above its concrete pillars and dropped to the ground like a pack of cards.

The city today presented a pitiful sight. Ships of hundreds of tons burden have been washed up on the land by the tidal wave and a 200-ton dredge rests on what was the roof of the customs landing shed.

St. George's island, a holiday resort about nine miles east of Belize was ruined completely and at least 24 of its 50 inhabitants are dead. Among those rescued were Dr. (Continued on last page)

TREASURY ISSUE IS OVER SUBSCRIBED

Washington.—Over subscription by \$140,599,540 of the treasury \$800,000,000 three per cent 20 to 40 year bond issue has been announced by Secretary Mellon.

The response to the bond issue was unexpectedly low, and while treasury officials would comment it was pointed out the interest on the bond was 1/2 per cent less than had been anticipated by financial interests of the country.

HUNDREDS MADE HOMELESS BY FOREST FIRE IN N. W. MINNESOTA

Duluth, Sept. 15.—Three persons were known dead about a dozen were injured and one man was reported missing as a result of the fires which started Friday night and continued to smolder today.

The third death was reported near Wayland in the Bandette region where the body of Paul Dixon, 50, a farmer, was found in a ditch near burned timber. He apparently had suffocated.

The other victims were Marvin Myrold, 29, and Alfred Bogan, 60, both of whom died in the Grygia region.

Six persons injured in the fires near Grygia are in the Thief River Falls hospital. Three may not recover.

Olaf Larson a homesteader living 20 miles south of Beaudette, was missing after his cabin had burned. The fires were reported under control today although a strong wind would again make them menacing, forest rangers said.

About 90 families have lost their homes in the fires. All the homeless are being cared for in the various communities and many said they were planning to return to their properties to rebuild homes out of logs or whatever other material is available.

In the Beaudette region a crew of men was put to work burying dead animals which threatened to become a menace to health after being burned in the fires.

Golf Ball Wrecks Eye of School Teacher at Froid

Froid, Sept. 13.—Struck by a golf ball yesterday afternoon on the local course, Miss Florence Fuller, primary teacher, may lose the sight of her left eye. Miss Fuller was taken to Williston immediately after the accident for medical attention.

How seriously she was injured was not determined before she left Froid. Dr. Darland examined the injured optic but said that it was impossible to tell the seriousness of the accident as the eye was so swollen and discolored that a thorough examination was impossible until it assumed its natural shape.

Miss Fuller started her third year as a teacher here last week with the opening of the fall term.

Walsh and Wheeler Boost For Bridge at Culbertson

Culbertson, Sept. 15.—Senators Walsh and Wheeler have wired T. H. MacDonald of the bureau of public roads urging action on the Culbertson bridge project. The telegram was sent following a meeting with northeastern Montana delegates at Culbertson Monday.

The message to MacDonald read: "Hope you can act promptly and favorably on pending application looking to construction of bridge over Missouri at Culbertson. Shall confer with you on this matter in person later in the week."

FATAL ACCIDENT AT RICHLAND

Last Friday while Joe Tour, the section foreman at Richland and John Broten, one of the section workers, were riding along on a speeder at a fairly good rate of speed Broten lost his balance, fell in front of the speeder, was run over and instantly killed, the jolt throwing the speeder off the track. When the foreman, Joe Tour recovered consciousness he found himself lying along the track all bruised and sore. He took one look at the dead man and hurried back to town for help.

Shortly after the accident happened a railroad detective arrived here for the purpose of protecting the railroad company. In this case, hired for the purpose of preventing John Broten's dependents from collecting damages and insurance.

In order to save a little money for the railroad company this detective is doing his best to put the blame of murder upon the section foreman. The detective and the railroad company would be willing to hang an innocent man in order to save a few dollars for themselves.

Last Monday Joe Tour was brought to the local hospital by Howard Gaffney, where Dr. Hall took an x-ray and found two ribs broken.

Denver, Sept. 15.—Salary reductions of 10% affecting 470 employees of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Co., receiving less than \$4,000 a year, will be effective Oct. 15, officials of the company announced.

Montana Apple Crop Good

Helena, Sept. 15.—September finds Montana's apple production will make a favorable comparison with that of 1930, the present crop being placed at 385,000 bushels, as against 410,000 bushels last year and the five-year average of 344,000 bushels.

