The White Paper Crises.

Probably never in the history of all the nations did a people at peace with the world face such an amazing situation as the people of America are facing at the present time, and this from many angles. The most noticeable of which and by all odds the most important is the question, not only of the cost but of the supply of white print paper.

A noted expert on the subject of the manufacture and sale of print paper in an address delivered before the great clubs of Oklahoma last week and published in the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram said:

"The daily consumption of white paper in the United States is 5,000 tons and the mills have been running for several months with but only 15,000 tons ahead of in other words with a three day reserve for the entire nation.

Many reasons are advanced for this amazing shortage, the like of which has not occurred since Gutenberg invented movable type and the first printing press was set up. And to this mind you are to find when machinery to manufacture paper is a thousand fold greater than 75 years ago.

The paper trust is as afloat as the Standard Oil Trust and Rockefeller has stock in it. The only excuse that they can give to the people for the enormous increase in price is that there is a shortage in wood pulp, in which it is manufactured and chemicals that strengthen the paper, that is prevented from export from Germany by the English blockade.

This is the only excuse the trusts can make because they have men, money and machinery on parallel in abundance. The talk of German chemical is the veriest rot because the white news print, which is used on papers like The Rebel and the daily newspapers can be easily treated by chemicals that use \$90.00 chemical can manufacture in an hour. Now as to the supply of wood pulp, Canada has not declared a blockade on the United States, these capitalists patriots of Canada would as soon sell their wood pulp to the American brothers as their English brothers.

The idea that they cannot get wood pulp from Russia and Norway as it is equally non-sensical and their claim can only be believed when they show that the German fleet has left the Kiel canal and is blockading Russian and Scandinavian ports.

If this pulp was secured from the coast of Germany or along the Rhine it might grin and bear it, and President Wilson might send a note to England, asking that the British fleet allow German vessels with wood pulp to sail for our shores. But inasmuch as Germany does not send as much as a pound of pulp and the seas are open from Norway, Russia and Canada, we are forced to believe one of two things. First that the white paper trust is run by a collection of congenial idiots who do not know how to order raw material or, second, that it is controlled by a band of financial buccaners that takes a thousand and says "Stand and deliver" or we will destroy your enterprises and starve the American public from intellectual food.

In the meantime thousands of small publications are walking the hollow eyed from anxiety because bankruptcy and ruin stare them in the face.

Take The Rebel's position, our contract has been liquidated. Paper was being \$200 for has been raised to \$600 overnight and we are warned that \$7.00 is coming and even then after submitting to the gauge which we had to do or suspend publication, we are bluntly informed that, although we have the money in the bank sufficient to carry over to the next week, we must pay the paper, six-column size, with the order. The radical papers will of course suffer more than they will wealth conservative contemporaries, the Appeal to Reason with its half-million circulation, was compelled last week to raise the price to a dollar a year after holding to the 60c price since Wayland started the Coming Nation in Warburg, Ind., in 1893. The paper they have purchased up to June for 190 per hundred in 10 carload lots, has been driven to \$5.00 and the end is not yet.

The editor of the Wichita Falls Democrat Tribune told the Rebel personally last week, that he was forced to cut his paper in half, double his price and look for no new subscribers and Mr. Halpery, with his back against the wall, is making a desperate fight to keep alive, although he is in a most precarious condition one year ago. His case can be duplicated thousands of times over the nation, where the little country weeklies are falling by the wayside as fast as fallen leaves, in Yallahombra.

The readers of The Rebel know full well that from our first issue we have never begged, complained or whined, although we publish the largest weekly in America at the lowest price that contains no advertising and this for nearly four years. Later we have taken a little advertising to keep going and so is this record established, we are not going to change our price now and ever more subscribers that white paper continues to soar until it is impossible to publish at the present price and live on a meek each day. We may even be compelled to still further reduce the size of The Rebel and set it in smaller type sold, but we will continue to come out. We want no donations, but to carry on the battle for the freedom of land, we are engaged in, we want more and ever more subscribers at the present rate of 50c per year, or in clubs of 4 for 25 cents each, 6 for 125 cents.

We do not wish to have to raise the price but every subscriber taken at this rate will be filled for the full time.

Also, don't you take a pen and act. A sheet of wrapping or any other kind of valuable commodity, go among your friends and take the subscription, they will do what we request, remember that the flag of The Rebel is nailed to the uttermost stand of the outlawed wall.

Amazing Oklahoma Situation.

The Rebel stopped off in Oklahoma for a few days recently and spoke at two meetings in the 5th congressional district, in which G. M. Stoddard is running for congress, with an excellent chance of success. The candidates displayed in the splendid organization which has been built up clearly indicates that the Socialist party will poll an enormous vote next November. Old time veterans like Judge Hurt, Stallard, Representative McLeone and others of similar ilk, who are not carried away by air castles say that they will have 40 representatives in the next legislature. The Republicans will have about the same number, possibly a few more. The Democratic machine shot to pieces as can be seen from the recent vote on the amendments where every one of the nine amendments proposed by the Donks were overwhelming defeated by the people. They will be lucky if they have 50 representatives in the house and the result they will not be able to reorganize the house.

Understanding this it is perfectly plain that if the Republicans and the Socialists go together in the house they can organize it and practically kill the Democrats in the street. This is the situation that will confront the two parties when their representatives meet in Oklahoma City next January.

While every Socialist in Oklahoma would no doubt be delighted to see the Donks beaten in the Legislature because they are so constituted in that state that they can never stand one defeat living as they do, on patronage and pelf, and with no more principle than a tannammy white slave, nevertheless the question is asked and several sides if the Socialists and Republicans organize the house and elect a Socialist as speaker, give the Socialists the committee on appropriations, thus giving them the financial grip of the state and hand the Republicans all the important committees. Would this be fusion?

