WHERE DOES NET PROFIT COME FROM?

Editor Social-Democratic Heral ?: have followed the discussion in tiated by Comrade Ashplant of I ...don, Ontario, concerning the genesis of capital with much interest. have already written a personal letter to Comrade Ashplant, but I received a reply from him stating that I had not covered any point which had not been dealt with by the other comrades taking part in this discussion. Since then I have given the subject some more attention and now

submit this article with the hope that it may help to explain the subject under discussion. In your issue of March 25, the matter at issue is briefly summed up

No. 1 circulates 20/- for raw material, and 4/- for machinery, and employs No. 2 to work for a day for the balance 3/-. Finally, No. 1 sells the product (of No. 2), for which he has expended or cir-culated 27/- for a sum 3/- in excess of cost and recovers his 27/- plus 3/-. The supposition here is that yarn is sold to a third party whom we may call No. 3. Now in that case I must ask, To which class them does No. 3 belong? It is true that you can reproduce the yarn by expending 27 per cent of gold representing 45 cial hours of labor, BUT YOU CANNOT POSSIBLY REPRO-DUCE IT IN 45 HOURS. IT IS Eggs, POUND TO TAKE YOU 50 SO-ClaL HOURS UNDER A GIVEN SYSTEM OF INDUSTRY. You can therefore only throw 45 hours of labor into circulation and take out five more as long as the laborer remains a commodity. You being a Socialist are, of course, striving to emancipate the laborer from this degrading condition. I deny that the supposition

EDITORIAL ETCHINGS.

The rise of the Socialist movement all over the world is causing various churchmep and critics to scrutinize the status and achievements of the modern church with unusual frankness.

Two such fearless and searching criticisms by well known Englishmen are just now stirring up talk in Great Britain.

Frederic Harrison, in the Positivist Review, says that "in public questions, in polities, in legislation, in tone of public life, the organized Christian churches do not do good, but do evil." They are the instruments of the governments of the day, their tools, their creatures, he says, and are ever ready to bless war and to consecrate the cannon to their dealth-dealing mission. "The endowed, established and incorporated Christian bodies are found, whether Catholic, Episcopalian, Lutheran or Calvanist, to make, not for righteousness in nations, but for the ascendency of classes, the rivalry of nations, and the maintenance of abuses

The other criticism comes from a well known English churchman named Richard Heath. The churches are necessarily enslaved to the plutocracy of Christendom, he declares, and Socialism has come to do for the people "what the churches ought to have done." And he adds, "Socialism is, in fact, the modern version of Christ's Christianity, separated from all theology, all clericalism, all public worship, and from the very idea of the church . . . How are the British churches, so materialistic themselves, going to stem the tide of materialism, especially when that materialism preaches the social gospel they ough to have preached ? What the outcome will be it is not possible to say, but how can we expect, under such circumstances, anything less than the eclipse of the churches ?"

The fault is not ours. If the church has drifted away from Christ and is now the bride of Mammon, who is to blame but the enurch !

And what churchman has cause of complaint if a political party embodies the same morals in its platforms that shine forth from Christ's teaching? On the contrary, he should feel elated at the fact. And, besides, there should be no whine about materialism. Economics and politics have to do with material things. We should be given credit for leaving spiritual things to the domain of the church.

Our batty friend Ford, of the Faribault Referendum, has written

a letter to some Los Angeles Socialists explaining to them why the national platform, as drawn up at Chicago a year ago, "is a bourgeois platform." He savs:

The reason the present national platform of the so-called Socialist party is a bonrgeois platform, is because it proposes a tax on land values, inherit-ance and graduated tax, as a means of helping the middle exploiting class and the present declaring for the present wage system by increasing the wages and shortening the hours of labor as a rank fake and pretense that the capitalist class can be forced to give these things, while they (the capitalists) are to own the means of production, the factory system, mines and mills. For does not Marx teach all the way through that all these fake reforms are only a shift, that while one section apparently is benefited, others suffer; that labor must pay it all. And yet Marx in the Community Maridan

And yet Marx in the Communist Manifesto says that the proletariat must wrest "by degrees" all capital from the bourgeoisie, that this must be first carried on by means of measures which appear economically insufficient, but which expand as the movement increases in power, and then he indicates certain general measures as being more or less applicable to the conditions in the various countries, among which we read "Application of all rents of land to public purposes.... A heavy progressive or graduated income tax,... centralization of credit in the hands of the state," etc. First of all the battle of democracy must be won, he tells us.
