4 WORD TO THE RICH. Victor L. Berger points out how all Men's Interests are bound together and how Oppressors suffer with Oppressed. 

When Louis XI., King of France, had only a few more days to live, he was suddenly seized with inexpressible terror. None of his courtiers dared to pronounce in his presence the fearful yet continually recurring word "death." He himself made a painful effort to assume a forced cheerfulness in his dull glance, as if he could keep death at a distance by not heeding its approach. He concealed the pallor of his face with "rouge," took care not to totter as he walked, and said to his physician: "Just see, I never felt better in my life."

So it is with our capitalistic society. It feels the approach of death, and denies its own weakness. Surrounded by deceitful riches, and all the vain pomp of a vanishing power, it boasts of its strength in the midst of its unrest and anguish. The privileged class of modern civilization is like the Spartan boy who smiled while he kept concealed under his robe a stolen fox which tore his vitals. They also show a smiling face and EXERT THEMSELVES to be happy. But an anxious unrest is in their hearts.

If the suffering poor knock over so softly and shyly at their doors, the capitalist class thinks with dread of that which it does not see. If the needy people ever so timidly withdraw from the scene of their glittering pleasures of the rich, the capitalist class trembles at that which it conjectures or guesses. Even if the people do not stir, the wealthy still thinks with fear of the coming hour.' If no rumor of a great strike is afloat, the millionaires and billion-aires look anxiously for conspirators and "anarchists" skulking in the dark. The demi-gods of Wall Street send hundreds of thousands of dollars yearly to the police chiefs of New York, Chicago, Patterson, etc., who rub their hands for joy over the BAD CONSCIENCES of our capitalists.

Under such circumstances we ask: What sensible and honest man has any reason for upholding such a social system as we have today?

Not one, surely, not one.

I willingly admit that the sufferings caused by an incomplete civilization are felt in different ways by different parts of society,-the sufferings of the poor are different from the sufferings of the rich. But they all suffer.

The far larger part of the people-that part which bears the heaviest burden of physical and mental labor-without exception is sunk today into hopeless perdition... They are doomed to a scanty living from hand to mouth, and to be continually harrassed by suffering, poverty and ignorance. They are poorly fed, poorly clothed, and poorly housed. And what is far worse: They are also condemned to exist under such uncertain conditions that any trivial circumstance may lose them their employment :-- a condition which may turn the best man into a tramp, a good-for-nothing or a vagabond; his wife and daughters into prostitutes: and his sons into thieves and robbers

And strange to say, while our laws safeguard property-protect a pair of shoes, a sack of flour or an old coat-while these laws have consideration for the millionaire, nay, even for the murderer, the honest poor man, the workingman come to want through no fault of his own, or the farmer ruined by bad crops or floods, under the law has no protection!

He must beg from "charity" or STARVE.

If he wishes to enjoy the "protection of the law," he must commit a crime; he must steal, rob or at the least become a drunkard. Then the law grants him protection-in prison-in the "house of correction."

Truly, such a system is hell ! Yet this is not all.

The simple fact of being a poor wage-worker's child, condemns that child to the same fate, unless he is rescued by a "special providence," by a remarkable stroke of luck. But as a rule, the child of the workingman today is foredoomed also to bear the yoke of his parents. However talented this child may be, his parents are in no condition to give him the necessary care, education and culture. Even in childhood he must contribute to the support of the family with his labor. He is sentenced to the same slavery as his parents, his brothers and sisters. He must work with them or with them go hungry. The sufferings of the working people begin even in babyhood-yes, they actually begin in the mother's womb. The cruel Calvinistic dogma of "the predestination of certain persons to damnation" has become for the working class a literal truth.

And now let us look at the life of the rich. It is either full of feverish haste and insatiable greed, or full of disappointment and disgust. The rich man has exhausted life, that is his misery; he has nothing more to desire, that is his want. The loss of the power of enjoyment which follows superfluity is the poverty of the rich, and indeed it is a hopeless poverty! We find many among the rich who regard life as bitter fruit, and some who throw it away like a squeezed orange. Moral perdition, disease of body and soul, are more general among the wealthy than among the proletarians; in spite, or rather on account, of the superabundance of the means of enjoyment which are at the command of the rich. What a serious lesson is given to selfishness and pride in the fact that the great inequality of the two classes in the means of enjoyment finally leads to equality of unhappiness in both!

