EREWITH we present a list of some of the bills introduced in the Wisconsin Legislature by the Social-Democratic representatives, all of which, although most worthy measures, have been summarily killed.

The present legislature of Wisconsin, you must know, was widely heralded as the legislature that was committed to Reform and "the people" and great things were people" and great things were expected of it. Some workingmen, afraid to trust representatives of their own class, gave their votes to the reform members put up by this La Follette faction of the Republican party and boasted loudly among their Labor associates of the great things for labor the great Reform legislature was going to do. Cast your eye down the list below and judge for yourself whether these Labor men were right or whether they did not throw their votes away to their eco-

In this connection it is well to call attention to the action of the governor in vetoing the mendacious wage exemption amendment. Please note that in doing this Mr. La Follette had to undo the bad work done by his own party representatives in the Legislature. After the bill had been passed and only awaited his signature to become a law, various labor bodies of the state sent in heated protests and the Socialist members appeared before him and showed how vicious the proposed law was and how it would operate to enable sh ster lawyers to save themselves from starving by literally stripping cary workingman who had been forced by circumstances to run up a bill at some store. In arguing the matter before the committees our representatives had offered to agree to the bill providing all other forms of exemptions were also wiped out. But no, the capitalistic committeemen were dead opposed to interfering with the bankruptcy exemptions which enable well-to-do bankrupts to retain wealth omes and other valuable property—the Frank Bigelows, for instance the governor saw that the bill would do incalculable mischief, politically and otherwise, and so he vetoed it. We wish we could give his Reform legislature credit for as much humanity.

#### No Class Legislation, Except for Capitalist Class!

Look over the record below, then look at the quotation above from the Milwaukee organ of the corporation capitalists and then decide for yourselves whose hands the Reform legislature has been playing into. You can only come to one conclusion: That the Reformers, when it comes to legislation, desert all their fine phrases about "God's patient poor," and protect their class, the corporation plutes.

The workers should keep this lesson in mind and couple with it that old proverb: "If you want anything done, do it yourself." If the workers need legislation, they must send their own representatives to the Legislature. Every time they rely on the oily promises of capitalist party men who claim to be Reformers, they will get what is vulgarly called "a throw down!" Following are the Labor bills that lay bleeding on the field of class carnage at the Wisconsin capitol:

SENATE BILL NO. 37—Introductal by Senator Rummel. Authorizing Cities and Towns to acquire, construct and maintain public utilities and providing payment therefor.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 14—Introduced by Assemblyman Alldridge. To abelish contributory negligence as a defense in all actions for the recovery of damages caused by the negligence of any person. (This would be "class legislation" from the capitalist standpoint, as it would protect the lives of the working class from accidents because of the defective machinery of the employing class! The working will never rest till they put enough of their representatives in the legislature to exact such a law.)

### We Welcome the Issue! By VICTOR L. BERGER.

Milwaukee, Wis., U. S. A., May 13, 1905.

R. William George Bruce, the chairman of the Democratic Milwaukee County Committee, has announced that there will be a combination of the Republicans and Democrats in the next municipal election, for the purpose of defeating the Social-Democratic party.

Now this was exactly what we expected, and just what we want. The clearer cut the issue between the old parties and the Social-Democracy, the better for us.

Mayor Rose has been elected four times on a "municipal ownership" platform, and in 1898 and again in 1890 he made this a special Only last summer at a big meeting in the West Side Turner Hall, he declared that he was going to erect an electric light plant for the city "if he had to steal the money!"

We have always warned the people that the Democratic party and Mr. Rose remut nothing by their platform. What they wanted was to get elected. The Democratic party has no defined principles on any subject. In Chicago, they have just elected Dunne on the platform of immediate public ownership. In Milwaukes, they have elected Mayor Rose four times on municipal ownership platforms, and now they want to elect him on a platform which is opposed to public ownership. This we may understand from Mr. Bruce, and from the attitude of Mr. Rose's friends.

But then this is an old story. Platforms count for nothing with the Democratic party. All it wants is to get into office.

Nor is it at all-surprising that the Republicans are willing to enter into a coalition with the Democrats. The Republicans have one sharply defined policy and that is to obey the corporations. They are always the helpmeets of capital. It is only natural for the Republican party to stand against public ownership; it has done so all over the country and will do so again.

Then why should not these parties combine? As far as the local situation is concerned, where is the difference between them? There is no difference as to their boodling and stealing. They always did that without reference to party allegiance. Of the 110 indictments brought a year ago, of which minety-eight have not been tried, about half of them were against Democrats and the other half against Republicans. It may be that the Republicans got the majority because they had one reputed horse thief in their ranks. -

As far as the Social-Democrats are concerned, we earnestly hope that this combination between the Repüblicans and Democrats will come off. Such a combination must be realized all over the country because out control of the government. When the capitalistic elements fore we get control of the government. When the capitalistic elements join hands, then the issue will be clear cut with capitalism on one hand and Socialism on the other.

