The trouble is that the Faribault THE CHURCH, THE PEOPLE, AND THE NEED FOR SOCIALISM

Victor L. Berger Writes of Church History and Shows the Forces that are Against Progress

T is vigorously claimed by the Roman Catholic church that it will be the only reliable bulwark against the tides of Socialism, which according to the best thinkers is going to be the next phase of western civilization. A prominent Catholic cardinal has gone so far as to say, "One after the other, all the states-

men and citizens who believe in the present order of things will be seeking shelter from the approaching storm by gathering under the canopy that surmounts the chair of St. Peter.

That means in other words, that the Roman Catholic church is to be the last refuge of capitalism. As far as the church is concerned, this may be true, but how about the Catholic people

There is Beigium for instance. Beigium has for centuries been Catholic and "popish" to the core. Belgium has a population of more than six millions—of whom only 15,000 are Protestants and 3,000 Jews. All the rest are Roman Catholics. There is a case of confessional solidity. The Roman Catholic church has been the leading factor and force in the history of Belgium. With some few exceptional cases that church has controlled the whole educational system of the country, especially the elementary and public schools.

How has the Social-Democracy fared in Catholic Belgium? Nearly one-third of all the votes cast in the last election were given for the candidates of the Social-Democrats, and we must remember that on the side of the non-Socialistic candidates are found almost all the "plural votes"—the law in Belgium gives the wealthy and educated classes and the priests the right of "plural votes," that is, their votes are counted two or three times. . The working class of Belgium, especially in the cities, is almost entirely Social-Democratic—and outside of the "plural votes" of the capitalists and the priests; the Catholic party depends solely upon the votes of the Belgian peasantry, which belongs to the most ignorant and most fanatic of its kind in Europe. And yet, every Belgian Social-Democrat has been a pupil in a Roman Catholic school, supervised by a Roman Catholic priest. Furthermore, in Belgium more than a million Roman Catholic sermons are delivered each year, so that the country has rightly been called "the land of

And yet, Belgium is rapidly becoming the Eldorade of the Social Revolution. The progress of the Social-Democratic party has been just as remarkable in Italy and Austriaboth of them Catholic countries.

And we Socialists cannot see how this can be otherwise. In opposing Socialism the Roman Catholic church is compelled to turn its back upon the teachings of early Christianity.

The Socialists demand that capital and the instrumental production shall be socialized. Christianity from the very beginning has insisted that private property is not absolute.

later "fathers of the church" claimed that wealth is held in trust for the good of society, and that the application of a portion for the benealt of those in need is a duty of strict justice. St. Thomas of Aquino (Aquinas), the great Roman Catholic theologian, and probably the greatest of the few philosophers that scholasticism has produced, calls this demand of the needy upon society as a whole "debitum legale"— a legal debt. "The right to existence" which is one of the foundations of Socialism, was fully recognized by the

Catholic church in the past.

And this right being once recognized, it belongs to the primary sphere of natural rights. It, therefore, overrides the right to private property, which belongs to a secondary, sphere if the two come conflict. (Aquinas.)

Hence, all during the Middle Ages eminent Catholic writers took the view that extreme necessity makes all things common, and that he, who through no fault of his own, i in danger of perishing by hunger or cold may without sin take from another against that other's will—"a lam invite domine"—what is necessary for the sustenance of life.

Now we Social-Democrats hold the same philosophy.

The Social-Democrats protest against the rampant, egotistical individualism of the age. We protest against the exploitation of man by his fellow man.

We protest against the treatment of laborers as mere chattels, as only so much muscle and physical And even in the 19th century, before the Roman Catholic church got completely into the hands of

the capitalist devil, Catholic writers like Count de Mun denounced "l'exploitation de l'homme par l'homme," powerful French phrase has it; denounced the exploitation of workmen by the capitalist. But we will admit that the Roman Catholic church has now gone back entirely on that position.

Archbishop Messmer, who is himself a learned man, has even found it necessary to import a secondhand, ignorant, anti-Socialist agitator from Cleveland, Father Kress, to tell the people that the limitation of the rights of private property as advocated by the Socialists means "theft" and that the Socialists are "thieves." But if the Socialists are thieves then the holy fathers of the church were the same.

And that the Roman Catholic church has gone back on its own philosophy, makes very little difference to us. It served her purpose to take up that position in the early middle ages, and it serves her purpose to take the opposite position now. We never expected any help from the Roman Catholic church. Who has ever known the Roman Catholic church to take up anything for the enlightenment and the benefit of

Besides, there is an essential difference and an absolute opposition between the solution proposed even by the writers referred to above, and the Socialist solution.

The Roman Catholic church always wanted to leave the production and distribution in the possession

of a few. But this possessing class was to give by "charity" and by "alms" to the "poor" as much as it saw fit for the sake of heaven and to escape from purgatory and hell. And especially to give to the church for the very same reasons.