Sugar beets promise to again establish a new high record with 599,000 tons compared with the 1930 crop of 572,000 and the five year average of 333,000 tons.

BIG TEXAS BANK CALLS IT A DAY

FIRST NATIONAL OF EL PASO WITH DEPOSITS OF OVER \$9,000,000 CLOSING DOORS—ONE SMALLER INSTITUTION FOLLOWS.

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 4th.—Two banks in El Paso and vicinity closed their doors today. They were the First National of El Paso and its correspondent bank the First National of Las Cruces, N. M.

A statement as of June 30 listed deposits of the First National of El Paso at \$9,262,429.40 and resources at \$11,306,593. A similar statement for the Las Cruces bank showed deposits of \$799,888.91 and resources at \$898,973.47.

The bank was one of the largest and oldest in the city. Recently it celebrated its 50th anniversary.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—A loss of more than \$200,000 in cash and \$20,000 in foreign bonds was reported today by prosecutors investigating the sudden closing of the First Italian State Bank, whose president disappeared Tuesday night on the eve of its failure.

WRIGLEY PLAN SAID TO BE SUCCESSFUL

Chicago.—Unlike the federal farm board which has announced that it will buy no more cotton and wheat to relieve a falling market, the experiment of the William Wrigley company in purchasing those commodities in Canada and the south with part of the receipts from gun sales in those regions has proved so satisfactory that it will be continued until December 1, as planned an dprobably thereafter.

William Wrigley, Jr., said the indirect business benefits counterbalanced temporary book losses in the purchased commodities, and that eventually there might not only be a real loss but even a small profit from wheat and cotton.

Only recently the Cudahy Packing company started a similar campaign in the south, while the International Harvester company has a plan for accepting farm products in exchange for agricultural machinery.

On Monday morning the two senators called at the Producers News and assured us that they would be glad to present to the national government any demands the people of Sheridan county would make. We told them our demands would not be few; one of them would be for the farm board to ship part of the surplus wheat out here and distribute it among the farmers for feed and seed, either free of charge or on the condition that the farmers pay it back bushel for bushel out of the next crop.

From here the two statesmen went to Culbertson where Senator Schmitzer spread a little sunshine over the meeting by telling them that our depressed and starving farmers and unemployed workers would all be satisfied and relieved and our troubles in this part of the state would be over with if we could only get a bridge across the Missouri river.

"CHI" HOSPITALS CROWDED WITH PEOPLE DISEASED BY HUNGER

FROM CHICAGO, one of the leading industrial centers in the United States, we get some official data on what hunger and starvation is doing to the health of the people who work for a living. Recently President Hoover said that "the health of the nation is improving." The same idea was echoed by Dr. Stewart Hamilton, superintendent of the Harper Hospital in Detroit. He attributed this "health" to the fact that people were "eating less."

Here are what the official figures and declarations show in Chicago, which gives a good cross section of the American people. The Chicago Daily News reported a huge overtaxing of capacity of the hospitals due to hunger. It said: "Emmett Wheelan, president of the board of county commissioners, made a thorough survey of conditions at the county hospital this week and found overloading, due to economic conditions." That is, Mr. Hoover would have people think that "overloading" of the hospitals is due to improved health.

President Makes Goat of Federal Farm Board

To Curry Favor with Farmers, Chief Executive Makes Play of Ignoring Board So Discredited by the Carrying Out of His Wall Street Policies.

Washington, Sept. 10.—(UP)—A widening rift is developing between President Hoover and the Federal Farm Board. So noticeable is the feeling that Mr. Hoover is acting independently of the board in an effort to find some solution of the surplus wheat and cotton problems. From the welter of conflicting remedies there developed today, under the president's scrutiny, a program of expanding markets and credits to absorb the depressing surpluses.

This new program was being shaped by Chairman Meyer of the federal reserve board. While still tentative, it contemplates banking help to enable cotton growers to get through the period of low prices by selling cotton on long term credits in the export field.

Senators, representatives, brokers, bankers and government officials have visited the White House in the last three days to aid the president's study of the situation. But not one farm board member has been summoned or put in an appearance voluntarily.