Before answering this question let us be clearly and concisely on THE MOCKERY OF IT.

Foreign trade of the United States closed its greatest year in history June 30 with a balance of \$218,000,000 in favor of Americans exporters.

The year's exports aggregated \$8,349,000,000, the Department of Commerce announced today, and imports were valued at \$2,189,000,000.

The trade balance was double that of last year and four times that of 1914. For instance the surplus of last year was \$1,500,000,000.

Of course the Gal. Dal. does not say that this surplus of FOUR BILLION dollars, worth of no committees that were swamped by our Big Business exporters for European gold were stolen from our own workers and working farmers of America.

Have every delegate instructed from his local, to that convention, how to act, then coming fresh from the people the convention will instruct and elect a representative to the party, friction will be avoided and everything will be quiet as a—

mid-summer night dream and the membership will make no mistake in what they order. We will start the discussion in The Rebel, people will be glad to read articles of 100 words to The Rebel on this subject. We will print as many of our space will permit.

Letter on Land Tactics.

The editor of The Rebel has sent the following communication to Mr. William A. Black, San Antonio, Secy. of the Single Tax League of Texas.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 2, 1916.
W. A. Black, San Antonio, Tex.
My Dear Mr. Black—

As you probably know, I am making a state-wide tour of the state, in the interest of my candidacy for United States Senator on the Socialist Party ticket. At the immense Socialist conventions that I have been addressing for the past nine weeks I usually have to make three addresses. As you might expect my speech on the Land Question is the one that arouses the greatest interest. My Single Tax position is cheered to the echo at every place that I have gone, running all the way from Texas to Amarillo and from there to Galveston. I find among the people all classes in general and the Socialists in particular an intense desire to study the Land Problem and I am asked many times daily if there is any possibility of having all Land Revolutionized not only in Texas but in the entire South come together to discuss ways and means for complete unity of action. On this visit I have invariably replied that while such complete unity is desirable, that it is still in the womb of time, but that nevertheless from day to day there is a gradual coming together of men and women to aspire to the great ideal of the Freedom of the Land, albeit of the moment they are a part because of slight acquaintance as to the ways and means to reach the goal.

I believe great long steps in this direction of perfect harmony can be made before the sun is set to mind this is how it can be brought about:

Several Socialist locals in Texas are proceeding to initiate referendum vote providing for the holding of a state convention in Waco during the Cotton Picking, and immediately after the November election. I have no doubt in my mind but that this referendum will carry almost unanimously. We will have to take up such matters as the presentation of the Land and Potting that the Socialists are circulating now for the next legislature and arrange for powerful pressure to be brought on this reactionary bill. The referendum dare fail to act upon our request for an amendment to the State Constitution that if adopted would settle the Land Question in Texas. The fact that the Socialists in both State and National, the 75,000 members of the State Federation of Labor, Union men, divisions of the Farmers' Union, The Land League, the Single Tax League of Texas and a host of men who are unaffiliated with any organization, in favor of this proposed amendment to the State Constitution to seriously harm and consider the political grave that is in front of them should they at the behest of landholders, farmers and corporations lawyers refuse to heed the cry of the people for the Freedom of the Land.

Holding this Waco State Convention and of the Social Party in mind I would suggest to you that you use your splendid money talents calling out a state wide meeting of the single taxers in Waco, on the same day, the Socialist Party Convention is held. Of course, in the nature of things the two bodies cannot meet together, but men of one mind and one question, they differ on other questions, can while meeting in different halls, mutually confer on how to reach that victory to the gaining of which we have devoted our lives.

It is also worthy of note that the Land League of Texas will meet in a separate hall from the Socialist party. These two meetings are the same view on Marx and George did as, as the Land Question, will be delighted to confer with the Single Tax League and the Socialist party. The most radical mem-

bers of the Farmer's Union will undoubtedly attend the conference that will occur and members of the American Federation of Labor will also be on hand to listen to reports that will be read and take part in the open discussion that will follow. I would like to see at least two great mass meetings at which men like yourself, Mr. Eastman, Mr. Boudin, Sen. McNeeley, Judge Davis of Dallas and other single taxers, will mingle their voices with Socialists like Oklahoma's Senator, Socialist orator, Judge R. H. Hurt, of Modill, Oklahoma, who has previously promised me to attend and speak if invited, Judge Fletcher Nye of Kansas, Ohio, and other stalwarts from the Middle state may be expected to be on hand. Thus from Louisiana we come Covington Hall of New Orleans, another famous Socialist orator who takes our Single Tax position to the heart and it might indeed be possible that Mr. Dan C. Hoag (Schnitzer), who can be prevailed upon to come and gather in council with the men who have sworn to free Dixie from Landlord domination. Needless to say that there will be a galaxy of talent from our own state, men like Webb, Hurd, Nugent, Meigs and Clark and a host of others who will be on hand for the gathering of the clan.

There is still another matter to be considered, our first wide single tax conference that has been successfully accomplished in Dallas last March, will in my humble judgement lose a lot of valuable people if the date of the next full year, because it is before the meeting of the Legislature that that conference can do its best work in bringing pressure to bear upon that body. Accordingly, we have no doubt that you will see at once the advisability of doing all in your power to join with all your brothers in a great land gathering in Waco in November. I know that you will take this matter up at once, with the officials and the rank and file of the Single Tax League and the Farmers' Union. I can render to you The Rebel or otherwise, you have but to ask for it.

Without fusion or without compromise of our position, let us get together in Waco during the Cotton Picking and lay the plans for the destruction of Landlordism and the liberation of the workers of Dixie from bondage.