The Socialists, on the other hand, declare that this question is not a religious problem.

We say that it is purely a political and economic question, which has very little and only indirectly to do with religion, that is, inasmuch as it is almost impossible to be a truly good and honest Christian under the present system.

The Socialists furthermore contend, that if Christianity, if the Roman Catholic church could have solved the problem, it had 1900 years time to do so. Yet, as a matter of fact, the Roman Catholic countries are the most wretched of all. Furthermore, all reform and progress have been brought about only after the most terrific struggles with the Roman Catholic church, which has cost millions of precious lives, in fact, the Roman Catholic church has shed more innocent blood than all the other religions in the world combined.

The Socialists of the world are very well aware what would be their fate, what would be the fate of every scientific and bright-minded man and woman in the world, if the Roman Catholic church could ever regain the power it had three or four hundred years ago. But the Socialists of the world are not afraid, and they are ready and willing to take up the fight at any time for the future progress and the well-being of humanity.

Again we say, the Socialists do not want to go into this on any false premises. We want it to be understood that this is a purely economic and political question and that it ought to be dealt with as such. We want the Roman Catholic clergy to keep their devil and their purgatory for themselves, that is, for their religious purposes, and not to bring them into politics. We deny that they have a right to use the confessional to influence voters. We will resist the attempts the Roman Catholic clergy to get control of our country



There are in round numbers 300,000 men in the United States employed in making and selling alcoholic liquors. To which add all those engaged in making such cooperage and glassware as that trade directly calls for, and such drayage as it necessitates, and it would be a conservative estimate indeed to say that 500,000 men are kept in work directly by the liquor traffic.

What to do with these 500,000 men did prohibition prevail under capitalism is thep roblem. The labor market is already full, even in our most prosperous times. Does anyone doubt it? Let him watch the progress of a strike, no matter how justly called. The boast of the employers that they can always find plenty of men to take the place of the strikers if these last will go quietly to their homes and abstain from picketing is no idle one. Despite the obloquy attaching to the strikebreaker plenty of such men can always be found, because the labor market it always full.

Is it, then, seriously proposed to turn 500,000 men with their dependents out of employment, without compensation or guarantees of any kind, onto a labor market already full?

Is it likely that this can be done?

Is it likely that 500,000 men will put up some sort of a fight before they will submit to be evicted from their present means of employment and left to make a fight for life as best as they can in an already congested "labor market"?

This much will probably be conceded at once by every fair-minded and reasonable man that before we can hope to do away with the liquor traffic we must solve in advance the problem of employment for these 500,000 men whom Prohibition aims to displace. And not for these 50,000 men alone, but likewise for that other army of at least 50,000 yearly who are now destroyed by liquor and who would, of course, be preserved to compete in the struggle for existence were the traffic in intoxicants effectually suppressed. The employment problem for this mighty host absolutely must be solved, and in advance, ere the traffic can be done away. Let us with much patience examine every solution that has been offered.

Times and again the writer has heard the Prohibitionist speaker leclare that "we would set all these men at work in our cloth factories making coats for those who now are coatless through strong drink, we would set them at work making shoes for the now unshod feet of the drunkard's children, making stoves and digging coal for those who are now without the comforts of warmth," and when he was a child this seemed to him all that was necessary to-say on the subject.

The fallacy in all this is, of course, the quiet assumption that "we" have such industries under "our" control in which without let or hindrance we could set people at work. And under Socialist this would be true. But not so does capitalism proceed. Capitalism buys labor as it buye potatoes and onions, for the lowest price possible, and always operates industry with as few men as possible.

There lies before me as I write, the Detroit Times of Dec. 6, 1904, in which anent his troubles at Zeigler, Joseph Leiter is quoted as saying. "Labor unions at Zeigler or any other place can't put a collar around my neck and give me orders what kind of labor I shall buy with my money-When I go into the market to purchase labor I propose to retain just as much freedom as does the purchaser in any other kind of a market. There is no difficulty in obtaining labor, for the country is full of unemployed men."

There it is in a nutshell, the spirit of capitalism, and what is of more importance, its method. With capitalism an increase in the number of the unemployed never means a shortening of hours, but always a shortening of pay. Capitalism is never concerned to find employment for all, but rather its interests always lie in the existence of a great mass of the unemployed.

But another argument has been advanced. It is claimed that prohibition of the liquor traffic would release the enormous amount of one billion five hundred million dollars now spent annually in liquor which would therefore be spent in useful avenues of trade and furnish em-ployment to those displaced by prohibition. The fallacy which underlies this argument is the assumption that this sum of money is at present used for no other purpose than the purchase of intoxicating drink. But a moment's reflection will show that this is not the case. A dollar passes over the bar into the saloonkeepers's till. Does it remain there forever? Does the saloonkeeper destroy it? Or does he in turn use that dollar in paying taxes and purchasing commodities, thus sending it into general circulation again? Possibly enough that same dollar inside of three months has bought five times its value in groceries, been banked a dozen times and paid three times by stalwart prohibitionists on the pastor's salary.