Difference became accentuated recently when the board declined to issue a statement promising it would withhold its wheat pool from this year's market. Prominent republican leaders, including Vice President Curtis, brought their appeals to the White House when the board turned them down. The board is understood to have refused at first to accede to executive pressure. Finally a statement was issued by the board indicating the wheat would be withheld.

The president has been concentrating on the cotton situation since his return from Camp Rapi-dan Tuesday morning. Meanwhile, the farm board, thru Chairman James C. Stone, is indicating still further success in its long search for new wheat and cotton outlets. Stone said several new deals were pending, some of (Continued on last page.)

The wedding party including relatives and friends of the principals flew to Yuma before daybreak. The takeoff for the return to Los Angeles came immediately after the ceremony.

BUSINESS FIRMS IN HELENA WILL RAISE \$50,000 FOR RELIEF IN CITY

Helena, Sept. 12.—Following a discussion between 50 and 75 Helena business men at a meeting at the Placer grill yesterday afternoon the group voted unanimously to pledge \$50,000 as the fund to be raised by Helena and Lewis & Clark county for relief. Of this amount \$20,000 will be used to take care of the needy in the county and \$30,000 to be administered by the Red Cross and the Montana Association, Inc., in the drought hit area of the state.

The fund will be raised under present plans by contributions of 2% of the monthly salary of those employed gainfully in the city or 2% of the monthly income of individuals, together with subscriptions.

The pledge is for a period of six months, dating from Oct. 1 and collectable the first of the following month. The teachers of Helena are already on record to pay 2% of their monthly salary into the fund and R. E. Towle, member of the city school board who reported the action of the teachers, also said that Senator Walsh had pledged \$50 a month to the Red Cross.

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BORAH SAYS HOLDERS OF WEALTH MUST HELP CARE FOR DESTITUTE

CITES COUZENS' GIFT OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS AS EXAMPLE TO FOLLOW—CLARES FAILURE TO PROVIDE WILL FORCE ESTABLISHMENT OF DOLE.

Cottonwood, Idaho, Sept. 10.—Senator Wm. E. Borah declared in an address here that the rich of the country must feed the unemployed during the coming winter, and warned that "if they do not do it voluntarily, they will nevertheless do it."

The address was delivered at the dedication of an amount to 17 volunteers in the Nez Perce Indian war, who on July 5, 1877 fought a desperate battle against 150 reds and turned the tide of the war in favor of the whites.

"As we approach winter, the task of taking care of these men and women and their dependents is uppermost in our minds," he said, referring to an estimated five or six million unemployed in this country and 20 million in the world.

Plenty of Money
"How is it to be done? There is plenty of food in the country, food going to waste. There is plenty of money in the country, hoarded and idle. When the secretary of the treasury offered certificates for sale to the amount of some \$800,000,000, they were over subscribed many times.

The bankers have extended a credit of some \$400,000,000 to England in her distress. Last year the gold mines of the world turned out \$400,000,000 in gold. And the United States imported \$400,000,000. We got it all, or at least, got the full amount.

"There is plenty of money, and those who have it must feed the hungry and clothe the naked. If they do not do it voluntarily, they will nevertheless do it. There is considerable discussion in the country relative to establishing a dole. If the public dole system is established in this country, it will be forced by those who, having the means, refuse to do their part in feeding the hungry."

He cited a donation of one million dollars by Sen. Couzens as an example of what may be done to alleviate the suffering.

"The men and women who want work and who are unable to find work are not going to be permitted to starve, children are not going to be permitted to go hungry and physically undermined and crippled for life.

"If the wealth of the country does not voluntarily contribute to the end that we may take care of them, there is only one thing to do, and that is to feed those people from the treasury of the United States and increase the income tax, particularly in the higher brackets, to enable us to do it."

"I take the position that men who have acquired fabulous fortunes do not hold these fortunes free of all obligations to humanity and to the welfare of the country. They hold them in the last analysis in trust for the benefit of our common country. And in great exigencies, in great calamities, when men and women, through no fault of their own, are forced to distress in some measure through laws and policies which too often have favored the few at the expense of the many, they dare not be indifferent to the public interest."

Quotes Sentiment
He quoted a statement attributed to a famous American statesman: "Though the people should support the government, the government should not support the people," and replied to it by asking, "who got the people into this situation?"