The Social-Democratic party is the only one in America which is really and earnestly for public ownership. It stands pledged to the inauguration of that system as a part of the great revolutionary principle of Socialism.

We hold that by the natural development of society this nation has outgrown the old system of government and must throw it off before our national ideal of a government of the people, for the people and by the people can be actually secured. Political liberty alone has become inadequate; we must have both political and economic liberty. To secure this is the aim of the Social-Democracy.

To secure this is the sim of the Social-Democracy stands also for every radical change that will bring means of production into the hands of the people. But we call attention to the fact that the measures we urge are in no way a cure for existing evils, nor are they necessarily Social-istic institutions. They are to be viewed, rather, as needed palliatives, capable of being carried out even under present conditions. Under no circumstances will the Social-Demogratic working people rest content with municipal improvements which are merely temporary in their nature and must be entirely inadequate. They will move onward to the conquest of all public powers; to an entire change of the present system for one which shall secure to the people, collectively, the mean of production and distribution.

A "BRIEF" BY IDA CROUCH-HAZLETT.

\* This digset is for the benefit of those too busy to read Prof. Ferri's great book. Enrico Ferri of Italy was the first great scientist to defend Socialism s of Herbert Spencer. Avowing himself a Spencerian scientist he proceeds to show how eminently scientific Social-Democracy really is.

HE purpose in preparing the following brief has been to present the argument and the subject matter of what is perups the clearest exposition of the claims of Socialism to be a scientific analysis of society, in a simple and complete manner, so as to be accessible to a great body of men and who have not much money to invest in books, and who are so wearied with the work of carrying society on their shoulders, that their opportunities for study are necessarily limited.

The exact language of the author has been adhered to as much as possible, with only slight variations here and there to facilitate the pro-

In the preface the author states that his intention has been to point out the general relation existing between contemporary Socialism and the whole trend of modern scientific thought.

The contention is made that Socialism is in conflict with the funds mental facts of the physical, biological and social sciences. He says that he purposes to demonstrate that Marxian Socialism, the only Socialism that has a truly scientific method and value, is only the practical fulfillment in the social life, of that modern scientific revolution which has triumphed in our times, thanks to the works of Charles Darwin and Herbert Spencer.

Darwin and especially Spencer halted when they had traveled only half way toward the conclusions of a religious, political or social order which necessarily flow from their indisputable premises.

Virchow in opposing Haeckel's defense of Darwinism asserted that it led direct to Socialism. Hackel and the other German Darwinians immediately protested that it is in absolute opposition to Socialism, and Haeckel stated that every intelligent statesman ought to advocate theory of descent and the doctrine of evolution as the best antidote for the absurd notions of the Socialists, that the tendency of the theory could be nothing but aristocratic, by no means can it be democratic, much less socialistic.

His three principal arguments have reference to the equality of in-dividuals, the struggle for life and its victims, and the survival of the fittest. They are as follows.

Socialism tends toward a chimerical equality of persons and pro-perty, while Darwinism shows the organic necessity of the natural inequality of individuals.

Only a small minority can triumph in the struggle for existence, while Socialism asserts that all ought to triumph.

The struggle for existence assures the survival of the best and this leads to an aristocratic hierarchy of selected-individuals instead of the democratic collectivist teaching of Socialism.

In answer to the first, Ferri asserts that scientific Socialism has never denied the inequality of individuals. Social equality has to do with the right to live a man's life, and not to be forced from the means of existence by the fraud, favoritism and unscrupulous methods of the few. Equality according to Socialism is a relative thing and must be understood in a two-fold sense:

1. All men should be guaranteed human conditions of existence. 2. All men ought to be equal at the starting point.

These conditions can be obtained only by the transformation of

private ownership of the means of production into social ownership. He goes on to state that the first anti-Socialist objection is overruled

since its starting point is non-existent; that inequalities will never disappear on account of the principle of variation that manifests itself in the continuous development of species. He likens the division of labor, on which Raeckel puts so much

stress to the different functions of the cells in an organism, equally useful and necessary to the life of the organism as a whole. In the biological organism all remains inactive, and it obtains nourishment by exchanges only in proportion to its labor. In dealing with this first category Ferri treas of the incentive,

choice of labor, remuneration, anarchist and socialist distinctions, suppression of individuality, and false social standards.

