Out of work, with no money and a hard winter staring them in the face, they very foolishly and very wickedly resorted to violence. They broke into a hardware store and stole all the firearms they could find.

All of which is very pleasing, because these Finns are evidently getting just what they wanted—or at any rate, what they might reasonably have expected when they voted as they did.

They please—or what amounts to the same thing to the workmen—when the snail-paced courts say they must. If such injustice provoke the ignorant, or the unthinking to violence, there are soldiers a-plenty to shoot them down.

Free Speech In Kansas. Wichita, Kan. — Rev. Granville Lowther, vice president of the American Socialist College, Wichita, Kan., was arrested Oct. 9th at Great Bend, Kan., for speaking on the street. Dr. Lowther was making a Socialist speech on the street when the marshal came along and ordered him to go to the park and speak. He told the marshal he would do so, and explained to the audience that the street belonged to them and that the marshal was their servant, but that, notwithstanding the fact that he had a right to speak on the street provided the sidewalk was not obstructed, he would comply with the request of the authorities. He then announced he would speak at the court house that night and requested them to come and hear him. We ceased speaking, but, as he turned to walk away, the officer arrested him. He was taken to the police court and fined. The city attorney prosecuted the case, and Dr. Lowther plead in his own defense. He refused, however, to pay his fine and was therefore sent to jail but the comrades insisted on paying his fine and securing his release.

President Roosevelt and the Control of the Trusts.

The Republican party is in a critical situation with reference to monopolies. The very thing that their opponents twenty-five years ago said would happen has happened, whether because of the tariff, as they said, or from the natural and inevitable development of industry, as we know. And now, to prevent the Democrats from getting into power, the Republicans must do something—or, at least, say something—and what to say or do they know not; for if they satisfy the people (supposing they could do so) they will alienate the trust magnates, and if they satisfy the magnates, they will alienate the people—and oh, for a Moses to lead them out of the wilderness!

must adopt unless they adopt Socialism. And when the trust magnates get over their first indignation at the idea of being in any wise interfered with so insignificant a thing as the U. S. government, they will see that Roosevelt's plan is the best for them—it is in fact THEIR ONLY SALVATION. For it must be either government control of the trusts, as Roosevelt suggests, or public ownership as the people are beginning to demand.

But government control means three things which in the long run the people will utterly reject. It means, first, government license of the trust; second, government protection of the trust, and third, government ownership by the trusts.

When Col. Madden instituted his sweeping postal reforms three years ago, the postoffice deficit was one million dollars. This year, by reason of careful management on the part of Madden and his associates, the deficit was nearly five millions. This will be good news to the hoodlums whose pockets have been lined with the deficit.—Coming Nation.

NOTES FROM YANKEE LAND. British Columbian Socialists are naturally elated over their recent victories in the parliamentary elections. Comrade Frank R. Whitney of the Carmen's union is the party candidate for mayor in San Francisco. Comrade Clinton Simonton has about recovered from his illness and will resume work on the Indiana soap box.

Across the Herring Pond. Baydow's new opera "The Sunken Bell," the libretto of which is taken from Gerhart Hauptmann's drama, will soon be given for the first time in St. Petersburg. The heroic Russian officer who, in the Kiev strike, forbade his soldiers to fire upon the strikers, shouting: "Everyone of you who dares to fire upon his hungry brothers is a scoundrel!" was shot. The czar signed his death-sentence.

The political prisoners in Russia complain of more severe treatment. The time for walks is shortened, conversation with relations is forbidden, and they are not allowed to write to the authorities. The Petrikau prison is so crowded that the Socialists are locked up with thieves. Sixteen and twenty persons are placed in cells large enough for only eight. The Jewish Socialists suffer the worst treatment.

The new president and a majority of the executive board of the Montana State Federation of Labor are Socialists. Comrade Debs is getting some very flattering press notices on his southern tour, also packed houses and great interest. It is reported that Mrs. Henry D. Lloyd will take up her husband's municipal ownership crusade where he left off when death overtook him. Comrade Charles H. Matchett, the nominee of the New York Social Democrats for the court of appeals, was the Socialist candidate for president in 1896. Italian Organizer Origo will visit the larger cities of the middle West first in making his tour under national party auspices. He also speaks English. National Secretary Maily urges that isolated Socialists who would like to have Socialist speakers visit their localities write him at the McCague building, Omaha, Neb. John W. Brown, of Connecticut, was arrested and fined \$10 for addressing a street meeting in North Adams, Mass. The charge was "obstructing the thoroughfare." Brown appealed and the case will come before the Superior court. Comrade B. F. Adams, of Washington, D. C., spent six days in the work house for sticking up Socialist signs, which by the way have attracted wide newspaper comment. Adams had a license, but the judge ignored it. An animated discussion of Socialism is being carried on in several of the amateur papers published throughout the United States. The writers for Socialism appear to be well posted and are giving their opponents a bewildering time of it. Election returns from Connecticut show that on Oct. 5 in Groton Township, comprising the towns of Mystic, Norwalk and Groton, 27 straight Socialist votes were cast out of a total of 1126. In the state election last year 1 Socialist vote was cast out of 1320. Comrade Barkowski, the Polish Socialist agitator, is at work in Wis-

consin. Recently while speaking in Pennsylvania a Polish priest in one of the smaller towns urged his parishioners to ask their legislative representative to pass a law forbidding Socialist speeches in the state. Even the parishioners had to laugh. Comrade Max Hayes, editor of the Cleveland Citizen, who went to England as the fraternal delegate from the A. F. of L., is reported to be due back in this country the present week. He made a side trip into France and Belgium and has written a number of newspaper articles about Socialism in those countries for an American newspaper syndicate. At the Nashville, Tenn., municipal election held on Oct. 8, the Socialists polled 400 votes in twenty-one wards, casting votes in every ward. The vote in 1900 was 61. The vote polled is over 10% of the total vote cast. Secretary Stokell writes: "We are well satisfied with the result under all the circumstances, but the Democrats got scared, got out the best speakers they had, city and congressional."

Our comrades at Telluride, Colo., have been having "trouble" with the local authorities for daring to hold street meetings. One of the Socialists arrested was A. H. Floaten, recently elected National Committeeman. Floaten tried his own case from 10 A. M. to 11 P. M. before a jury picked by a prejudiced sheriff. Jury stayed out all night and disagreed 3 to 3. The Socialists polled 20% of the vote in the city election last spring. State Secretary P. J. Cooney of Montana reports: "Since Aug. 15 the following new locals have been organized in Montana: Jardine, Red Lodge, Bridger, Forsythe, Basin, East Helena, Marysville, Sand Coulee, Nelhart and Monarch. In Red Lodge the Independent Labor Party has dissolved and all its former workers are now enthusiastically working for the success of the Socialist movement. The Judith Basin News, of Lewistown, Fergus County, is now an uncompromising Socialist paper."