Furnishing his own answer he said: "It was governments, not the people, that fomented and brought about the present situation."

GERMANY BUYS 7,500,000 BUSHEL OF WHEAT FROM FARM BOARD

Forty-nine and One-half Cents a Bushel Will Be Paid for Lot—Notes Bearing 4 1/2% Interest Come Due in December 1934—Holdings of Farm Board are Reduced 47,500,000 Bushels—U. S. Shipping Gets Preference.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The farm board yesterday completed its third grain deal with foreign countries since July 1 by selling German interests 7,500,000 bushels of wheat.

The sale was to the Deutsche Getreide Handelsgesellschaft, which corresponds to the board's grain stabilization corporation, but the German government guaranteed payment for the grain.

Ambassador von Prittwitz of Germany, Dr. Axel Schindler and other representatives of German agricultural interests worked out the details of the deal today with members of the board.

Headed by the ambassador and Chairman Stone, the members and the Germans marched somewhat solemnly into the board room. The door was shut and agreement reached in little more than the time required to put the signatures on paper.

Current Prices
Current market quotations on Sept. 10 fixed at 49 1/2 cents a bushel, will be paid for the grain, though some variation is allowed for its quality variety and location.

It is to be No. 2 amber durum, No. 1 dark hard winter or No. 1 hard winter wheat of the 1930 crop and notes given for it bearing 4 1/2% interest come due on Dec. 31, 1934.

Delivery will be made at an average rate of 833,333 bushel a month, but the grain may be shipped more rapidly if Germany desires.

Preference is to be given American ships in hauling at least half the wheat. The provision was a reminder of the complaints by U. S. shipping lines after they learned that Brazil was given authority to select carriers for the wheat and coffee involved in the barter with that country.

The announcement today was the first by the board on the German deal, although there had been several reports from Berlin that conclusion of the negotiations was expected soon.

The German sale brought board wheat sold to foreign countries since July 1 to 47,500,000 bushels. This includes 25 million bushels exchanged with the Brazilian government for 1,050,000 bags of coffee and 15 million bushels sold outright to China. There has been no official statement of the exact amount still held by the board although it has been estimated at only a little below 200 million bushels.

In addition to the sales to foreign governments, the board has sold about 50 million bushels to private interests since Jan. 1. It is continuing these sales at the rate of five million bushels monthly.

Chairman Stone said the board has other wheat deals in view but he would not say what they were.

them actually under negotiation. He declined to say whether or not a sale of 7,500,000 bushels of wheat to Germany was near but gave the impression that reticence on this subject was caused by a desire not to endanger any possible proposals.

The so-called "Walla Walla" plan for adding the wheat grower was given prominence today because the board arranged to hear a presentation of this idea during the afternoon. Under this plan, the board would sell its stabilization wheat, now reduced to around 200 million bushels, back to the growers on a contract arrangement binding the growers to reduce acreage.

The plan of Caraway to have the board purchase 8,000,000 bales of cotton and resell it to growers agreeing not to plant cotton next year appeared to be rejected in advance.

In discussing finances, Stone said the board would not have to ask congress for more money at the next session. Opponents of the farm board, made reductions by the carrying out of Hoover's Wall Street policies, and absolutely discredited with the farmers and everybody else except the republican flunkies in the Farmers Union.

Cooperative apparatus at St. Paul, is now making a great out of the farm board by pretending to ignore it and to blame it for its dismal failure in doing anything for the farmer and for the premeditated betrayal of the farmers in the interests of the money lenders, speculators and exploiters who, thru the president, directed the policies of the farm board, and now curries favor with the farmers by pretending to be out of accord with the board and to be trying to do something for the farmers independent of and in spite of the board. This is only a faked political gesture. It means only that the administration realizes that the farm board is a Jonah on the republican ship that it would throw to the fish. The people should not forget that President Hoover can demand the resignation of the members of the farm board any time he desires—so if this board does not suit him he can get another any day he wishes.)

Pearce, an American, and his wife and children. One child suffered a broken leg but none of the others were injured.

Th city was in the midst of the celebration of the 133rd anniversary of its independence from Spain when the hurricane hit the town.