In regard to the alleged Darwinian position that the vast mass of individuals must perish that a few may live. Ferri states that there is a decreasing proportion between the "called" and the "chosen" as we ascend the biological scale. The more complex the organization the less waste in the attainment of life. He illustrates this by plants, animals, and the lower and higher races of man. He says it is unscientific to interpret the cannibalism of the past to justify modern individualist

The muscular struggle of primitive life is superseded more and more by the intellectual struggle. Historical society has struggled for civil equality, religious equality, political equality, and is now struggling for economic equality.

Even under the best conditions scientific Socialism does not deny that there will be some "losers" in the struggle. These Ferri treats of under the name of degenerates and criminals. He speaks of the absurdity of the modern penal system based on the erroneous notion of free-will and moral delinquency, and characterizes cellular confinement as one of the mental aberrations of the age. He says that criminalogists are united in desiring to substitute simple segregation for those not fitted for social life on account of pathological conditions; and he concurs with Lombroso in his conclusion that all criminality depends on the influence of the economic environment. Under Socialism the chief forms of degeneracy will be suppressed by the elimination of their principal cause, physical poverty and its consequent mental suffering.

The law of mutual aid as a factor in evolution is also cited as sustaining the cooperation for life.

In discussing the third and last part of Haeckel's argument, Ferri objects to the phrase, "survival of the best." He says this is simply a persistence of the idea which used to see in nature and history a premeditated goal to be reached by a process of continuous amelioration There is a vast difference between the survival of the best and the survival of the best fitted. The "best fitted" means those who are best fitted to their environment. If this is vicious there will be a retrograde selection. This is shown in modern society in marriage conditions, in the persistence of the rich, inhuman labor conditions, and the advantage: of capitalism over the proletariat. The victory goes to him who has the fewest scruples. It is only under natural and equal conditions in society that the best fitted for survival would be the most desirable.

Ferri next proceeds to Socialism as a consequence of Darwinism He deals with the attitude of its position as affecting existing religious superstitions.

Socialism occupies an analogous position in regard to liberal movements. They represent the activities of the bourgeoisie which will hasten to establish them when monarchies no longer serve their interests. (Vide Russia.)

The next point of identification of Socialism with science is in the relation of the individual to the species. The eighteenth century closed with the glorification of the individual. This has led to the individualist position of the capitalists and the anarchists. Modern biology has demonstrated that the individual exists only as a member of society. Every object is a collectivity. The cell is an aggregate of various parts. The federation of various parts constantly increases with the ascent in zoological series. The social aggregate is the eternal reality of life. The instinct of reproduction gives birth to the social sense, and even this and its results have been seized by the capitalist class to perpetuate the servility and helplessness of the working class. Whereas modern society has made its deduction that millions of individuals should suffer for the advantage of a few, modern science has demonstrated that it is the individual who lives for the species.

As Darwinism has shown that the entire mechanism of animal evolution may be reduced to the struggle for life, so the machinery of social evolution rests on the struggle between classes to control the economic forces that form the physical basis of life, and determine all consequent estitiutions. It is this grand conception which forms the imperishable glory of Marx, and assures him in sociology the place that Darwin occupies, in biology and Spencer in philosophy. Human society like all other organisms is not a homogenous whole. It is made up of diverse parts, and their differentiation constantly increases in direct ratio to the degree of social evolution attained. A tribe of primitive savages advances to the intricate organization of modern civilization with its ever increasing class specialization. Individuals may pass from one class to another, but the Masses remain and will do so as long as the reason for their differentiation remains. The circumstances and phenomena of the hostile conflict of these classes varies, but its most pronounced phase is the antagonism between those who hold the monopoly of the means of production and those who have been expropriated. The resulting injustice can only be abolished through the operation of the class struggle. It is not a struggle of individual. But now it is dawning on the mind

Gifts established universal education, Gifts like these (the suffrage and education) which, having once given, we can never take back. The new weapon is the ballot; and what will it mean when the working class awakes and takes this weapon in hand to work out its mind? The ballot means the whole power of the state—courts, po-lice, army; and what will happen when the working class takes in hand all these powers to establish and en-force the idea of justice innate in its mind?

This question of what will happen is a serious one in proportion to the probability that the working classes get the power some of their leaders hope to obtain. The chances that they will some time get this power are by no means inconsiderable. One thing may be set down as certain, they will not be prevented, but only encouraged and stimulated, by any course that seems to them lated, by any course that seems to them oppressive and contemptuous. The employers of labor cannot hope to control the votes of labor, by either legitimate or illegitimate means, in the long future if they persist in courses that breed-discouragement and hostility. They can hold this vote by sincere sympathy and demonstrable justice, but in no otherway. Denunciation of Socialism which is inspired by the misunderstanding and selfishness of those who have wealth will not put it down. On the contrary, it will breed Socialists and make them bitter and desperate. They may be in error as to facts and the right cure for the evils they feel; but they cannot be the evils they feel; but they cannot be made to change their minds by any course that damns their ignorance and course that damns their ignorance and their motive. As for their motive, it is quite as generous, as patriotic, and moral as that which actuates those who cherish a conceit of superiority. Bishop Potter, Carroll D. 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