The fact is that the money now spent in alcoholic liquors circulates

as freely as any other in the purchase of commodities and hence there is no such fund as some suppose which could be released by prohibition for the furtherance of useful enterprises. But some will say, "It is not claimed that prohibition would increase the actual volume of money, but that through closing the avenue through which one billion and a half passes now it would hasten its circulation which would have all the economic value of an increase in volume." Let us see. There are two ways in which the circulation of money may be

hastened, (1) by passing through fewer hands; (2) by an increase in the cost of living coupled with an increase in the general purchasing power. A word on each of these. (1) If the money of the country were made to pass through fewer hands as the present writer contends it would with Prohibition under capitalism, then we for those through made to pass at all. could only appear as a result, never as a cause, of increased demand for labor. We have seen already that an increase in the number of laborers available under capitalism only means a decrease in wages, hence also in the cost of living.

Another form of the same idea is this, that at present a great many "bad debts" are contracted, to the jetriment of merchants and others and to the general stagnation of industry, because inebriates spend the and to the general stagnation of industry, because inebriates spend the money in liquor which should go to the purchase of necessaries for their families. True, but those who live by the liquor traffic spend the same money for their necessaries in the furtherance of trade and industry. Prohibition would not increase the volume of money. The most that it could accomplish would be a transference of purchasing power from one individual to another. And of what moment is this as affecting the general welfare? A had debt on the part of the inebriate due to his habits is no more an economic loss than a bad debt would be contracted by a worker in the liquor traffic unable to pay because of enforced idleness under Prohibition. But it is said that the inebriate's inability to pay is not due alone, nor chiefly to his expenses, but to his inability to work. True, but by so much as liquor incapacitates him it retires him from competition with his fellows, who thus, through the law of supply and demand, are enabled to secure a better wage.

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

EDITORIAL ETCHINGS.

How do you enjoy the high cost of living, Mr. Man! Do you realize how much of it is tribute to capitalistic vampires? Have you been voting for capitalism and its parties in the past? If you have, you have no kick now. But it is your duty to yourself, your family and your fellow men, not to vote for this sort of things another single time.

"Two men for every job!" That's what the capitalists tell us, and we do not blame them for trying to make us think so if they can. But our everyday contact with existing conditions, as well as the government statistics gathered at various times, show us that it is not true. Elsewhere we show that men in the higher lines of employment are struggling to see who shall get the few jobs and live and who will be crowded out and starve. But it is no better with the lower walks of employment. Just look at this, now, which we take from the daily press:

New York, March 3.—Fighting among 300 would be snow shovelers for about fifty positions caused a small riot in Fifth street which required reserves from the Fifth Street Police Station to quel. The fighting was not bloody nor long sustained, for most of the snow shovelers were weak with hunger, but it was lively for a while.

Over and over we are reminded of the saying of the Irish patriot, Daniel O'Connell, that he would take his religion from Rome, but that his political opinions were his own. The efforts of a few priests, who seem to be doing service for the capitalist interests as against the working class, in opposing Socialism, should be met by the same reply that O'Conneil gave. The capitalist system bears down just as cruelly on the Catholic workingmen as on the non-Catholic. In fact, it is often Catholic neighborhoods where we see the most distressing and pitiful evidences of the poverty caused by the capitalist plucking system. All workingmen are brothers, their interests are the same. In their struggle for emancipation from oppression no religious or other question should be allowed to divide them. Socialism declares and has declared over again that it has nothing to do with religion, one way or the other. It is concerned with economic matters-with the problem of how to preserve to the working class the great wealth which its day-long industry produces, but which under the capitalist system now goes to enrich non workers. As Socialism does not interfere with religion, religion should not meddle with Socialism. If it does its own members will rebel.

In our last issue we cited a recent instance where the pope confiscated certain independently owned church property in Pompeii, as a pretty good answer to the priests who were trying to make capital against the Social-Democrats on the score that we want to confiscate the property of the rich. The action of the pope might be put forward to show that social justification for confiscation might exist. As a matter of fact, Socialists mean that the means of production and distribution shall be gotten over into the hands of the people collectively. As to the "how" they are not so much concerned, for that depends altogether on the situation and the feeling of the people when the time for restoring them to the public comes. Some of our platforms have ed for, not according to their speculative, watered stock values, but their actual value. It is altogether likely that this will be the means of approach to the expropriation of the expropriators, the capitalists, but it might even in the future come about that the people might dispossess certain owners just as the pope has done, with some strong social justification back of their action. 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