In our civilized society there can be neither partial progress, nor partial retrogression. The entire people must rise or the entire people must sink. A nation in which one class of people is oppressed is like a man with a diseased leg; the sound leg is hindered by the sick one from performing its function. However paradoxical it may sound, it is nevertheless true, that the oppresser has as much to gain from the abolition of oppression as the oppressed, and that by the maintenance of oppression both lose equally.

The capitalist class established its power on unrestrained competition. But just through this unchecked competition we now see competition itself coming to an end and the middle class going to ruin. Jones has five hundred thousand dollars. Smith has only one hundred thousand. As a consequence of the laws of modern industry, and with the aid of cheaper production, Jones can crush Smith within a certain time. But afterwards a Rockefeller, Morgan or Carnegie can attack Jones with the same weapons and ruin him in like manner. Can Jones be so unreasonable as to complain? He is simply getting a dose of his own medicine. Under our competitive system, a system of daily strife, the small industries have been devoured by those of medium size. But this was only a Pyrrhus victory-a temporary gain-for a still larger industry is bringing these middle-sized industries to a sad state indeed. Moreover, competition has come to an end in the trusts, which are forced to seek their customers at the end of the world, in China and Central Africa, and are able to do so. All these trusts have their mission. They take over and concentrate the business of separate, individual industrial and mercantile companies and produce and sell on a modern gigantic scale. I admit that many of the trusts owe their existence to speculation alone, and not to natural industrial development; these will go down, but the others will maintain their existence, until this economic system itself will come to an end.

Little by little the men are coming to understand at last that these mountais of gold and silver coin, that these papers, "gilt edged" and not gilt edged, which transfer to their owners the power over the means of production and distribution, also decide how dearly we must pay for our bread and meat, our coffee and our coal, how much we must spend for shelter and clothing; in other words, how well or how poorly, how short or how long we are to live.

All this cannot possibly last. Civilized white men cannot and will not endure it. Under present conditions, and in consequence of them, we are breeding a race, especially in the large cities, compared with whom the Vandals of the fourth century were angels. If this continues, in a short time we shall have two nations in this country. One nation will be strong in numbers, but half-civilized, half starved, and degenerated through want and misery. other nation will embrace only a very small number, who will be overfed, overcivilized, and equally degenerate from luxury, gluttony and debauchery. What will be the consequence? One day there will be a volcanic eruption. The millions of the hungry will turn against the thousands of the well-fed and sur-feited. Then might come a terrible catastrophe, the capitalist class would atone fearfully for its sins, and punishment would fall on the guilty and the innocent. AND WE SHOULD NOT GET A BETTER SYSTEM, FOR THE DEGENERATE BARBARIANS WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO GIVE IT TO US.

Nevertheless the girls at work in the mines make light of their sympathizers and seem more than satisfied with their miserable lot. None of them would voluntarily exchange it for the position of a servant girl. Complaints seldom arise a servant girl. This is because, barring their misbehavior, the rich are able to live more nearly normal lives than the workers. There je no abiding anxiety in their faces, their creature wants are abundantly supplied, and they manage to get, in various ways, enough exercise to keep them in fair physical condition. They are able to possess culture and the resulting refinement is mirrored in their countenances. On the other hand, the working class works harder and longer each day than the human race was ever intended to work or that is good for the physical well-being, especially as most of that work is one-sided work and over-exercises some muscles and under-exercises others. The working class lives on poor food, lives amidst conditions that are often unhealthful, and is shut out from social refinements and refining influences. Misshapen with toils, victims of disease, and denied the education and general knowledge that money buys, their economic situa-tion cannot help getting into their faces. And so we can well say that it is capitalism that robs the working class of its right to be comely and physically perfect. In the state of society which will undoubtedly obtain under Socialism, when people will cease to live anxious lives, when they will not live in the knowledge of a great social injustice turning them into unceasing victims, when comrade ship, brotherhood and kindliness of heart will illumine every face, when disease which is superinduced by poverty and financial pinch, will have cisappeared, when there will be social effort at bodily perfection and mental refinement, when books will be accessible to all and all have time for reading, when science and music and art will be engrafted into the daily life, when the necessity for craftiness, greediness and sharp-practice will have departed forever, when the earth will blossom as the garden it should be and the filth, the smoke and grime of city life as we now know it will be gone, when true, wholesome, and radiant family life will be possible to all, women will be accounted the equal of men as members of the human family, when the vices will pine away because of the growing individund self-respect, when the necessity for exploitation of man by man will no longer exist. then, and not till then, will the human race be truly beautiful, and real beauty shine from every face.