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

### FOR OUR NEW READERS:

THIS COUNTRY is made up of working people, both industrial and ericultural, but is ruled by the capitalist class, which is numerically small. Being in control of the government, it runs that government in the interests of its class and against the interests of the working class, who are the people. We Socialists believe that the country should be ruled by the people in the interests of the people. That is why we established a government in the first place. We want the people to own it so that the political power can be used to begin the march to the co-operative system, called Social-Democracy. All the means of existence are now owned by capitalists, and yet the capitalist class makes up only about 12 per cent of the population, and a mere ONE PER CENT of them OWN OVER HALF THE WEALTH OF THE NATION! The means of existence should be owned by the collectivity in order that the benefits should go to ALL instead of to a FEW.

Under the capitalist system the vast majority of mankind must sell themselves to the capitalistic owners of the means of production and distribution in order to live-and to live miserably at that.

The nation owns the post office and everybody is glad that it does. It ought to own all the trusts so that all may enjoy the benefits.

It ought to own all the means of production as soon as such industries have become sufficiently concentrated.

To bring this about the people—the workers—must get control of the political power. The Social-Democratic party (known as the Socialist party in some states, and nationally) is organized to bring this about this and the abolition of capitalism. It insists that the industrious class shall be the wealthy class, and the idle class the poor class -but it will, in fact, abolish the poor class altogether. The Social-Democratic movement is international, but we expect it to achieve success in the United States first, because the capitalist system, which we mean to uproot, is best developed here. To show you that your interests lie with us we print the following:

#### EDITORIAL ETCHINGS.

The United States Supreme Court is not likely to hear the last of its miserable decision in the ten hour New York bake-shop law. As one of the dissenting justices said, it is the most notable decision made for years, for its effects will be far reaching.

In effect it says that the right of a master to exploit his work-ien to the limits of their endurance under the struggle for work is higher than all considerations of humanity and public policy.

We consider it fortunate that this decision was given in the case of the bakers instead of some other trades. For, far and away, the situation of the bakery wo.kers is the most miserable of any of the modern city trades. Few people—scarcely any, in fact, realize the degrading conditions that exist in that trade. If they did they would eat less non-union baker-made bread.

Ask any man familiar with the labor movement and he will tell that the bakery workers have been among the hardest to organize and to keep organized. Years of inhuman treatment have almost driven every spark of independence and self-respect out of them. They have been so inured to toiling every day and night (Sundays not excepted) from twelve to twenty hours, in basement bake-shops impossible to keep clean and healthy, and sleeping in any dirty toft the poverty of the bakery boss might force upon them (and this kind of a living for a wage of seven or eight or nine do large and his kind of a living for a wage of seven or eight or nine do are a week!) that they almost feel lost when once the chains they have hugged are broken! A Milwaukee bakery proprietor told a trade union organizer that it was better for him. better for his men not to have Sunday off—they would spend their money! He paid them NINE DOLLARS A WEEK! He felt he was a benefactor of his men. Yes, and it might be added that the place where his men slept was a little loft over a chicken coop!

The brutalizing slavery of the small bake shop may be seen from following: The average small shop works fourteen hours a day. Starting at 7 o'clock at night the men must work in an ill-ventilated and damp basement until 9 o'clock next morning, with only a brief interval for lunch. Then they go to their beds. Three hours later they must leave their beds and break their rest for dinner. That over, they may be lucky enough to get a few winks of sleep before 2 o'clock they have to set the sponge, which consumes over an hour. back to bed, but they must be up sgain to eat supper before going to work at 7. This daily round seven days in the week makes up an alt intolerable existence—but the supreme court of this country will dmit the constitutionality of a law to protect dumb animals from sing worked to exhaustion, but cannot see it in the case of the bakers, the struggle for existence forces them to cocept any terms the akery bosses see fit to impose, for their compliance constitutes the if it actually kills the workers in their tracks!

The bakery workmen die like files, o. consumption, rheumatism and other physical punishments for the breaking of nature's laws. But what do the learned justices care for the laws of nature? Capitalist laws are alone sacred to them! What are wage workers for but to be exploited!

One point we would specially make. These conditions we have described are those that obtain in non-union shops. So far as it dures to come in conflict with capitalistic interests, the union compels better hours, better conditions, and better pay. Hence union made bread is cleaner, and safer to eat. Take our advice and insist on union bread. This is not sentiment—it is genuine common sense.