Belize, Sept. 14.—Huge clouds of black, stretch-laden smoke hung over Belize today as cremation was resorted to in disposing of bodies of victims of the tropical hurricane which took an estimated death toll of 1300 lives and caused enormous property damage to this Honduran capital.

Scores of bodies were burned on five vast funeral pyres almost in the center of the devastated city yesterday and today as health authorities attempted to prevent the spread of disease.

The bodies, cremated on open fires, were in addition to more than 800 counted as they were placed in crude graves dug in the city cemetery by prison labor.

Meanwhile squads of volunteer laborers worked ceaselessly under the direction of Honduran soldiers, clearing away the tangled wreckage of homes and business houses that until Thursday made up the capital of British Honduras.

During the cremation bodies of the victims were dumped on the five huge funeral pyres without ceremony as the city fought against disease. The spectacle was ghastly.

From the air Belize appeared as a conglomerate mass of wreckage. An airplane which arrived under Miami today flew over the city and an inspection of the damage and its occupant saw no building left undamaged.

The American consular office reported that 10 Jesuit priests apparently were the only Americans to lose their lives in the storm. That office is making up a list of the American destitute who will be provided with funds by a charitable organization.

Almost every family in the city has been affected in some way by the death toll.

The Wrigley building, headquarters for the chic industry in this section was left standing but it is badly damaged.

JEWELL MINES OF THE QUEEN O' SHEBA ARE FOUND IN ABYSSINIA

London, Sept. 14.—Rubies, diamonds, platinum and gold, such as the Queen of Sheba is supposed to have worn, she visited King Solomon were brought to London today by Frank Payter, big game hunter, from mines he believes were the sources of the Queen of Sheba's wealth.

Payter found the gems and the treasure in a cavern hidden in the unexplored country 320 miles west from Addis Ababa, Abyssinia. He intends to organize a new expedition within a few months to go back and get what he left behind.

"I am sure it is one of the caverns from which the Queen of Sheba drew her great wealth," Payter said.

His story of the discovery was almost as fascinating as the gems themselves, sparking through the natural roughness. An old Arab, Payter said, gave an English mining engineer a map in 1930 which the engineer showed Payter. The two men, he said, worked out the directions and discovered the treasure.

BRITISH AIRMAN MAKES WORLD RECORD OF 386 MILES PER HOUR

Calshot, Eng., Sept. 13.—Flight Lieutenant Stainforth set a new world's record of 386.1 miles an hour in a seaplane over a three kilometer course here today.

Great Britain also won permanent possession of the Schneider cup when Lieut. Bootham flew another seaplane 340.08 miles an hour over a 31 mile course.

While Lieut. Stainforth's speed remained to be checked and verified by the International Aeronautical federation, it officially was announced he had beaten by more than 28 miles an hour the previous world's speed record of 357.7 an hour set by A. H. Orlebar in 1929.

The United States won the cup in 1923 and 1925 and stood a chance of achieving permanent ownership in 1929 but failed to nominate an entry within the prescribed time.

The day was fine and sunny after yesterday's postponement of the flights owing to rainy and blustery weather.

Thousands who gathered along the Solent to witness the speed trials were thrilled when Lieut. Bootham went up in his gleaming silver plane and sped over the first 386.1 miles an hour—the fastest of the seven laps.

During the flight he also broke the world's record for a 100-kilometer flying start on a closed circuit with a speed of 342.9 miles an hour, beating Lieut. Atcherley's record of 331.75.

GANDHI HOLDS CONFERENCE WITH BRITISH; HE MAKES 'EM WAIT TOO

London, Sept. 14.—The federal student committee of the Indian round table conference met today to consider a constitution for India, holding one-fifth of the population of the world.

The meeting convened at 11 a. m. at St. James palace, Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the Indian nationalists, arrived twelve minutes late. He was observing his regular weekly day of silence.

Gandhi was accompanied by Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, popularly known as India's Joan of Arc and the only woman ever chosen president of the nationalist congress, and his secretary, Nahadeo Desai. He rode to the palace in the back seat of a small car.

Gandhi smiled when his car was driven into the Ambassador's court, the usual entrance for the delegations.

He said, before his day of silence began, that if his opinion was needed during today's meeting he would communicate it by note.
